The CART Board of Directors met on February 14 and were treated to a presentation by students in CART's Law and Order and Policy Lab on a Teens against Domestic Violence project the students are spearheading. A new CART Board President and Vice-President were elected with Mike Betts, Fresno Business Council Appointee to the CART Board, chosen as President, and Sam Geil, Clovis Unified Private Sector Appointee, selected to serve as Vice-President.

3. Curriculum (Bengel, Hovsepian, Van Volkinburg)

This Board subcommittee did not meet.

4. Facilities (Fogg, Heryford, Sandoval)

At the February 15 meeting of the Facilities Board Subcommittee, members reviewed design, bid and construction reports, change order reports, and bond measure finance reports. Members received an update on Clovis Unified's current solar installation project, including delays at secondary sites. Topics for March 8's Facilities Board Workshop were discussed including a status update on current and future bond measures; passage of Proposition 51; deferred maintenance, enrollment and student housing; and construction delivery information as outlined in

new Assembly Bill 2316. Signage at school sites was discussed including the possibility of integrating school and business logos that would reflect CTE program partnerships, lighted school branding signage, and facility naming and signage. Members learned that Clovis Unified is working with Tree Fresno and schools' student councils to plant trees at school sites, replacing those that had to be removed due to solar shade structure installations. Finally, water infrastructure changes approved by the City of Fresno at the site proposed to house the District's sixth comprehensive high school were reviewed.

High School

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve revisions to Board Policy No. 3209 – Graduation Requirements – High School.

DISCUSSION:

Early in the 2016-17 school year, a committee of site and curriculum leaders and teachers was convened to evaluate the existing graduation requirements to ensure they reflect current State requirements and coursework that align with the District's aims and goals.

This committee reviewed health, geography and physical education courses. As a result, changes are recommended to the existing graduation policy to require a total of six semesters of social science, as is required in California. This would result in ninth grade geography becoming an optional elective. This recommendation is the result of the committee's determination that the content currently included in ninth grade geography classes is covered in other social science coursework. Social studies department chairpersons from each of the high schools were a part of this committee and supported this recommendation. This change will also create some flexibility for students in their early years of high school to access additional electives, such as Career Technical Education (CTE), intervention courses and advanced placement (AP) courses, and other graduation requirement courses.

If approved, the proposed changes would become effective with Summer School offerings in 2017 and for the graduating class of 2021.

Standard Instructional Program
HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

PURPOSE: To establish requirements for earning a high school diploma.

The mission of the Clovis Unified School District, in partnership with the community, is to provide exemplary educational programs and services that prepare students to be productive citizens in our democratic society (reference Board Policy No. 1104). The following high school requirements encompass the knowledge, skills and experiences needed to develop the essential habits of a productive citizen-habits of character, communication, citizenship, mind, self-direction, collaboration, wellness, and productivity.

A. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPREHENSIVE AND ALTERNATIVE HIGH SCHOOLS

C. GENERAL HIGH SCHOOL REGULATIONS

Earning Credits Through Alternative Education	Independent study high school credits will be earned at the rate of one credit for 16 hours of productive work.
Parent Conferences	The high school administration will establish procedures for holding conferences with the student, the classroom teacher, and parent and/or guardian, for those students who are performing below the competency level. This conference shall include a discussion of the assessment and description of the remedial program.
Diploma Policy	Diplomas will be issued to all students who have successfully completed unit, course competency and the four-year experience requirements adopted by the Board, unless waived by prevailing policy.

Commencement Exercises	All students who have qualified for a diploma and who are in "good standing" as determined by the principal are eligible for commencement exercises.
	Commencement ceremonies will be scheduled at the end of the spring semester. Students completing the required graduation requirements after seven semesters of work and who complete the early graduation process shall be offered the opportunity to be awarded their diploma in a ceremony in the principal's office at the close of the seventh semester.
Transfers	<u>To Alternative Education</u> : For students transferring into continuation classes from regular classes, grades and credits earned as of the date of transfer shall be transferred to continuation classes.

D. VOCATIONAL COMPETENCY CERTIFICATE PROGRAM FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION STUDENTS

The Vocational Competency Certificate Program (VCCP) is a course of study option for special education students which leads to graduation with a Vocational Competency Certificate. The VCCP is intended for students with a current Individualized Education Program (IEP) and recommended by their IEP team upon entering high school in the ninth grade year or no later than the beginning of the eleventh grade. The outcome of the VCCP provides students with the skills necessary for employability and self-sufficiency within the community.

Title: Placement of a Special Education Student in a Non-Public

School

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize Clovis Unified School District to enter into an agreement for a student to attend Creative Alternatives, a non-public school in Fresno, California.

DISCUSSION:

Based on the Individualized Education Program (IEP) recommendation, it has been determined that student #34 for the 2016-17 school year will require services in a non-public school in order to address the student's unique educational needs.

Clovis Unified will review this case every six months to determine the appropriateness of the placement and whether a less restrictive placement can meet the student's unique educational needs.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Clovis Unified will pay approximately \$3,900 per month for this student. The cost has been included in the 2016-17 Special Education Budget.



Title: Pre-Construction Management Services for 2018 Facility Projects

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the pre-construction management service agreements to assign construction firms to 2018 facility projects, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

The District is seeking to enter into agreements with firms to complete pre-construction services and ultimately construct the projects through Construction Management Multiple Prime, as authorized in Board Policy No. 4804 – *Public Works Contracting*.

The first part of the process is a pre-construction agreement that specifies the scope of work up to the bidding process. Generally, this contract specifies that the firms will evaluate the project for constructability, work with the architect on design, conduct value engineering, provide a detailed schedule and cost estimate, and plan for the bidding process in coordination with the District's construction staff. A pre-construction fee of \$7,500 will be rolled into the construction management fee when a recommendation related to a construction agreement for the project is made to the Board.

DISCUSSION:

Adoption of Resolution No. 3584 would reinforce Clovis Unified's support of increased funding for Special Education equalization and the creation of a preschool funding mechanism for children with disabilities. Additionally, it would urge Governor Jerry Brown and the California State Legislature to keep the existing SELPA governance structure in place; reject rolling Special Education funding into the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF); and to work together to provide increased funding for Special Education equalization and the establishment of a Special Education preschool funding mechanism in order to provide children with disabilities the best chance for educational success in the most cost-efficient manner.

RESOLUTION NO. 3584 BEFORE THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FRESNO COUNTY, CALIFORNIA

RESOLUTION OF SPECIAL EDUCATION FUNDING

WHEREAS, Special Education is a Federal and State mandated education program that entitles children with disabilities to receive a free appropriate public education (FAPE); and

WHEREAS, California presently provides educational services to more than 713,000 children with identified disabilities; and

WHEREAS, California's neutral funding formula (Assembly Bill (AB) 602) does not adequately or equally provide the necessary funding to pay for the increasing costs of providing educational services to students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Special Education AB 602 funding rates among Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs) vary considerably and have not kept pace with rising Special Education student services; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) has consistently recommended that the Legislature adopt legislation to equalize Special Education AB 602 funding rates; and

WHEREAS, there has been a significant increase in the population of preschool-age children with autism, many of whom require intensive services; and

WHEREAS, the State of California does not have a funding mechanism nor provide funding to pay for preschool programs for children with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, children who receive high-quality care and education before kindergarten are 40% to 60% less likely to need Special Education interventions when they reach school age; and

WHEREAS, funding early intervention programs, such as preschool for children with disabilities, provides educational and social benefits to children and results in significant future cost savings to State and school agencies; and

WHEREAS, in March 2015, the California Statewide Special Education Task Force issued a report recommending that the State establish a new State preschool funding model, and provide funding for Special Education equalization; and

WHEREAS, the Governor's 2017-18 Budget Proposal does not provide funding to address any of these issues; and

WHEREAS, AB 312 (O'Donnell) would increase funding for Special Education through providing equalization funding and establishment of a funding mechanism for preschool programs for children with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the Public Policy Institute of California (PPIC) suggests rolling \$3 billion Special Education funding into each school district's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF); and

WHEREAS, the PPIC proposal would effectively eliminate the current SELPAs charged with assuring member districts meet State and Federal law and provide a multitude of supports to ensure the provision of services to children with disabilities, and

WHEREAS, the Clovis Unified School District supports increased funding for Special Education equalization and supports the creation of a preschool funding mechanism for children with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the Clovis Unified School District opposes the PPIC recommendations to alter the Special Education SELPA regional governance model; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Governing Board of Clovis Unified

School District hereby urges Governor Jerry Brown and California State Legislature to keep the existing SELPA governance structure in place; reject rolling Special Education funding into the LCFF; and to work together to provide increased funding for Special Education equalization and the establishment of a Special Education preschool funding mechanism in order to provide our children with disabilities the best chance for educational success in the most cost-efficient manner.

DISCUSSION:

District Administration has actively sought qualified candidates who hold appropriate subject matter credentials inclusive of English Learner authorizations. In cases where a Designated Subjects (DS) and/or Career Technical Education (CTE) credential holder is required to hold a Specially Designed Academic Instruction delivered in English (SDAIE) authorization, but does not yet hold this authorization, and is not able to obtain an Emergency Crosscultural, Language and Academic Development (CLAD) permit, it is necessary to request a Variable Term Waiver.

Currently, Rachel Flores, CART Business and Finance/Lab classroom teacher, holds a Preliminary Career Technical Education Teaching Credential, which does not include a SDAIE authorization.

Rachel Flores is currently in a CTE program to clear her credential through Fresno Pacific University and will have earned her full SDAIE English Learner authorization upon issuance of the clear credential, anticipated in the fall of 2019. As such, it is recommended that this Variable Term Waiver Request be approved to provide the time necessary for Rachel to earn her full English Learner authorization.
