Title: Contract for Engineering Services to Develop Construction Drawings for the Transportation Department's CNG Fueling Station

Approve a contract for the development of bid documents for a new CNG fueling station to serve the District's Transportation Department.

DISCUSSION:

Title: New Board Policy No. 2410 - Suicide Prevention

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt new Board Policy No. 2410 – *Suicide Prevention*, and its accompanying Administrative Regulation and Exhibit, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

With the passage of Assembly Bill (AB) 2246, all public schools in California serving students in grades 9-12 are required to adopt a Board Policy related to suicide prevention efforts of the District. Board Policy No. 2410 – *Suicide Prevention* and its accompanying Administrative Regulation and Exhibit were developed in collaboration with school-based mental health experts, staff members, students, parents, and the local mental health and medical community. The new Board Policy No. 2410 establishes standards for prevention, intervention and postvention efforts, along with procedures for training staff.

The Board Policy and Administrative Regulation meet the standards established by AB2246, and will be reviewed by members of the Curriculum Board Subcommittee at their June meeting.

CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

STUDENT SERVICES RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES Health & Welfare STUDENT SUICIDE PREVENTION

PURPOSE: To establish guidelines and set expectations related to student suicide prevention, intervention and postvention.

The Governing Board recognizes that suicide is a leading cause of death among youth and should be taken seriously. In order to attempt to reduce suicidal behavior and its impact on students and families, the Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures relating to prevention, intervention, and postvention that specifically address the needs of high risk groups, including but not limited to the following:

- (A) Youth bereaved by suicide.
- (B) Youth with disabilities, mental illness, or substance abuse disorders.
- (C) Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning youth.
- (D) Youth experiencing homelessness or in out-of-home settings, such as foster care.
- (E) Youth with a history of suicide ideation or attempts.
- (F) Youth who have suffered traumatic experiences.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a plan that addresses procedures in suicide prevention, intervention and postvention. School and community stakeholders, school-employed mental health professionals, and suicide prevention experts will be involved in in planning, developing, implementing, and evaluating the District's procedures for suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention.

Staff Training

The Superintendent or designee shall develop staff training in suicide awareness and prevention. Suicide prevention training for staff shall be designed to help staff identify and respond to students at risk of suicide. The training shall be offered under the direction of a district counselor/psychologist and/or in cooperation with one or more community mental health agencies.

Suicide prevention training shall be provided to teachers, counselors, and other district employees who interact with students in grades 7-12. The training materials shall include how to identify appropriate mental health services (both at the schoolsite and within the larger community) and when and how to refer youth and their families to those services. These training materials may include training programs that can be completed through self-review of suitable suicide prevention materials. No school district employee will be trained to act outside the school district employee's authorization and scope of the employee's credential or license. School district employees will not diagnose or treat mental illness unless the employee is specifically licensed and employed to do so.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

To ensure the policies regarding suicide prevention are properly adopted, implemented, and updated, the District shall appoint an individual (or team) to serve as the suicide prevention point of contact for the District. In addition, each school shall identify at least one staff member to serve as the liaison to the District's suicide prevention point of contact, and coordinate and implement suicide prevention activities on their specific campus. This regulation shall be reviewed and revised as indicated, at least annually in conjunction with school and community stakeholders, school-employed mental health professionals, and suicide prevention experts.

Prevention

1. Messaging about Suicide Prevention

Messaging about suicide may have an impact on suicidal thinking and behaviors. Consequently, school districts and their schools should critically review all materials and resources used in awareness efforts to ensure they align with best practices for safe messaging about suicide.

2. Suicide Prevention Training and Education for Staff

The Clovis Unified School District, along with its partners, has carefully reviewed available staff training to ensure it promotes a mental health model of suicide prevention and emphasizes the overall impact of mental health on suicide prevention rather than focusing solely on stress factors to explain suicide.

Suicide prevention training shall be provided to teachers, counselors, and other district employees who interact with students in, at minimum, grades 7-12, which shall include the following:

- i. The training shall occur annually and include the risk factors and warning signs of suicide, suicide prevention, intervention, referral, and postvention.
- ii. All suicide prevention trainings shall be offered under the direction of school-employed mental health professionals (e.g., school counselors, school psychologists, or mental health clinicians) who have received advanced training specific to suicide. District staff conducting these trainings may choose to collaborate with one or more county and /or community mental health agencies in conducting these trainings. Staff training can be adjusted year-to-year based on previous professional development activities and emerging best practices.

- iii. At the beginning of employment, all new staff shall participate in training on the core components of suicide prevention (identification of suicide risk factors and warning signs, prevention, intervention, referral, and postvention). Thereafter, on an annual basis, teachers, counselors, school psychologists, and staff members shall attend a minimum of one-hour general suicide prevention training. Core components of the general suicide prevention training shall include:
 - a. Suicide risk factors, warning signs, and protective factors;
 - b. How to talk with a student about thoughts of suicide;
 - c. How to respond appropriately to youth who have suicidal thoughts;
 - d. Emphasis on immediately referring (same day) any student who is identified to be at risk of suicide;
 - e. Emphasis on reducing stigma associated with mental illness and how early prevention and intervention can drastically reduce the risk of suicide;
 - f. Education about local resources available to support and assist students identified as at risk of suicide;
 - g. Reviewing trends and current culture as it impacts suicide prevention, intervention and postvention;
 - h. Reviewing the data annually to look for any patterns or trends of the prevalence or occurrence of suicide ideation, attempts, or death. Data from the California School Climate, Health, and Learning Survey (Cal-SCHLS) should also be analyzed to identify school climate deficits and drive program development. See the Cal-SCHLS Web site at http://cal-schls.wested.org/.
- iv. In addition to initial orientations to the core components of suicide prevention, ongoing annual professional development for identified staff should be provided appropriate to individual roles and responsibilities and should include the following components:
 - a. The impact of traumatic stress on emotional and mental health;
 - b. Common myths and misconceptions about suicide;
 - c. School and community suicide prevention resources;
 - d. Mass media trends related to suicide ideation:

- e. Appropriate messaging about suicide (correct terminology, safe messaging guidelines);
- f. The factors associated with suicide (risk factors, warning signs, protective factors);
- g. How to identify youth who may be at risk of suicide;
- h. Appropriate ways to interact with a youth who is demonstrating emotional distress or is suicidal. Specifically, how to talk with a student about their thoughts of suicide and (based on District guidelines) how to respond to such thinking; how to talk with a student about thoughts of suicide and appropriately respond and provide support based on District guidelines;
- i. District-approved procedures for responding to suicide risk (including multi-tiered systems of support and referrals). Such procedures should emphasize that the suicidal student should be constantly supervised until a suicide risk assessment is completed;
- j. District-approved procedures for responding to the aftermath of suicidal behavior (suicidal behavior postvention);
- k. Responding after a suicide occurs (suicide postvention);
- 1. Resources regarding youth suicide prevention;
- m. Emphasis on stigma reduction and that early prevention and intervention can drastically reduce the risk of suicide;
- n. Emphasize that any student who is identified to be at risk of suicide is to be immediately referred (same day) for assessment while being constantly monitored by a staff member.
- v. The professional development also shall include additional information regarding groups of students identified by the school and available research to be at elevated risk for suicide. These students include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. Youth impacted by suicide or suicide attempts or ideation;
 - b. Youth with a history of suicide ideation or attempts;
 - c. Youth with disabilities, mental illness, or substance abuse disorders;
 - d. Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or questioning youth;

- e. Youth experiencing homelessness or in out-of-home settings, such as foster care;
- f. Youth who have suffered traumatic experiences.

3. Employee Qualifications and Scope of Services

School employees must act only within the authorization and scope of their credential or license. While it is expected that school professionals are able to identify suicide risk factors and warning signs, and to prevent the immediate risk of a suicidal behavior, treatment of suicidal ideation is typically beyond the scope of services offered in the school setting. In addition, treatment of the mental health challenges often associated with suicidal thinking typically requires mental health resources beyond what schools are able to provide.

4. Specialized Staff Training (Assessment)

Additional professional development in suicide risk assessment and crisis intervention shall be provided to school-employed mental health professionals (school counselors, psychologists, mental health clinicians, and nurses) such as:

- Clovis Support and Intervention Coordinators
- Peer Counseling Advisors
- School Psychologists

Throughout all trainings, the need for confidentiality will be emphasized.

5. Parents, Guardians, and Caregivers Participation and Education

- a. To the extent possible, parents, guardians, and caregivers should be included in all suicide prevention efforts. At a minimum, schools shall share with parents/guardians/caregivers the District's suicide prevention policies and procedures.
- b. This suicide prevention policy shall be prominently displayed on the District's Web page and school web pages, and included in the parent handbook.
- c. Parents, guardians, and caregivers should be invited to provide input on the development and implementation of this policy.
- d. All parents, guardians, and caregivers should have access to suicide prevention training through the District's Parent Academies and other parent education fairs that addresses the following:
 - i. Suicide risk factors, warning signs, and protective factors;

- ii. How to talk with a student about thoughts of suicide;
- iii. How to respond appropriately to the student who has suicidal thoughts. Such responses shall include constant supervision of any student judged to be at risk for suicide and referral for an immediate suicide risk assessment.

6. Student Participation and Education

The District, along with its partners and with student input, will carefully review available student curricula to ensure it promotes the mental health model of suicide prevention.

- a. Under the supervision of school-employed mental health professionals, and following consultation with county and community mental health agencies, students shall:
 - i. Receive developmentally appropriate, student-centered education about the warning signs of mental health challenges and emotional distress at various levels throughout, at minimum, grades 7-12.
 - ii. Receive developmentally appropriate guidance regarding the District's suicide prevention, intervention, and referral procedures.
- iii. The content of the education shall include:
 - Coping strategies for dealing with stress, trauma, and any other perceived stressors;
 - How to recognize behaviors (warning signs) and life issues (risk factors) associated with suicide and mental health issues in oneself and others;
 - Help-seeking strategies for oneself and others, including how to engage schoolbased and community resources and refer peers for help;
 - Emphasis on reducing the stigma associated with mental illness and that early prevention and intervention can drastically reduce the risk of suicide.
- iv. Student-focused suicide prevention education can be incorporated into classroom curricula (e.g., health classes, freshman orientation classes, science, and physical education).
- v. The school will support the creation and implementation of programs and/or activities on campus that raise awareness about mental wellness and suicide prevention (e.g., Mental Health Awareness Weeks, Peer Counseling Programs, Freshman Success Programs, National Alliance on Mental Illness on Campus High School Clubs).

Intervention/Assessment/Referral

1. Staff

- a. If the student is in imminent danger, the student at risk will be immediately escorted to an individual trained in suicide intervention or a call shall immediately be made to a School Resource Officer and, if necessary, call 911.
- b. At minimum, two staff members at each grade 7-12 site who have received advanced training in suicide intervention shall be designated points of contact regarding potential suicidal intentions. For purposes of this policy, these points of contact will be referred to as Suicide Prevention Liaisons (SPL). Whenever a staff member suspects or has knowledge of a student's suicidal intentions, they shall promptly notify the designated SPL. If an on-site SPL is unavailable, the staff member shall promptly notify site principal who will be responsible for contacting the appropriate resource.
 - Under normal circumstances, the SPL shall notify the principal, another school administrator, school psychologist or school counselor. The names, titles, and contact information of multi-disciplinary crisis team members shall be distributed to all students, staff, and parents/guardians/caregivers and be prominently available on school and district websites.
- c. The principal, another school administrator, school counselor, school resource officer, school psychologist, mental health clinician, or nurse shall then notify, if appropriate, the student's parents/guardians/caregivers as soon as possible and shall refer the student to mental health resources in the school or community.
- d. Whenever a staff member suspects or has knowledge of a student's suicidal intentions, they shall promptly notify the SPL.
- e. Students identified as experiencing suicidal ideation shall not be left unsupervised.
- f. A referral process should be prominently disseminated to all staff members, so they know how to respond to a crisis and be knowledgeable of the school and community-based resources.

2. Parents, Guardians, and Caregivers

A referral process should be prominently disseminated to all parents, guardians, and caregivers, so they know how to respond to a crisis and be knowledgeable of the school and community-based resources. The District will provide yearly opportunities for parent education that promotes understanding the signs of suicide ideation and eminent suicide risk.

3. Students

Students shall be encouraged to notify a staff member when they are experiencing emotional distress or suicidal ideation or when they suspect or have knowledge of another student's emotional distress, suicidal ideation, or attempt.

4. Parental Notification and Involvement

In the event that, while at school, a student is identified as at risk of suicide, school-based mental health professionals shall work in collaboration with the school administration and school resource officer to notify parents/guardians, if appropriate.

Each school within the District shall identify a process to ensure continuing care for the student identified to be at risk of suicide. The following steps should be followed to ensure continuity of care:

- After a referral is made for a student, school staff shall verify with the parent/guardian/caregiver that follow-up treatment has been accessed.
 Parents/guardians/caregivers will work with appropriate school staff to follow Clovis Unified's Student Transition and Return (STAR) Procedure.
- If parents/guardians/caregivers refuse/neglect to access treatment for a student who has been identified to be at-risk for suicide or in emotional distress, the suicide point of contact (or other appropriate school staff member) will meet with parent/guardian/caregiver and school resource officer to identify barriers to treatment (e.g., cultural stigma, financial issues) and work to rectify the situation and build understanding of the importance of care. If follow-up care for the student is still not provided, school staff should consider contacting a Child Protective Agency (CPA) to report neglect of the youth.

5. Action Plan for In-School Suicide Attempts

If a suicide attempt is made during the school day on campus, it is important to remember that the health and safety of the student and those around him/her is critical. The following steps should be implemented by the SPL and/or school site administrator:

- Remain calm, remember the student is overwhelmed, confused, and emotionally distressed;
- Move all other students out of the immediate area;
- Under normal circumstances, immediately contact the SPL who shall notify the principal, another school administrator, school psychologist or school counselor;
- Contact school resource officer or call 911 and give them as much information about any suicide note, medications taken, and access to weapons, if applicable;

- If needed, provide medical first aid until a medical professional is available;
- Parents/guardians/caregivers, if appropriate, should be contacted as soon as possible;
- Do not send the student away or leave them alone, even if they need to go to the restroom;
- Listen and prompt the student to talk;
- Review options and resources of people who can help;
- Be comfortable with moments of silence as you and the student will need time to process the situation;
- Provide comfort to the student;
- Promise privacy and help, and be respectful, but do not promise confidentiality;
- Student should only be released to parents/guardians/caregivers or to a person who is qualified and trained to provide help.

6. Action Plan for Out-of-School Suicide Attempts

If school staff become aware of an out-of-school suicide attempt by a student, it is crucial that staff protects the privacy of the student and maintains a confidential record of the actions taken to intervene, support, and protect the student. The following steps should be implemented:

- Contact the parents/guardians/caregivers and offer support to the family;
- Discuss with the family how they would like the school to respond to the attempt while minimizing widespread rumors among teachers, staff, and students;
- Obtain permission from the parents/guardians/caregivers to share information to ensure the facts regarding the crisis is correct;
- Designate a staff member to collaborate with the District's Communication Office and family in response to media requests;
- Provide care and determine appropriate support to affected students;

• Offer to the student and parents/guardians/caregivers the Student Transition and Return (STAR) Procedures for re-integration to school.

vi. Supporting Students after a Mental Health Crisis

After a crisis has been identified, it is crucial that careful steps are taken to help provide the mental health support for the student and to monitor their actions for any signs of suicide. The following steps should be implemented by SPL and/or school site administration after the crisis has happened:

- Treat every threat with seriousness and approach with a calm manner; make the student a priority;
- Listen actively and non-judgmental to the student. Let the student express his or her feelings;
- Acknowledge the feelings and do not argue with the student;
- Offer hope and let the student know they are safe and that help is provided. Do not promise confidentiality or cause stress;
- Explain calmly and get the student to a trained professional, guidance counselor, or designated staff to further support the student;
- Keep close contact with the parents/guardians/caregivers and mental health professionals working with the student;
- Contact District Lead Psychologists if additional support is needed.

vii. Re-Entry to School After a Suicide Attempt

A student who threatened or attempted suicide is at a higher risk for suicide in the months following the threat or attempt. A streamlined and well planned re-entry process ensures the safety and well-being of students who have previously attempted suicide and reduces the risk of another attempt. The District's Student Transition and Return (STAR) Procedures will be followed to ensure support is provided to students in the period after a suicide attempt. Involving students in planning for their return to school provides them with a sense of control, personal responsibility, and empowerment.

The following steps shall be implemented upon re-entry:

 Obtain a written release of information signed by parents/guardians/caregivers and providers;

- Confer with student and parents/guardians/caregivers about any specific requests on how to handle the situation;
- Inform the student's teachers about possible days of absences;
- Allow accommodations for student to make up work (be understanding that missed assignments may add stress to student);
- Mental health professionals or trusted staff members should maintain ongoing contact to monitor student's actions and mood:
- Work with parents/guardians/caregivers to involve the student in an aftercare plan.

Responding After a Suicide Death (Postvention)

A death by suicide in the school community (whether by a student or staff member) can have devastating consequences on students and staff. Therefore, it is vital that we are prepared ahead of time in the event of such a tragedy. The suicide point of contact for the District shall ensure that each school site adopts an action plan for responding to a suicide death as part of the general Crisis Response Plan. The Suicide Death Response Action Plan (Suicide Postvention Response Plan) needs to incorporate both immediate and long-term steps and objectives.

- 1. Components of the Suicide Postvention Response Plan shall include:
 - a. Identification of staff member to confirm death and cause (school site administrator);
 - b. Steps for contacting family of the deceased (within 24 hours);
 - c. Steps for enacting the Suicide Postvention Response Plan, including an initial meeting of the District/school Suicide Postvention Response Team;
 - d. Process for notification of all staff members;
 - e. Coordination of all-staff meeting, to include:
 - Notification (if not already conducted) to staff about suicide death
 - Emotional support and resources available to staff
 - Notification to students about suicide death and the availability of supports services
 - Prepare staff to respond to needs of students:

- o Review of protocols for referring students for support/assessment;
- o Talking points for staff for notification of students;
- o Resources available to students (on and off campus);
- f. Process to identify students significantly affected by suicide death and other students at risk of imitative behavior;
- g. Process for communicating with the larger school community;
- h. Funeral considerations for family and school community;
- i. Process for responding to memorials based on best practices in postvention response;
- j. Identification of media spokesperson;
- k. Process for utilizing and responding to social media outlets:
 - Identify which platform students at the school are using to respond to suicide death;
 - Identification/training of staff and students to monitor social media outlets;
- 1. Long-term suicide postvention response to include:
 - Process for dealing with important dates (i.e., anniversary of death, deceased birthday, graduation, or other significant event);
 - Supporting siblings, close friends, other students, and staff of deceased student;
 - Dealing with requests for long-term memorials and large-scale assemblies;
- m. Process for communication with other agencies such as other school districts, police departments, coroner's office, and other community mental health agencies.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve new Board Policy No. 4805 – Debt Management, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

With the passage of Senate Bill 1029 and its corresponding changes to Government Code Section 8855(i), California public issuers, including school boards, are required to adopt a Board Policy outlining the circumstances and processes to be used whenever the agency undertakes qualifying debt. In addition, any subsequent filing with the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission (CDIAC) must contain certification that such a Board Policy has been adopted addressing the following:

- Purposes for which debt proceeds may be used.
- Types of debt that may be issued.
- Relationship of debt to capital improvement program or budget.
- Policy goals relating to planning and objectives.
- Internal Control Procedures to ensure proceeds are applied to intended use.

The new Board Policy No. 4805 – *Debt Management*, which is attached, was reviewed by members of the Budget Board Subcommittee.

DEBT ISSUANCE AND MANAGEMENT POLICY

PURPOSE:

To provide a functional tool for debt management and capital planning, as well as to enhance the District's ability to manage its debt in a conservative and prudent manner.

This Debt Management Policy (the "Debt Policy") of the Clovis Unified School District (the "District") was approved by the District's Governing Board on July 12, 2017. The Debt Policy may be amended by the Governing Board as it deems appropriate from time to time in the prudent management of the debt of the District.

1. Findings

This Debt Policy is intended to ensure the District's compliance with Government Code Section 8855(i), effective as of January 1, 2017, and shall govern all debt undertaken by the District.

The District hereby recognizes that a fiscally prudent debt policy is required in order to:

- Maintain the District's sound financial position.
- Ensure the District has the flexibility to respond to changes in future service priorities, revenue levels, and operating expenses.
- Protect the District's credit-worthiness.
- Ensure that all debt is structured in order to protect both current and future taxpayers, and the District's general fund, from poorly structured or overly costly capital financings.
- Ensure that the District's debt is consistent with the District's planning goals and objectives, facilities planning documentation and/or budget, as applicable.

2. Debt Policies

A. Purposes for Which Debt May Be Issued

- (i) <u>Long-Term Debt</u>. Long-term debt may be issued to finance the construction, acquisition, and rehabilitation of capital improvements and facilities, equipment and land to be owned and operated by the District.
 - (a) Long-term debt financings are appropriate when the following conditions exist:
 - When the project to be financed is necessary to provide basic services.

- When the project to be financed will provide benefit to constituents over multiple years.
- When total debt does not constitute an unreasonable burden to the District and its taxpayers.
- When the debt is used to refinance outstanding debt in order to produce debt service savings or to realize the benefits of a debt restructuring.
- (b) Long-term debt financings will not generally be considered appropriate for current operating expenses and routine maintenance expenses.
- (c) The District may use long-term debt financings subject to the following conditions:
 - The project to be financed must be approved by the District's governing board.
 - For obligations issued on a tax-exempt basis, the debt shall meet the following requirement of federal tax law: The weighted average maturity of the debt (or the portion of the debt allocated to the project) will not exceed the average useful life of the project to be financed by more than 20%.
 - The District estimates that the identified source of repayment, whether property taxes, general fund revenues or other identified source, will be available to service the debt through its maturity.
 - The District determines that the issuance of the debt will comply with applicable state and federal laws.
- (ii) Short-term debt. Short-term debt may be issued to provide financing for the District's operational cash flows in order to maintain a steady and even cash flow balance. Short-term debt may also be used to finance short-lived capital projects; for example, the District may undertake lease-purchase financing for equipment. Short-term debt may also be undertaken for interim or bridge financings, such as bond or grant anticipation notes, provided that the District Board is provided with the related long term financing and repayment plan in connection with approval of such financings.
- (iii) <u>Financings on Behalf of Other Entities</u>. The District may also find it beneficial to issue debt on behalf of or in concert with other governmental agencies, nonprofit corporations or other authorities in order to further the public purposes of District. In such cases, the District shall take reasonable steps to confirm the financial feasibility of the project to be financed and the financial solvency of any borrower

and that the issuance of such debt is consistent with the policies set forth herein.

B. Types of Debt That May be Issued

The following types of debt are allowable under this Debt Policy:

- general obligation bonds
- bond or grant anticipation notes
- lease revenue bonds, certificates of participation, lease and sublease and lease-purchase transactions
- other revenue bonds and certificates of participation
- tax and revenue anticipation notes
- land-secured financings, such as special tax revenue bonds issued under the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended

The District may from time to time find that other forms of debt would be beneficial to further its public purposes and may approve such debt without an amendment of this Debt Policy.

Debt shall be issued as fixed rate debt unless the District makes a specific determination as to why a variable rate issue would be beneficial to the District in a specific circumstance.

C. Relationship of Debt to Capital Improvement Program and Budget

The District is committed to long-term capital planning. The District intends to issue debt for the purposes stated in this Debt Policy and to implement policy decisions incorporated in the District's capital budget and master facilities plan.

The District shall strive to fund the upkeep and maintenance of its infrastructure and facilities due to normal wear and tear through the expenditure of available operating revenues. The District shall seek to avoid the use of debt to fund infrastructure and facilities improvements that are the result of normal wear and tear.

The District shall integrate its debt issuances with the goals of its capital improvement or master facilities plan by timing the issuance of debt to ensure that projects are available when needed in furtherance of the District's public purposes.

The District shall seek to issue debt in a timely manner to avoid having to make unplanned expenditures for capital improvements or equipment from its general fund.

D. Policy Goals Related to Planning Goals and Objectives

The District is committed to long-term financial planning, maintaining appropriate reserves levels and employing prudent practices in governance, management and budget administration. The District intends to issue debt for the purposes stated in this Policy and to implement policy decisions incorporated in the District's annual operations budget.

It is a policy goal of the District to protect taxpayers and constituents by utilizing conservative financing methods and techniques so as to obtain the highest practical credit ratings (if applicable) and the lowest practical borrowing costs.

The District will comply with applicable state and federal law as it pertains to the maximum term of debt and the procedures for levying and imposing any related taxes, fees and charges, as applicable, and in the case of refinancing of existing debt, achieving savings as may be required by law or achieving other objectives of substantial benefit to the District, the rationale for which is presented to the governing board at the public meeting at which the proposed refinancing is considered.

E. Internal Control Procedures

<u>Compliance with Debt Policy.</u> The District's business official is responsible for implementing and monitoring compliance with this Debt Policy.

Compliance with SEC Rule 15c2-12. The District may have undertaken, and may undertake in the future, obligations for continuing disclosure pursuant to SEC Rule 15c2-12. The District's business official will periodically review the requirements of Rule 15c2-12 and each of the District's undertakings, and ensure that annual and other periodic filings which may be required are done in a complete and timely manner. The District's business official may monitor, prepare and make the District's required filings, or may engage a third party dissemination agent to assist the District to make complete and timely filings. It shall be the policy of the District as implemented by the District's business official to have in place a process for full and complete compliance for the benefit of bondholders or other investors in District debt.

<u>Compliance with Federal Tax Laws</u>. The District shall have a policy of full compliance with all applicable federal tax law requirements. In connection with prior and new debt issues, the District's business official shall review applicable federal tax requirements, including requirements relating to arbitrage and rebate compliance.

<u>Investments</u>. Proceeds of debt issued by the District shall be invested only in accordance with law and as permitted in the resolution or other document governing the issuance of the debt.

Expenditure of Proceeds of Debt. It is the policy of the District to ensure that proceeds of

District debt is spent only on lawful and intended uses. Expenditures of proceeds of debt may only be made by submission of requests for draws to the holder of the proceeds of debt, whether the county, or other trustee, fiscal agent, custodian or financial institution, that identify the amount, purpose and payee of a proposed draw. Each draw request shall be approved and signed by the Superintendent, the business official or such officer's written designee. The District shall maintain records of the purpose and amount of each draw.

<u>CDIAC Reporting</u>. The District has a policy of full compliance with public reporting requirements. This includes specifically for debt sold on or after January 21, 2017, providing annual reports to the California Debt and Investment Advisory meeting the requirements of Government Code Section 8855(k).

UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES REGARDING PROGRAMS/DISCRIMINATION

PURPOSE: To establish uniform complaint procedures for certain state and federal

programs and unlawful discrimination.

The Board recognizes that the District has primary responsibility for insuring that it complies with state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The District shall follow Uniform Complaint Procedures pursuant to state regulations when addressing complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation and bullying or failure to comply with the law regarding the following:

- 1. Adult Basic Education
- 2. Consolidated Categorical Aid Programs
- 3. Migrant Education
- 4. Career Technical and Technical Education and Career Technical Training Programs
- 5. Child Care and Development Programs
- 6. Child Nutrition Programs
- 7. Special Education Programs
- 8. Federal School Safety Plan Requirements
- 9. Student Fees
- 10. Local Control and Accountability Plans (LCAP)
- 11. Foster Youth
- 12. Homeless Youth
- 13. Reasonable Accommodation to Nursing Mothers
- 14. Assignment to Course without Educational Content or to Course Previously Satisfactorily Completed (without meeting certain requirements)
- 15. Elementary Physical Education Instructional Minutes
- 45.16. Graduation Requirements for Former Juvenile Court School Students

The District shall also follow the Uniform Complaint Procedure when addressing complaints of unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation and bullying on the basis of any of the grounds or actual or perceived characteristics identified in Education Code section 220 or Penal Code section 422.55, or any other bases provided by law, or on the basis of a person's association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics, in any program or activity conducted by the District, which is funded directly by, or that receives or benefits from any state financial assistance. The District shall investigate and seek to resolve complaints at the local level.

The District's Uniform Complaint Procedure does <u>not</u> apply to the following types of complaints:

1. Complaints regarding materials used in the instruction of pupils (see Board Policy No. 3306, Reconsideration of Learning Resources)

- 2. Complaints regarding alleged deficiencies related to instructional materials, the conditions of a facility that is not maintained in a clean or safe manner or in good repair, teacher vacancies or misassignments, and the provision of intensive instruction and services to students who have not passed one or both parts of the high school exit examination after the completion of grade 12 (see Board Policy No. 9211, Uniform Complaint Procedures Regarding Areas Included in Williams Settlement)
- 3. Employee complaints alleging sexual harassment (see Board Policy No. 6301, Sexual Harassment)
- 4. Pupil complaints alleging sexual harassment (see Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 2111, Sexual Harassment), and
- 5. Complaints by the public regarding District personnel and practices (see Board Policy No. 9207, Formal Complaints Regarding District Personnel and Practices).

Discrimination issues involving Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 shall be referred to the U. S. Office of Civil Rights (OCR). Title IX complaints shall only be referred to the OCR if there is no state discrimination law or regulation at issue. Unless otherwise negotiated through a memorandum of understanding/agreement, a preliminary inquiry and/or investigation concerning these complaints shall be conducted by OCR. The complainant shall be notified by certified mail if the complaint has been transferred to OCR by the Superintendent.

Complaints concerning special education programs shall be addressed in accordance with the regulations and procedures of the Special Education Local Planning Area (SELPA). However, the SELPA's complaint procedure must comply with the Uniform Complaint Procedures outlined in this policy.

Complaints concerning student fees or LCAPs may be filed anonymously if the complaint provides evidence or information leading to evidence to support an allegation of noncompliance with the applicable legal requirements governing student fees or LCAPs.

The Board prohibits retaliation in any form for the filing of a complaint, the reporting of instances of discrimination, harassment, intimidation or bullying, or for participation in complaint procedures. Such participation shall not in any way affect the status, grades, or work assignments of the complainant. For allegations of retaliation based on the filing of a complaint, the District also shall follow the Uniform Complaint Procedures.

The Board acknowledges and respects pupil and employee rights to privacy. Complaints shall be investigated in a manner that protects these rights. The identity of any complainant alleging discrimination, harassment, intimidation, retaliation or bullying shall be kept confidential as appropriate and permitted by law.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees designated to receive and investigate complaints are knowledgeable about the laws and programs for which they are responsible. Such employees may have access to legal counsel as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

Responsibilities of Complainant

The Complainant:

- 1. Shall receive the District Complaint Procedures.
- 2. Shall file the Complaint in writing and follow the steps in the District Complaint Procedures Administrative Regulation.
- 3. May appeal to the state agency for resolution if he/she is dissatisfied with the decision of the District.
- 4. May appeal to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction if the complainant is dissatisfied with the determination of the state agency.

Responsibilities of the District

The District:

- 1. Shall designate a staff member to be responsible for complaint resolution.
- 2. Shall develop complaint procedures consistent with *California Code of Regulations, Title 5*, sections 4600-4670.
- 3. Shall inform pupils, employees, parents/guardians, the district advisory committee, school advisory committees, appropriate private school officials or representatives, and other interested parties at least annually of approved Uniform Complaint Procedures, including the opportunity to appeal the District's decision or to seek civil law remedies, including, but not limited to, injunctions, restraining orders, or other court orders which may be available to complainant. The District will make this information available by publication in its informational materials, including the Student and Parent Rights and Responsibilities Handbook given to each pupil upon registration in the District and at the beginning of each school year. This information shall also be available on the District's web site at www.cusd.com. Notification to appropriate private school officials or representatives shall be given at the annual consultation meeting between CUSD and private school officials.
- 4. Shall resolve the complaint through an informal complaint process or through the formal complaint procedures by completing an investigation and a written report within 60 calendar days of receipt of a formal complaint. The time period for completion may be extended by written agreement of the complainant.
 - The District's decision shall be written in English and in the language of the complainant whenever feasible or as required by law.
- 5. Shall submit, on notification of an appeal, information requested by the California State Department of Education (CDE):
 - a. The original complaint.
 - b. A copy of the District's decision.
 - c. A summary of the nature and extent of the investigation conducted by the District, if not covered in the District's decision.
 - d. A copy of the investigation file, including but not limited to, all notes, interviews and documents submitted by the parties or gathered by the investigator.

- e. A report of any action taken to resolve the complaint.
- A copy of the Uniform Complaint Procedures.
- g. Such other relevant information as the CDE may require.
- 6. May appeal to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction if the District is dissatisfied with the state agency's decision.

UNIFORM COMPLAINT PROCEDURES REGARDING AREAS INCLUDED IN THE WILLIAMS SETTLEMENT

PURPOSE: To establish a uniform complaint procedure to resolve complaints specified in

Education Code 35186 regarding the Williams Settlement.

The Board recognizes that the District has primary responsibility for insuring that it complies with state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. Persons responsible for conducting investigations shall be knowledgeable about the matters that they are assigned to investigate. The District shall follow this complaint procedure to identify and resolve deficiencies in four three primary areas: textbooks and instructional materials, the condition of a facility that poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health and safety of students or staff, and teacher vacancy and misassignment, and the provision of intensive instruction and services to students who have not passed one or both parts of the California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE) after the completion of grade 12.

This complaint procedure does <u>not</u> apply to the following types of complaints:

- 1. Complaints regarding the appropriateness of learning resources or other instructional materials (see Board Policy No. 3306, Reconsideration of Learning Resources)
- 2. Employee complaints alleging sexual harassment (see: Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 6301, Sexual Harassment)
- 3. Pupil complaints alleging sexual harassment (see: Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 2111, Sexual Harassment)
- 4. Complaints by the public regarding personnel or practices of the District (see: Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 9207, Formal Complaints Regarding District Personnel and Practices)
- 5. Complaints alleging District violation of certain state and federal programs and unlawful discrimination (see: Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 9208, Uniform Complaint Procedures Regarding Programs/Discrimination)

The Board prohibits retaliation in any form for the filing of a complaint or for participation in complaint procedures. Such participation shall not in any way affect the status, grades, or work assignments of the complainant.

The Board acknowledges and respects pupil and employee rights to privacy. Complaints shall be investigated in a manner that protects these rights. The identity of any complainant shall be kept confidential as appropriate and permitted by law; however, complaints and responses shall be considered public records.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees designated to receive and investigate complaints are knowledgeable about the laws and programs for which they are responsible.

Such employees may have access to legal counsel as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

Responsibilities of Complainant

The Complainant:

- 1. Shall receive a copy of the Uniform Complaint Procedures without charge.
- 2. Shall file the complaint in writing with the principal of the school or his or her designee and follow the steps in the Uniform Complaint Procedures Administrative Regulation 9211.
- 3. If dissatisfied with the resolution of the school Principal or Superintendent's designee, may describe the complaint to the Governing Board during public comment at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board.
- 4. If dissatisfied with the resolution proffered by the school Principal or Superintendent's designee, and if the complaint involves a condition of a facility that poses an emergency or urgent threat as defined in Education Code section 17592.72(c)(1), has the right to file an appeal to the Superintendent of Public Instruction within fifteen calendar days of receiving the report, who shall provide a written report to the State Board of Education describing the basis for the complaint and, as appropriate, a proposed remedy for the issue described in the complaint.

Responsibilities of the District

The District:

- 1. Shall designate a staff member to be responsible for complaint resolution.
- 2. Shall develop complaint procedures consistent with California Code of Regulations, Title 5, sections 4600-4687.
- 3. Shall inform parents and the public at least annually of approved Uniform Complaint Procedures, including the opportunity to appeal the District's decision or to seek civil law remedies, including, but not limited to, injunctions, restraining orders, or other court orders which may be available to complainant. The District shall make this information available by publication in its informational materials, including the Student and Parent Rights and Responsibilities Handbook given to each pupil upon registration in the District and at the beginning of each year. This information can also be found at www.cusd.com.
- 4. Shall resolve a complaint with respect to alleged deficiencies related to instructional materials, the condition of a facility that poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health and safety of students or staff, and teacher vacancies and misassignments, and the failure to provide intensive instruction and services to students who have not passed one or both parts of the high school exit examination after the completion of grade 12, by completing an investigation and remedying all such valid complaints within 30 working days from the date the complaint was received and providing a written response within 45 working days.
- 5. Shall report summarized data on the nature and resolution of all complaints to the Governing Board and the County Superintendent of Schools on a quarterly basis. The report shall include the number of complaints by general subject area with the number of resolved and unresolved complaints. These summaries shall be publicly reported on a quarterly basis at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. The complaints and responses shall be available as public records.

Title: Annual Agreement with the College Board – PSAT/NMSQT Assessment

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Superintendent or designee to enter into an Early Participation Program (EPP) with the College Board to allow intermediate and high school students to take the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Tests (PSAT/NMSQT).

DISCUSSION:

Aim 1 of Clovis Unified's Strategic Plan is to "Maximize Achievement for ALL Students." One of the action efforts included in Aim 1 is the preparation of students for college and career readiness, including participation in college-readiness assessments. Two college readiness assessments are the PSAT 8/9 and PSAT/NMSQT. Students receive results from these assessments which help them to prepare for the actual assessment and serve as an indicator as to which secondary courses best meet their individual needs. Intermediate school students will take the PSAT 8/9 during their eighth grade year. High school students will take the same test during their sophomore or junior year.

If approved, Clovis Unified will pay exam fees which will allow students to participate twice in college-readiness exams during their secondary school experience.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

The cost of administering the PSAT 8/9 is \$24,570, for which funding is included in the 2017-18 Assessment Department Budget. Funding for the PSAT/NMSQT is \$43,147 which will be funded through the College and Career Readiness Grant.

Title: Annual Agreement with JDT Consultants

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize Clovis Unified to enter into an annual agreement with JDT Consultants, a non-public agency, to provide educationally related therapeutic behavior intervention services to eligible Special Education students as described in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs).

DISCUSSION:

In order to meet the goals of their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), some Clovis Unified students require educationally related therapeutic behavior intervention services. JDT Consultants provides such services to students as identified in their IEPs. Based on an increased need for services, it is recommended that the annual agreement with JDT Consultants be approved.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

A consultant fee of up to \$75,000 has been included in the 2017-18 Special Education Budget.



Title: Annual Agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize Clovis Unified to enter into an annual agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates to provide educationally related mental health services to eligible Special Education students as described in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs).

DISCUSSION:

In order to meet the goals of their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), some Clovis Unified students require educationally related mental health services by licensed clinicians. To increase the efficiency and effectiveness of Clovis Unified's delivery of these services, it is recommended that the annual agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates be approved.

Educational Mental Health Associates is managed by Sherri Gibson, Ph.D., as a non-public agency in order to attract qualified clinicians to provide educationally related mental health services for Special Education students.

The contract amount includes all costs associated with the provision of these services, including licensed therapists and/or clinicians. Furthermore, use of Educational Mental Health Associates meets all compliance requirements established by the State of California.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

The agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates, which is not to exceed \$589,000 for the 2017-18 fiscal year, has been included in the 2017-18 Special Education Budget. This amount is equal to the projected educationally related mental health service needs of identified Special Education students.

Title: Placement of a Special Education Student in a Non-Public

School

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize Clovis Unified to enter into an agreement for a student to attend Creative Alternatives, a non-public school in Fresno, California.

DISCUSSION:

Based on the Individualized Education Program (IEP) recommendations, it has been determined that the following Special Education student requires services in a non-public school in order to address the student's unique educational needs for the 2017-18 school year:

Clovis Unified will review the above case every six months to determine the appropriateness of the placement and whether a less restrictive placement can meet the student's unique educational needs.

Title: Agreement with Corwin, a SAGE Company, for Visible Learning Plus Professional Development Program

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Superintendent or designee to enter into an agreement with Corwin, a SAGE Company, to provide the Visible Learning Plus professional development program Districtwide, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Aim 1 of the District's Strategic Plan is to "Maximize Achievement for ALL students." One way to do this for Clovis Unified students is through effective professional development for teachers.

The Curriculum, Instruction, and Accountability Department is recommending that Clovis Unified implement Professor and Education Researcher John Hattie's Visible Learning Plus program, which is provided by Corwin, a SAGE Company. Hattie's research, centered on classroom instruction, has led to a framework that allows school teams to determine the instructional needs of their students. Hattie's Visible Learning Plus is an in-depth coaching model designed for school teams to systematically examine effective instructional practices in order to determine impact on student achievement and learning. By considering the effects of the practices of teachers and leaders, schools will be able to make substantial gains in student achievement.

Following the initial year of Visible Learning program implementation in 2017-18, Visible Learning consultants have designed a customized program of instruction and coaching through which professional development will be sustained and expanded using District facilitators to support each new and continuing school site.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Funding is provided entirely through the Educator Effectiveness Grant, not to exceed \$117,000.

Title: Agreement with Corwin, a SAGE Company, for Doug Fisher Professional Development

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Superintendent or designee to enter into an agreement with Corwin, a SAGE Company, to provide Districtwide professional development workshops with Professor and Teacher Leader Doug Fisher, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Aim 1 of Clovis Unified's Strategic Plan is to "Maximize Achievement for ALL students." Effective professional learning for teachers in grades Transitional Kindergarten-12 focuses on the alignment of the curriculum, instruction and assessments to meet the academic needs of every student which support closing the achievement gap. Through the implementation of research-based best practices that have been determined to accelerate student learning, CUSD will maximize achievement for all students.

The Curriculum, Instruction, and Accountability Division is recommending that Clovis Unified implement Doug Fisher's research on effective close and critical reading and writing strategies, text dependent questioning, collaborating with peers, and building readers' stamina across content areas.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Funding entirely through the Educator Effectiveness Grant, not to exceed \$48,000.



Title: Addendum to CART Operating Agreement

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve an addendum to the Center for Advanced Research and Technology (CART) Operating Agreement, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Clovis Unified, Fresno Unified and CART entered into an Operating Agreement dated March 25, 2015, which included a description of the scope of services and financial resources to be contributed by each party. The Agreement was effective for a two-year period, through June 30, 2016. This addendum is intended to ratify the contributions made by the parties for the 2016-17 school year and approve contributions for the 2017-18 school year.

In addition, the addendum provides that each party's approval of its annual budget in the future, including the contributions to CART, will be deemed to be each party's renewal of the Operating Agreement for another school year. This will assist in streamlining the renewal process and provide for efficient administration of the agreement.

Included in the District's 2017-18 budget.

ADDENDUM TO CART OPERATING AGREEMENT

THIS ADDENDUM ("Addendum") to the CART Operating Agreement dated March 25, 2015 ("Operating Agreement"), is made and entered into as of July 12, 2017, between FRESNO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, each, a "District," and hereinafter collectively referred to as "the Districts," and the CENTER FOR ADVANCED RESEARCH AND TECHNOLOGY, hereinafter referred to as "CART."

Notwithstanding any provisions in the Operating Agreement to the contrary, the following provisions shall prevail:

- 1. <u>Duration.</u> The duration of the Operating Agreement is hereby extended for the 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 fiscal years, commencing on July 1, 2016 and ending on June 30, 2018. Thereafter, the approval of the annual budget by each District and by CART shall be deemed to operate as an extension of the Operating Agreement for an additional fiscal year, commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 of each successive year.
- 2. <u>District's Payment of Fees to CART</u>. The Districts hereby ratify the fee that each District paid to CART in the amount of \$786,557 for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. The Districts agree that they shall each pay a fee in the amount of \$807,951.14 to CART for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. This amount shall be paid in twelve (12) equal monthly installments of \$67,329.26 each. This amount shall be increased, effective July 1 of each renewal term of the Operating Agreement thereafter, by the percentage of the increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for California, as published by the California Department of Finance. Should there be any reduction in CART's receipt of Fresno CTE Operations Funding, the Districts will share equally to cover the amount of any reduced funding.
- 3. CART's Payments to Clovis Unified. CART hereby ratifies the fee it paid to Clovis Unified School District for the 2016-2017 fiscal year in the sum of \$100,000 for administrative services, and in the sum of \$75,000 for maintenance services rendered by Clovis Unified School District. CART agrees to pay to Clovis Unified School District in the 2017-2018 fiscal year the sum of \$100,000 for administrative services, and the sum of \$75,000 for maintenance services to be rendered by Clovis Unified School District. CART shall pay Clovis Unified \$25,000 each quarter (September 1, December 1, March 1, and June 1) for administrative services. CART shall pay Clovis Unified \$18,750 each quarter (September 1, December 1, March 1, and June 1) for maintenance services. Maintenance services include routine restricted maintenance for the inside of the building, including maintenance of restrooms, plumbing electrical, floors, and air conditioning. Maintenance services do not include deferred maintenance and items such as major plumbing or air conditioner replacement. The annual amount shall be adjusted effective July 1 of each fiscal year of this Agreement; the adjustment will be based on an actual cost estimate, but will not exceed a 5% increase from the prior year.

CART further ratifies the fee it paid to Clovis Unified School District for the 2016-2017 fiscal year in the sum of \$22,241 for landscaping and grounds maintenance, which includes mowing the grass, trimming trees, and minor repairs to fencing, signage,

sprinklers, and concrete and asphalt. CART agrees to pay Clovis Unified in the 2017-2018 fiscal year the sum of \$23,353 for landscaping and grounds maintenance. Payments will be made in equal amounts each quarter (September 1, December 1, March 1 and June 1). The annual amount shall be adjusted effective July 1 of each fiscal year of this Agreement; the adjustment will be based on an actual cost estimate, but will not exceed a 5% increase from the prior year.

- 4. Computer Refresh Plan. CART has developed a five year plan to provide cutting edge technology for students. CART will review and update the plan each year in order to provide for the following five years. The plan will include a proposal for sharing of expenses among CART, Fresno Unified and Clovis Unified. The plan and the proposal for sharing expenses must be presented by CART to the Districts by February 15 each year and thereafter must be approved by the Districts before it can be implemented. The Districts agree to each pay \$100,000 during the 2017-2018 school year towards the technology plan. Adjustments to this annual amount will be effective July 1 of each fiscal year of this Agreement and will incorporate CART's technology plan.
- 5. <u>Teachers</u>. The parties will work together to evaluate and determine the number of teachers needed and the number of teachers to be provided by each District each fiscal year.
- 6. <u>Amendment</u>. The terms of this Addendum shall not be amended in any manner except by written agreement signed by the parties.
- 7. Other Terms. All other terms and provisions of the Operating Agreement shall remain in full force and effect for the term of this Addendum and each renewal term of the Operating Agreement thereafter.

Title: Provisional Internship Permits

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the Provisional Internship Permits for recommended teaching candidates, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

The Provisional Internship Permit (PIP) is available when the employing agency knows that there will be a teacher vacancy, yet is unable to recruit a suitable candidate. The expectations of the employer and the employee are higher since these individuals will be the teacher of record and should be on a credential track. The focus of the document is meeting subject matter competency. Once a candidate completes subject matter competency, the candidate can be employed on a document such as a District Internship Credential. Candidate requirements include the following: (1) Bachelor's degree or higher; (2) passage of the California Basic Educational Skills Test (CBEST); and (3) specific course work or experience, explained in detail on the Provisional Internship Permit information leaflet.

As required by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC), employing agencies offering employment to candidates on a Provisional Internship Permit are required to: (1) conduct a diligent search for a suitable credentialed teacher or qualified internship teacher; (2) provide the PIP holder with orientation, guidance, and assistance as specified in Title 5 Section 80026.5; (3) assist the PIP holder in developing a personalized plan (kept on file at the local level) through an agency-defined assessment leading to completion of subject matter competence; and (4) counsel the PIP holder to enroll in subject matter training. Clovis Unified School District administration hereby declares that a diligent search was conducted for suitable credentialed teachers or qualified internship teachers. Upon Board approval, District administration asserts that steps 2-4, as outlined above, will be completed.

School districts submitting Provisional Internship Permit requests must include verification that a notice of intent to employ the applicants in the identified positions was made public. The public notice must include the following information: (1) the name of the applicants; (2) the assignment in which the applicants will be employed including subject(s), grade level(s), and school site; and (3) a statement that the applicants will be employed on the basis of a Provisional Internship Permit. Clovis Unified intends to submit Provisional Internship Permit requests for the following teacher candidates, contingent upon administration and Board approval:

A Provisional Internship Permit shall be issued for one year and may not be renewed.

Lastly, public school districts must include a copy of the agenda item presented to the Governing Board of the district. The agenda item must be presented in a public meeting as an Action item and include the information above for each individual for whom the permit will be requested. The permit request must include a signed statement from the Superintendent or designee that the item was acted upon favorably. To assure that each permit request receives individual review and approval by the Governing Board, the agenda item may not be part of the Consent agenda.

Title: Authorization to Enter into Lease Agreement via Piggyback from Educational and Institutional Cooperative Services (E&I)

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the purchase/lease of supplies and equipment utilizing various contracts from Educational and Institutional Cooperative Services (E&I) and recognize that it is in the District's best interest to make the purchase without advertising for bids pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 20118.

DISCUSSION:

E&I awarded piggyback contract bids for various items, with many contracts valid through 2022. Current and subsequent orders would only be placed against these bids as long as it remains in the best interest of the District.

Section 20118 of the California Public Contract Code provides that the Governing Board of a school district may authorize the purchase of equipment, materials, and supplies from another public corporation or agency without advertising for bids if the other public corporation or agency has complied with all Public Contract Codes regarding the purchase of similar equipment, materials and supplies.

E&I competitively bids for many types of services and supply contacts with organizations throughout the country. The District can utilize E&I Contract CNR01366 with Xerox. The E&I contract allows for reduced pricing on equipment needed by the District. Contract pricing is better with the E&I contract, cuts order lead time, and would result in a budget savings of approximately \$95,300 on needed equipment.

The lease agreement would also provide added value of approximately \$200,000 in District Graphic Arts Print Shop equipment and services, including high-volume units, sheet-fed modules, a shrink wrapper, Duplo cutter and variable data software solutions, in addition to providing copiers to be utilized to support special events such as CIF State Track and Field, State Swim and Dive, and State Cross Country Championships hosted by Clovis Unified. New site and department copiers are also included to increase efficiency.

The District will receive new site and department copiers as well as the new high volume copiers for the Print Shop. This new equipment will provide more efficient equipment at the sites and departments. The lease will be a five (5) year agreement with Xerox.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Current monthly average cost is \$117,235.58. Proposed monthly average cost would be \$115,647.25, resulting in savings of approximately \$95,300 over a five (5) year term, as well as

approximately \$200,000 of added value in District Print Shop equipment and services over the current agreement. Included in the 2017-18 Adopted Budget.
