



CLOVIS UNIFIED COUNSELING PROGRAM

There are approximately 60 school counselors (GLD, GLS, and Transition Counselors), serving the students in Clovis Unified, within the (two) 7-12 complexes, (three) stand-alone 9-12 high schools, (three) stand-alone intermediate schools, (two) alternative education schools and an online school. There are also counselors at Clovis Adult Education & Center for Advanced Research and Technology. High school counselors carry a caseload of 400-500 students. Intermediate school counselors carry a caseload of 600-700 students. Alternative education schools have varying caseloads dependent on enrollment. Counselors must have a Pupil Services Credential (PPS) or an Administrative Services Credential. Many counselors possess a teaching credential and/or have a master's degree in education.

The main goal of a counselor is to make sure that all students on their caseload graduate from high school, are exposed to career opportunities, have a positive experience in school, and have a plan in place for post-secondary pursuits. It is essential that each student has a counselor to connect with on campus. Students begin to develop a six-year plan in seventh grade. This plan is revisited and revised throughout their secondary experience with the support of their counselor. Clovis Unified counselors follow the American School Counselor Association Model (ASCA) which focuses on Academic Achievement, College and Career Education, and Social/Emotional Support.

In addition to working with their students, counselors are assigned adjunct duties, some of which are listed below.

- Community College, CSU, or UC Liaison
- Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Coordinator
- Scholarship Coordinator
- Xello Coordinator (Online Career Education Program)
- A-G Course Maintenance
- Master Scheduling
- Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS)
- Multi-Tiered Multi-Domain System of Supports (MTMDSS) specific for school counseling.
- Suicide Prevention Liaison
- Career Technical Education (CTE) Liaison
- Freshman Four-Year Plan Facilitator
- Sophomore, Junior, and Senior Meeting Coordinator
- Middle School Liaison
- Transition Liaison
- NCAA Coordinator
- AP/PSAT Coordinator

All high schools have a Head Counselor who oversees the counselors and administrative assistants within the department at their site. Head Counselors are a part of the administrative cabinet to ensure that they understand and support the school's programs and goals while supporting site decisions with their unique counseling, college, and career focused lens.

Intermediate school counselors focus primarily on social-emotional, as well as academic concerns while assisting students with college and career information as they transition to high school. They collaborate closely with their high school partners regarding registration and attend district meetings and events.

The CUSD School Counseling Program is based on a collaborative model designed to support students, parents, teachers, administrators, and the community. Counselors are an integral part of the school environment. They serve as partners in supporting students' academics, college and career goals, as well as social-emotional wellness.

OBSERVATIONS for 2023-24 SCHOOL YEAR

In 2023-24, Counselors worked on the goals set forth in 2022-23 along with other areas of need that arose during the school year.

- Head Counselors from each site and intermediate counselors from the three stand-alone intermediate schools met monthly to focus on counseling objectives and district wide initiatives.
- Alignment and consistency were a top priority this year. Policies were discussed to better align across sites to focus on meeting the needs of ALL students across the District. Counselors from each high school site were involved throughout the Graduation Requirements Committee meetings resulting in many new recommendations. Some of these policies, listed below, were completed by the Graduation Requirement Workgroups that were held during the 2023-24 school year and are outlined in the CUSD Course Catalog.
 - Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) completion increased amongst most high schools. AB 469 mandates that all seniors apply for FAFSA/California Dream Act Application (CADAA) or complete an opt-out form.
 - The redesigned FAFSA was made available December 31, 2023, which normally would have been available in early October placing a large focus on seniors to have their FAFSA/CADAA applications completed by the CalGrant/Middle Class Scholarship deadline of April 2.
 - Impacted Schedule Criteria: Directed Studies PE, Impacted Schedule Criteria: PE Waiver, Impacted Schedule Criteria: Summer School, were established.
 - Online courses for original credit were created to fulfill the recommendations from the Graduation Requirements Committee. This program will be added to the current face to face, independent study, and credit recovery programs already part of the summer school process in 2024.
 - Online registration/course requests continued to expand to an online format which allows students to review courses for which they are qualified. Parents may view these requests in Parent Connect.
- Professional development through Hatching Results provided seven total days of training for all counselors.
 - Counselors learned about CaliforniaCollege.edu and technology assisted with meeting the requirements for CUSD to integrate with CaliforniaColleges.edu as the CUSD's newest source for academic, career and financial aid information for 7-12 students. Xello usage continued to be effective at the intermediate school level and will remain for grade six students as 7-12 move to CaliforniaColleges.edu.
 - Counselors supported students in obtaining Dual Enrollment (DuE) through various means such as: Summer Scholars Program, High School Enrichment, CTE courses, Uni-Track courses or CCCAP courses.
 - The counselor workgroup completed The Portrait of a Graduate with the support of the Digital Communication team and can be found on the CUSD Website.
 - The counselor Curriculum Writing Team continued to work through summer and the 2023-24 school year to develop ASCA aligned lessons for grades 7-12. This work will be ongoing for the next few years.

GOALS FOR 2024-25

- Increase administrative support and mentoring to school counselors across the District through continued professional development from Hatching Results- six full days, as well as through additional PLC workgroups.
- Counselor Curriculum Writing Team: Continue the work on Scope and Sequence of Tier 1 lessons to be taught across the district.
- Increase the FAFSA completion rate. A new law for 2022-23 stated that all seniors must complete a FAFSA/CADAA or FAFSA waiver form.
- As a partner District we will begin working with the California College Guidance Initiative (CCGI) and CaliforniaColleges.edu to provide access to UC/CSU/CC/FAFSA applications that can be monitored by counselors. Students will have access to lessons developed by counselors to support their career exploration.
- Update current counselor job description to reflect needs of students at different grade levels (7-12, 9-12, 7-8 and TK-6) as well as a new job description for Head Counselor.
- Work with district leadership on the Graduation Requirements Committee to review and update policies.
 - Workgroups to create an SOP regarding online course for original credit as outlined in the recommendations from the Graduation Requirements Committee.
 - Other workgroups as needed to support recommendations regarding other committee criteria.
- Continue to utilize and expand the course request online process.
- Increase coordination between Academic and Transition Counselors. Transition Counselors from all school sites, including elementary, are joining Hatching Results' professional development.
- Enhance policies to maximize CTE course space for students across the District. Continue to work on waiting lists and application processes.
- Determine how to administer the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) in its new digital format. Will focus on juniors requesting to test for National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT).
- Continue to work on DuE opportunities for high school students through community colleges due to changes at CSU Fresno.
- Continue to work with teachers in promoting the creation of additional A-G courses to support student A-G completion and success.
- Put into action the components of the A-G Completion Grant funding with the goal to increase A-G completion overall with an emphasis on all subgroups each year (through 2024-25 school year).
 - Teaching Fellows for high school Math courses or sixth period stipend for teachers in Math.
 - Professional Development for 7-12 grade school counselors and elementary transition counselors.
 - > Hatching Results for six days/year for three years (last year of training is 2024-25).
 - > Grades 9-12 counselors attend the National Association for College Admission Counseling Conference in Fall of 2024.
 - ➢ Grades 7-8 counselors attend the American School Counselor Association in Summer of 2025.
 - Continue to investigate avenues to expand State Seal of Biliteracy Language Testing for languages not taught or tested in CUSD (state created tests or online testing) due to new changes in the State Seal of Biliteracy criteria.

- o AVID summer training for counselors, teachers, and administrators.
- A-G requirements posters for all 7-12 classrooms and secondary poster with subject letter for high school classrooms at all 7-12 school sites.
- o Curriculum writing stipends to write/develop counseling lessons and/or write new A-G courses.
- Creation of a school counseling handbook with the help of Hatching Results.
- Allocate funds for AP and DuE fees to support SED students for achieving A-G credit.

The CUSD Transition Program is part of a districtwide effort to support student achievement. Our founding superintendent, Dr. Floyd Buchanan, believed in a "fair break for every kid." We hold tightly to the belief that "ALL students can learn." As an educational team, we want all students to reach their full potential in mind, body, and spirit. Our CUSD Transition Program allows us the opportunity to focus on students who might not seek support but would benefit from mentoring and increased connection to school resources. We provide ongoing support to students and families with the resources they need to be successful in the classroom, at home, and in the community. CUSD Transition Teams perform many duties during their day. However, their main responsibility is to ensure that all students achieve academic success and improve engagement and connectedness to school. Transition Team members collaborate with parents, staff, district administrators, and other educational partners to review and oversee individual progress of identified students to ensure they are college and/or career ready and engaged in and accessing the school system and all it has to offer our students. The Transition Teams provide support to students and families, by ensuring equal access to education and connecting them to resources through building relationships.

STUDENT RELATIONS LIAISONS (SRL) WORK WITH UNDER-SERVED STUDENTS

SRLs regularly monitor and communicate with school officials regarding academically at-risk students throughout the school year. Communication takes place between teachers, parents, and students to develop individual student plans for success at all grade levels. SRLs coordinate efforts with Counselors and Transition Teams. SRLs provide translation when needed for parents to fully engage in Student Study Team (SST), 504 meetings, School Attendance Review Board (SARB), and other meetings pertaining to their student's academic success.

INSTRUCTIONAL ASSISTANTS (IAs) WITHIN THE TRANSITION TEAMS

IAs assist certificated teachers with the presentation of learning materials and instructional exercises. In addition, they assist teaching staff in conducting lessons, classroom activities, and preparation of classroom projects. Our IAs work with individual or small groups of students reinforcing instructions given by teachers in reading, math, and other subjects. IAs are responsible for the following:

- Observing and monitoring behavior of students according to approved procedures
- Reporting progress regarding students' performance and behavior
- Maintaining positive behavior among students in the classroom and on the school grounds
- Supervising students at various school-wide activities such as field trips
- Serving as role models
- Providing emotional support, a friendly attitude, and general guidance
- Assuring the health and safety of students
- Assisting teaching staff in assessment programs and materials to meet the needs of students

When families partner with schools, teachers, and the community, we know their children succeed academically.

True to CUSD's Mission, to be a quality educational system providing the resources for ALL students to reach their potential in mind, body, and spirit, our Parent Resource Centers are designed to educate parents and guardians on how to foster a positive partnership with the school sites to best support their children at home and at school. Our aim is to provide strategies to support, advocate, and empower parents to engage fully in the educational lives of their children. The Parent Resource Centers offer training and support around a variety of topics including: the importance of parents being involved in their children's education; effective strategies for parent involvement; the role of the parent and of the teacher in influencing student performance; parent-teacher interaction at conferences; and college and career readiness. By participating in a variety of activities and lessons, parents and guardians increase their knowledge about the opportunities available to their students to help guide them through their educational journey and lead them to be college and career ready.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt new District school attendance boundaries as presented in Scenario Silver, effective at the start of the 2025-26 school year.

DISCUSSION:

In January 2024, the District began a community input process to gather feedback on possible adjustments to school attendance boundaries. The study, which started with a months-long process, was conducted at the request of the Governing Board in order to maximize the use of existing schools before building new schools, strive to balance enrollment at schools across the District with future growth patterns considered, and develop a new student attendance area for the Terry P. Bradley Educational Center.

The study looked at the under-capacity and over-capacity schools, anticipated growth areas across the District's 198-square-mile boundary, and enrollment patterns over time to determine the best distribution of attendance boundaries.

On January 26, 2024, two possible scenarios (Scenarios 1 and A) were released, and became the basis for initial meetings with the community in all five high school areas of Clovis Unified. Following a series of well-attended community meetings across the District, and thorough analysis of feedback collected at these meetings and online, District administration then released a revised scenario (Scenario Silver).

Scenario Silver addressed several areas of the District in which information gathered during community meetings indicated a compelling need for revision. Following the release of Scenario Silver, meetings were held at individual school sites to further discuss the reasons for changes recommended in Scenario Silver, as well as discuss areas where no changes were made. District staff also met with individual parents to discuss the boundary study.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Some fiscal impact will occur in the next five years to provide additional transportation paid out of the District's General Fund Budget. Cost savings will be realized through maximizing the use of existing facilities before building new schools.



Approve the contract with Teachstone to provide a full day of Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) training for all preschool staff on December 5, 2024.

DISCUSSION:

Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, all California State Preschool Programs (CSPP) will be required by the California Department of Education (CDE) to use the CLASS tool. CLASS describes and supports observations, measurement, and improvement of key features of classroom interactions. CLASS strives to provide emotionally safe and supportive interactions that assess children's behavior, engagement, and cognitive and language development. CLASS measures classroom interactions, defined as the moment-to-moment, back-and-forth exchanges that build and sustain relationships and support child development and learning. Implementation of CLASS will require high-quality staff development.

The District would like to enter into an agreement with Teachstone to provide one full-day "Introduction to Interactions for Educators" training to approximately 150 preschool staff. Trainings are limited to 30 participants per session. Each session incurs a cost of \$7,200 for a total cost of \$36,000.

DISCUSSION:

The Expanded Learning Club (ELC) program in Clovis Unified is funded through the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) fund to provide free access to before- and after-school learning opportunities for unduplicated students in Transitional Kindergarten through grade 6 at all elementary schools.

The program plan will provide the following opportunities for students and staff:

- An ELC Leadership Team to ensure program implementation meets the Expanded Learning quality standards
- Before- and after-school enrichment activities and learning opportunities at all 35 elementary sites during the school year
- A minimum of 30 days of full-day program during the intersession
- Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten students will have access to a nine-hour program
- Ongoing staff trainings
- Maintain and/or add facilities to meet the needs of increasing enrollment

Implementation began in 2022-23 with the original apportionment of \$7,000,000. The ongoing funding will be utilized to grow ELC programs by serving more students each year, and hiring, training, providing ongoing professional development for ELC staff, and enhancing the program facilities.

1- Safe and Supportive Environment

Clovis Unified School District utilizes the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program fund to establish the *Expanded Learning Club* (ELC) program which provides quality academic support and enrichment opportunities outside of the school day for students at all 35 elementary schools in the district. Title I schools and any Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) schools with an Unduplicated Pupil Percentage over 50 percent are granted a site-wide fee waiver that allows all students enrolled access to ELC at no cost.

The Expanded Learning Club's goal is for students to feel success and empowerment while gaining skills and strategies that will help them during the regular school day and prepare them academically and socially for ensuing years. Where feasible, staff are trained in the District's behavior intervention program and social emotional learning curriculum (e.g., Second Step). School-aligned health and safety procedures and policies are in place. Collaborative meetings are scheduled with site administration to further develop a safe and supportive environment. The collaboration between ELC staff, site administrators, and teachers help to identify participant strengths, interests, and learning styles.

Each site is provided with first aid kits and safety clipboards that contain emergency protocols and procedures as well as emergency contacts and a current student roster. The staff are required to wear their CUSD badge, whistles, uniform shirt, walkie-talkie, first aid fanny pack, and carry an emergency clipboard during program hours. Safety drills are conducted on a quarterly basis. The site lead must be CPR/First Aid certified as part of their ongoing training. Additional safety measures include a thorough registration process, attendance tracking system, and release procedures that are aligned with the District's release policies.

To ensure all students benefit from different opportunities that are offered during program hours, a student-to-staff ratio of no more than 17 to 1 in grade 1-6 and a ratio of 10 to 1 for Transitional Kindergarten (TK) and Kindergarten (K) is implemented.

The Child Development Department has invested in multiple well maintained and clean portables at each school site dedicated to ELC programs. Through the strong partnership with site administrators, the staff has been granted access to regular classrooms during the after-school portion of the program.

The program supervisors conduct monthly portable inspections. Findings from portable inspections are used to make decisions about maintenance and repairs of portables. Program growth, due to increased student needs, may require the addition of new portables when fiscally possible, at sites that can accommodate a new building.

2- Active and Engaged Learning

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to experience active and engaged learning that either supports or supplements, but does not duplicate, the instructional day.

Hands-on lessons and activities are designed based on student interests. Students are regularly involved in projects and activities that increase understanding and use of creativity, critical thinking, and information and communication technology. A specific focus is placed on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) topics, as well as art (both performing and visual) and Social-emotional learning (SEL) skills. Many collaborative partnerships are established with community vendors through annual contracts to support the enrichment component of our program. Students have access to regular instructional day online resources such as iReady Math and Reading and Accelerated Reading (AR) through their student portal, Clever.com.

3- Skill Building

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to experience skill building.

Academic support for students is a priority reflected in the daily schedule. The academic support is aligned and designed to complement the regular school day and focus on meeting proficiency in the California State Content Standards. Students may have up to one hour to complete their homework. The staff collaborates with classroom teachers on student homework completion. On-site credentialed teachers are recruited and contracted to provide targeted academic intervention for students in the after-school programs. Lessons provided are aligned to the California State Content Standards and may have assessments as part of the student progress monitoring process. Students are offered reading and writing opportunities. Literacy activities are at least 15-30 minutes per day for students. Students are given opportunities to practice literacy skills using additional resources such as Accelerated Reader (AR), iReady, and READ 180.

4- Youth Voice and Leadership

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to engage in youth voice and leadership.

Students have opportunities to share their viewpoints, concerns, or interests in many ways that help the staff create and establish program expectations and practices. Staff may provide informal and/or formal surveys to students to gauge their interests in what they would like to experience in ELC. Programs have student leaders serve as facilitators for enrichment activities such as clubs, service-based learning projects, and talent shows.

5- Healthy Choices and Behaviors

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to engage in healthy choices and behaviors. Describe how students will be served nutritious meals and/or snacks during the ELO-P hours of programing.

Through the partnership with the district's Campus Catering Department, nutritious snacks and meals are offered to all participating students. The staff collaborates with the school to ensure that their healthy practices and program activities are aligned with the school wellness plan. Just like a regular school day, physical education and fitness activities are implemented daily. Teachers are contracted by stipends to provide age-appropriate competitive athletic opportunities for students in grades 4-6. These athletic opportunities are available by sport on a quarterly basis.

6- Diversity, Access, and Equity

Describe how the program is designed to address cultural and linguistic diversity and provide opportunities for all students to experience diversity, access, and equity. Describe how the ELO-P will provide access and opportunity for students with disabilities.

All students enrolled in elementary school are eligible to participate in ELC. Information such as program schedules, fees, locations, and the parent handbook are updated regularly and available on the Clovis Unified School District website under the Child Development Department tab. All elementary schools have a direct link to the Child Development website on their home page. Information posted on the website is accessible in various languages.

During the month of March, program supervisors host parent information meetings at each elementary school to share information about ELC and how to complete an application for their student(s). Informational flyers are translated in Spanish and Hmong and sent home to parents in each school community. Based on the needs of the parents, interpreters are made available at the parent information meetings. The application for ELC is accessible to all parents through their Parent Connect portal starting in April. Students identified as unduplicated pupils are given priority acceptance into programs until facility and/or staffing capacity is reached. Waitlists are created and the remaining students will be added to the program as more staff are hired.

Program supervisors are intentional in hiring staff to reflect the students being served. Staff are trained and encouraged to create positive partnerships with students and families. The various cultures and backgrounds of students are celebrated through activities and lessons that promote positive culture and acceptance.

The partnership between the parents, site administration, and program supervisors help in identifying and providing extra support for any student with academic and/or behavioral challenges including students with an Individualized Educational Plan (IEP). The Behavior Consultation Team (BCT), comprised of a psychologist and two Paraprofessionals, is another resource to support staff and students. The BCT is called upon to assess challenging situations, and to coach and model strategies to support students who display significant struggles. When appropriate, an intervention strategy may include hiring more staff to support specific student needs.

7- Quality Staff

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to engage with quality staff.

The ELC leadership team works diligently to recruit, hire, and retain quality staff. Candidates must meet the minimum requirements of the District and go through a thorough interview process prior to obtaining a position in ELC. New staff members hired during the year will attend mandatory training before reporting to their site assignments. All staff are evaluated twice during their probationary period and must meet the job performance standards to obtain permanent status. Credentialed teaching staff and paraprofessional personnel involved in the program at the site level meet the Elementary and Secondary Education Act qualifications for their position. In addition to the required district online training courses, multiple training opportunities are available to staff throughout the school year. Staff serving as Instructor Lead 2, Instructor Lead 1 or TK/K instructors have additional targeted training throughout the year.

8- Clear Vision, Mission, and Purpose

Describe the program's clear vision, mission, and purpose.

Vision

Clovis Unified School District's Expanded Learning Club strives to be the benchmark for excellence in Expanded Learning programs for students in elementary school.

<u>Mission</u>

The mission of Expanded Learning Club is to provide a safe and supportive expanded learning environment that fosters educational and enrichment opportunities for all students.

<u>Purpose</u>

ELC offers academic support, health and wellness, and enrichment components. The academic support component consists of homework assistance and targeted academic intervention in the focus area chosen by the school site. The health and wellness component consists of physical fitness and education along with a healthy snack. The enrichment component consists of STEM, clubs, community events, service-learning projects, community partners, and much more.

The needs of the community, students, parents, and school are identified through various sources such as annual surveys, parent advisory committee, and student surveys. Once the needs are identified by the site administrators and site supervisor, the focus of the program is established along with the target groups.

Program Goals

- 1. Provide a safe, healthy environment, both physically and emotionally.
- 2. Provide fun and engaging activities for all students.
- 3. Support student academic achievement through standards-based academic and enrichment activities that are aligned with the regular school day.
- 4. Promote parent and community involvement.

Engaged or Will Engage Educational Partners

The program has engaged and will continue to engage its educational partners in the creation of the program's mission, vision, goals, and expected outcomes based on the needs of the specific community. This process will occur through various meetings on a monthly, quarterly, and/or annual basis at the regional, district, and school site level. Annual surveys are sent out to all educational partners to provide input and feedback for the improvement of their site-specific program and the District programs.

Other means of engaging educational partners include sharing information at various Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings at the site and district level; English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), School Attendance Review Team (SART), Intercultural Diversity Advisory Council (IDAC), District Migrant Education Parent Advisory Committee (DMEPAC), District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), District Advisory Committee (DAC), and Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP).

9- Collaborative Partnerships

Describe the program's collaborative partnerships. Local educational agencies are encouraged to collaborate with non-LEA entities to administer and implement ELO-P programs.

Community partnerships are critical components to improve the quality of our programs. Monthly site lead, regional, and school site principal meetings ensure a strong relationship with collaborative partners.

Expanded Learning Club conducts a formal annual program assessment based on the 12 Quality Standards of Expanded Learning in California. The program data and evaluation results are shared with educational partners for feedback. The ELC leadership team collects and utilizes data to influence program planning and goal setting. Evaluation outcomes are used to prioritize future work around program design, professional development, and program practices. Results from the assessment are the driving force behind the Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Action Plan. CQI Action Plans are created in the Fall and implemented throughout the Spring.

11- Program Management

Describe the plan for program management.

The ELC leadership team works collaboratively with the site and district administration to assess and utilize funding for their program to support the vision, mission, and goals. The program supervisors ensure each site meets the requirements for providing academic support, enrichment as well as health and wellness activities.

The program plan is updated annually using information from a variety of sources. ELC sites administer student, parent, teacher, and site staff surveys annually. These surveys afford the ELC leadership team an opportunity to evaluate, review and reflect on their program from an internal point of view and collaborate with all educational partners to improve program quality. Other indicators used for evaluation include attendance rates, expenditures, staff development opportunities, parent participation, student achievement, and recommendations for continued improvement. Based on a comprehensive analysis of data and information, the ELC leadership team will identify effective practices and list areas needing improvement.

The ELC leadership team is committed to promoting excellence and high expectations for all students and work to ensure meaningful involvement in decision-making by students, teachers, parents, and community members. The evaluations are shared with, the CUSD Governing Board, District administrators, and staff.

Fiscal Accounting and Reporting

An effective management and fiscal organizational structure is in place to implement policies, procedures, and practices to ensure the successful operation of ELC programs based on program goals, vision, and design. The ELC leadership team is comprised of a Director, Assistant Director, multiple program supervisors and business support team working together to ensure programs adhere to local, state, and federal guidelines.

Reporting requirements and a financial analyst ensures that fiscal, accounting, and record keeping requirements are maintained. The financial analyst and ELC Coordinator work together to ensure all reports are completed by the due dates and ensure the District complies in all areas of spending. The fund will be fiscally monitored through the District's financial system (Munis) and is able to create the financial reports necessary to meet the reporting requirements.

Existing After School Education and Safety (ASES) and 21st Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) Elementary and Middle School grantees.

ASES, 21st CCLC Elementary/Middle School, and the ELO-P should be considered a single, comprehensive program. Under the guidance of the Child Development Director, The ELC Leadership team is comprised of a Director, Assistant Director, multiple program supervisors and business support team to support the school sites. The ELC Leadership team ensures the implementation of one comprehensive and universal expanded learning program using designated ELO-P funds.

Currently, two school sites have both ASES and 21st CCLC programs that serve students only during the after-school portion of the day. The ELO-P funding will expand the existing services to include learning opportunities by adding more capacity to the after-school program and offer services to Transitional Kindergarten/Kindergarten students.

Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten

Programs serving transitional kindergarten or kindergarten pupils shall maintain a pupil-to-staff member ratio of no more than 10 to 1. (EC Section 46120[b][2][D]). ELC supports the Transitional Kindergarten (TK) students and Kindergarten (K) students in need of a nine hour program at all 35 elementary school sites in the District.

Recruitment & Training

The ELC staff serving the TK/K programs have prior work experience with the age group and/or have obtained Early Childhood Education credits. The staff participates monthly in targeted training courses to support their understanding and implementation of developmentally appropriate practices.

<u>Curriculum</u>

The ELC staff collaborate closely with our California State Preschool Programs team, site TK/K teacher teams and site administration to develop experiences that meet the unique needs of Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten students.

Participating students will receive academic support with early literacy development, hands-on art projects, and develop their social-emotional skills.

EC Section 46120(b)(2):

[LEAs] operating expanded learning opportunities programs may operate a before school component of a program, an after-school component of a program, or both the before and after school components of a program, on one or multiple school sites, and shall comply with subdivisions (c), (d), and (g) of Section 8482.3, including the development of a program plan based on the following;

[LEAs] shall agree that meals made available through a program shall conform to the nutrition standards of the United States Department of

Agriculture's at-risk afterschool meal component of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (42 United States Code [U.S.C.] Section 1766).

EC Section 8482.6:

Every pupil attending a school operating a program . . . is eligible to participate in the program, subject to program capacity. A program established . . . may charge family fees. Programs that charge family fees shall waive the cost of these fees for pupils who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, for a child that is a homeless youth, as defined by the federal McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. Section 11434a), or for a child who the program knows is in foster care. A program that charges family fees shall schedule fees on a sliding scale that considers family income and ability to pay.

(A) An educational and literacy element in which tutoring, or homework assistance is provided in one or more of the following areas: language arts, mathematics, history and social science, computer training, or science.

(B) An educational enrichment element that may include, but need not be limited to, fine arts, career technical education, recreation, physical fitness, and prevention activities.

WHEREAS, every child must be ready to learn, having their basic needs first met so that they may achieve optimal physical, emotional, social, and educational development and be prepared for full participation in society; and

WHEREAS, through public schools, communities can work together in unprecedented ways to eliminate barriers to learning and to provide access to healthcare for children and families; and

WHEREAS, California's credentialed school nurses are pivotal members of a coordinated school health system, delivering services to children and eliminating health disparities and barriers and supporting academic success for all children; and
