CA School Dashboard Local Indicators

Grant dollars provide the necessary funding for 8th and 11th grade students to take the PSAT to help identify students with Advanced Placement potential. School sites analyze every students schedule to determine if unduplicated student groups and individuals with exceptional needs are enrolled in a broad course of study. COS utilizes the Get Focused...Stay Focused model to help student's identity their interests, goals and develop a high school course plan. This plan is used for academic coaching and advisory efforts throughout high school.

- 2. Clovis Online will continue to utilize Q web and academic counselors to ensure all students have access to, and are enrolled in, a broad course of study. Annual master schedule audits and Board Policy 3403, Placement in Ninth Grade Mathematics Course establishes protocols and identify any differences across school sites and student groups with access to, and enrollment in, a broad course of study. Placement concerns are addressed and corrected as soon as concerned is placed.
- 3. An analysis of Q web identified the following barriers that are preventing Clovis Online School in providing access to a broad course of study for all students: the nature of virtual schooling, funding, students that need credit recovery, prerequisite courses and lack of access to true CTE Pathways, student social emotional needs.
- 4. New Actions/Services were added to the LCAP in response to the analysis schedules in order ensure access to a board course of study for all students. Revisions included: additional funding for Transition Teams, academic counseling increases, intervention needs, and review of pre-req classes for AP and Honors courses.

Briefly describe the LEA's current strengths and progress in this area and identify a focus area for improvement, including how the LEA will improve the engagement of underrepresented families:

Both quantitative and qualitative data were used to determine strengths and weakness in the focus area of *Building Relationships*. Feedback was gathered through parent surveys as well as district-wide and individual site parent meetings. Parents completed a total of 11,841 surveys during the 2020-21 school year. When asked to respond to the statement, "This school provides a quality education for my child." Ninety-two percent agreed or strongly agreed. To ensure underrepresented families are able to access and contribute to the continuous improvement of their individual student, school, and the district are encouraged and invited to participate in several parent led organizations on the campuses including School Site Councils, English Learner Advisory Committees, and Intercultural Diversity Advisory Council (IDAC). According to the most recent parent survey, 100% of parents participated in a school meeting during the year.

The district is aware of the many cultures on our campuses and strives to create a positive learning environment for all students. According to our parent survey, 80% of parents agree or strongly agree with the statement "This school communicates the importance of respecting cultural beliefs and practices." When presented with the statement, "The staff at my school respects the differences in students' race, ethnicity, or cultural background," 76% of our parents agreed or strongly agreed with the statement. Seventy-three percent of our parents agree or strongly agree with the statement "your school values your race or ethnicity." CUSD has identified both as an area for improvement.

To ensure underrepresented families are reflected in the learning process District employees participate in professional learning around cultural proficiency which is one component of the District Accountability Program. Various trainings include culturally relevant teaching, implicit bias training, sustaining Cultural and Linguistic Pedagogy, and the use of culturally relevant text. A concerted effort has been made to adopt district curriculum reflecting the cultures of our schools, state, and nation. Thirty-two different languages are spoken in CUSD with the majority being Spanish speakers. The district has made a concerted effort to ensure each school site has the resources to communicate with non-English speaking parents. In addition, the district employs a full-time liaison for our migrant families. For the past four years the District has had a Coordinator of Community Relations. This position serves as a barometer for district climate and the needs of our underrepresented families. Aim III of the district strategic plan is to "hire, develop, sustain, and value a high-quality workforce." The district will continue to support staff to learn about each family's strengths, cultures,

languages, and goals for their children. CUSD determined a need to focus on communication and a system for equity and access to school for our families. We learned from feedback that we need additional resources for translation services. This year was unique, and we had amazing attendance at our site meetings because of the convenience of conducing the meetings via Zoom. Sites have strong relationships with families and because of those strong relationships, trust is established. More work is needed in understanding the needs and how to respond to our underrepresented families. Focusing on these areas will help support the improvement of engagement of underrepresented families.

Building Partnerships for Student Outcomes

All statements rated Initial Implementation.

Briefly describe the LEA's current strengths and progress in this area and identify a focus area for improvement, including how the LEA will improve the engagement of underrepresented families:

Feedback was gathered from a variety of representative stakeholders. For the area of Building Partnerships for Student Outcomes both strengths and areas for improvement were identified. Based on the 20-21 parent survey, 82% of our parents believe their child's reading skills are improving and 84% feel their child's math skills are improving. Parents and students participate in parent/teacher/counselor conferences each year. During this time, student achievement and behavior is discussed. Seventy-six percent of our parents attended this conference. Of those, 67% believed the conference was helpful. If more intensive focus is needed the parent and school personnel will meet with additional support in the form of Student Study Teams, 504 Meetings or Individualized Education Plans (IEP) meetings. Eighty-one percent of parents responding to the 20-21 survey believe they know how to get help for their child if they are struggling in school. Clovis Unified hosts Parent Academies where parents attend and select from multiple lessons offered. Again, these topics are suggested by parents and are designed to educate families on academic, legal, or wellness issues. Past topics include substance abuse, mental health, suicide, and ways to support your students' academic success. Clovis Unified also operates Community Resource Centers where families receive additional support. The CUSD Transition Program provides the opportunity to focus on students and their families who might not seek support but would benefit from mentoring and increased connection to school resources. Transition Team members can connect students and families with resources they need to be successful in the classroom, at home, and in the community. Transition Team members collaborate with parents, staff, district administrators, and other stakeholders to review and monitor individual student progress ensuring students are college and/or career ready. Through mentorship, Transition Counselors and Student Relations Liaisons strive to develop meaningful relationships with students.

Stakeholder feedback suggests a need for continuing community mentorship with our students (i.e. the Browder Scholar Program). Feedback also supports the expansion and extension of Learning Opportunities both during the school day and in an extended year setting. Distance learning necessitated schools engaging parents in different ways to build community support. Survey data identify areas of strengths as parent nights (both virtual and in-person), parent support groups, and transitions teams. Areas of growth included: additional time for parent-conferences and improving accessing to school information. One focus will be to improve communication using multiple avenues which may include the new Clovis Unified phone app, website, translation services, and newsletters to increase awareness of school and district resources available.

Seeking Input for Decision Making

All statements rated Initial Implementation.

Briefly describe the LEA's current strengths and progress in this area and identify a focus area for improvement, including how the LEA will improve the engagement of underrepresented families:

CUSD values all stakeholders when Seeking Input for Decision Making. Annually, CUSD parents, students,

and staff are asked to complete a survey providing feedback on a variety of topics. The results are used as one component of the decision-making process. This year 11,841 parents completed school year. Using the results, each school identifies strengths and areas for improvement. In addition, parents provide input at regularly scheduled meetings on the campus. Families and school staff participate in both parent clubs and the School Assessment and Review Team (SART). SART exists to provide a forum to learn about a school and to dialogue with leadership regarding the operation of the school. Each Clovis Unified school has a SART committee, which serves as a vehicle of communication and as an advisory body to the principal. Intercultural Diversity Advisory Council (IDAC) draws from community members representing the schools at the district level climate assessment meetings. The primary purpose of the Intercultural Diversity Advisory Council (IDAC), originally formed in 1988 as the Intercultural Advisory Council, is to assist in the formation and review of policies that assure non-discriminatory practices in all operational areas of the Clovis Unified School District. Its further mission is to assist in improving the cultural environment of the school and the district. The district holds two Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) meetings with representation from all school sites and a representative sample of our demographics across the district. Parents have direct input identifying the LCAP priorities.

Students in grades 4-11 take an annual survey which is designed to gather perceptional data around school climate, self-efficacy, school connectedness, and classroom instruction. Selected questions mirror the parent survey allowing for the comparison of student and parent perception when making decisions. During the 20-21 school year 18,188 students participated in the district-wide survey for a return rate of 68%. Graduating seniors are also surveyed and provide input directly to the CUSD Governing Board at an annual Student Voice Board Workshop.

Although, survey responses are generally positive, CUSD believes the number of actual participants needs to be improved to ensure all stakeholders have a voice in the decision-making process. Site leaders and staff build effective relationships with their parent and community. We must continue to identify ways to connect with our underrepresented families. Reaching out to those who have not traditionally responded is key to improving the engagement of underrepresented families.

Purpose & Mission

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a college readiness system for elementary and secondary students. The AVID program is designed to increase the number of students who succeed in higher education and life beyond high school. Although AVID serves all students, the elective focus is on students in the academic middle. In the AVID elective class, students receive daily instruction and support in academic strategies like writing to learn, inquiry, collaboration, organization skills, and critical reading. AVID trained educators teach students academic and social skills to help them develop the habits and behaviors needed to succeed in learning rigorous curriculum. The AVID College Readiness System is a catalyst for developing a school culture that closes the opportunity gaps many students face while preparing all students for success in a global society. AVID fosters not only a culture of college awareness, but also a common belief in student success, positive/safe environments and high expectations for ALL. The systemic approach is designed to support students and educators as they increase student learning and performance.


Board Approval/District Budgeting

The Clovis Unified School District Governing Board approved funding of the AVID program in the district at \$15,000 per area. Sites/area offices are able to adjust the budget in various areas without exceeding the allocation and typically spend the money on professional development for AVID Teachers and Administrators, supplies for students, fieldtrip opportunities for students, and tutorial services for students.

Technology is the Focus

"With every challenge is an opportunity for transformation." This year AVID has pulled together to do some amazing work and transform the AVID classrooms into a virtual learning environment. While we remain thankful for technology and what it has allowed us to do so effectively, we are most grateful to all the AVID Elective teachers who have used their growth mindset, energy, and passion to do incredible work during such a challenging time. Included in each site report is technology which served as everyone's focus area for this school year. The AVID tools were used to support all teachers across campus. Having strategies and resources to engage students in virtual, blended, and face to face learning helped make digital teaching just a little easier for our peers schoolwide. Teachers had the opportunity to attend online virtual professional learning on a monthly basis, including ongoing coaching support. Communities of common practice were established to foster networking not only in the District but also in the Western Region. These changes provided the opportunity to address areas that have been deficient in our District's Certification Process: Access to Digital Information and Technology as a Tool for Collaboration.

AVID teachers recognize that to be college and career ready in a tech-empowered world, students need to be effective digital collaborators. With the pre-existing structure, it was hard to accomplish that goal. With limited access to technology, students were unable to master collaboration skills in a simple, one and done lesson. They needed ongoing opportunities to learn and practice. They needed a climate and a culture that created a safe environment where they could make mistakes and feel supported to try again. Above all they needed guidance and support on this new learning journey and to be empowered with the critical life skill of collaboration. During this year, students have demonstrated the ability to access digital information from a variety of sources and are able to evaluate critically and competently in all content areas. Teachers have also become very proficient using technology and other information communication technology (ICT) tools to collaborate both synchronously and asynchronously. The next difficult road will be figuring out how to continue to use these new skills when returning to our full-time face to face instruction in hopes of taking us to an even better destination next year.

Buchanan Area

This year looks different than years past; however, Alta Sierra Intermediate (ASI) AVID continues to thrive. Specifically, ASI grew one more section with 20 students and added another elective teacher. This growth is something that the site will maintain, since more than 100 new applications for the upcoming 2021-2022 cohort were submitted. ASI AVID students also participated in a schoolwide week-long virtual college fair. It was the first of its kind which was coordinated by the ASI counseling team.

Most importantly, AVID students demonstrated resilience in many ways this year. For example, they transitioned from the in-person tutorial process to an online format. Despite forecasted setbacks, students went on to build rapport and familiarity with each other. A strong focus this semester academically has been college and career readiness, and we have been working on these skills collaboratively through several group projects. Many teachers on the ASI campus continued to use AVID Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, Organization and Reading strategies to support both virtually and in person learning. All in all, the students continue to teach all staff invaluable lessons about individual determination.

BHS AVID program "doubled down" and worked together to get through the challenge of distance learning. All 131 students were placed in five sections scheduled in two periods. The three AVID Elective teachers spent the semester team teaching. They provided one Zoom with 84 students and another period with 57. This format increased the level of critical thinking and collaboration across grade levels.

Despite a very challenging year, BHS is excited to earn a 92% retention rate of returning students for next year. The ratio of male to female students in the 10th -12th grade is representative to the school demographics: 40 Male and 43 Females. Bear Nation AVID is most excited to recognize 22 seniors at graduation who have earned an AVID cord. Even during a pandemic with 15 months of distance learning, these 22 students met the rigorous demands of the AVID program to earn this graduation recognition.



Clovis High Area

The AVID program at Clark looked different than in years past, but that did not prevent the AVID Site team from delivering all AVID program components to students. Clark Counseling team did an amazing job of taking over with the AVID students in Zoom sessions and managed to create an even greater high school and college awareness for students. Teachers also redesigned our recruitment efforts. As a result, the number of applications for the 2021-22 school year is the highest it has ever been. This spring the AVID Site team worked together to plan the first "Clark Summer Institute," which will be a 3-day professional learning opportunity for any staff member at Clark or Clovis High School (CHS).



The CHS AVID program worked to not only survive this year's circumstances but to thrive and grow. Students continued to challenge themselves with advanced courses and applied their AVID skills to their new way of learning. CHS even had a few students who achieved their first ever 4.0 GPA while in distance learning. AVID's organization, note taking, and cooperative group learning skills were invaluable.

CHS continued providing college field trips with virtual guided tours and speakers from several colleges. One of the best memories was when students participated in a joint Zoom session

with multiple classes during the week of Halloween. CHS had dress up days and played critical thinking games. Looking forward to next year, the enrollment in the AVID program appears strong. The site had more applications to the program and more students accepted than in previous years.

Reagan Educational Center (REC)

Like every AVID Elective team, the REC team focuses on using brain-based research and data to analyze success and revise future goals. With end of the year reflections, we are looking for evidence as proof that the students succeeded. This year, the REC team brainstormed all the digital platforms used to teach students and site team members throughout the year. These include Google Sites for eBinders with Google Sheets for grade analysis and goal setting, Jamboards and Padlet for collaboration and problem solving, Canva for multimedia presentations, and Story Board for interactive Literature and History Reviews.

REC was also fortunate this year to have several Smittcamp Scholars speak to classes about the "Women in Engineering" program at Fresno State. In addition, St. Mary's students, all of whom are enrolled in the credentialing program, conducted weekly Socratic seminars with the 8th graders for eight weeks. REC could boast about our increased GPA, high attendance rates, and leadership skills students demonstrated, but, after reading the seniors' reflections on their years in AVID ending with this "unique" year, we realized data is great, but relationships are better.

Just like many students, the fantastic senior class struggled with motivation, anxiety, loneliness, and stress. However, each of them thankfully relied on their "AVID village" to hold them accountable by encouraging, cajoling, listening to each other's concerns and knowing they had each other's "back." Kylie, a 6-year AVID student, said, "AVID has used the internet as an advantage to help us get through, and, it allowed opportunities for us to bond with Zoom, tutorials, and deep discussions of life goals." An AVID senior, Lea, explains "the weekly binder checks and tutorials helped push me to meet my academic deadlines and not procrastinate." Lea happily says her AVID family helps her "become the best version of myself" which is amazing in this year of challenges. Another senior agreed saying, "This is the class I felt most like a family we motivate each other this class is one of my best achievements and I will always be proud to be a part of it."

Further, Rylee, another 6-year senior, reflected on all the colleges they have visited throughout their time in the program including: UCLA, Long Beach State, Cal Poly, San Jose State, UC Merced, Sacramento State, St. Mary's, Stanislaus State, Stanford, UC, San Francisco, and of course, Fresno State. She believes all these visits helped determine her life path including two years of Clovis Community College and then a transfer to Cal Poly to fulfill her dreams of earning an engineering degree. Rhyzun, another 6-year AVID student said, "I believe AVID is the reason I am able to attend college." It has helped me get out of my comfort zone and engage more, push through oral presentations, and keep on top of my work. Instead of the **quarantine** restricting us, we were able to take advantage of it and turn it more into a chance to bond with one another." Lastly, another senior concluded "there is no group of people that I'd rather have than my current classmates and teacher for my last year of high school. I'm happy I stuck with it." Lea wraps it up for her graduating class by saying, "AVID is just one big motivational thing." I think we all need AVID in our lives right now!



Clovis North Educational Center (CNEC)

One of the things the CNEC did more this year than ever before included an increase in college presentations to the AVID students. Instead of college field trips normally scheduled, several schools met the students on Zoom and gave a thorough presentation of their respective institutions. Some of the schools that presented included: Grand Canyon University, Hope University, San Francisco State, Fresno State, Fresno Pacific, Humboldt State, Academy of Arts in San Francisco, and an automotive trade school in Colorado.

Another highlight was the use of new technology. Since students were online for most of the year, the AVID team learned about implementing new and different types of technology. Students conducted binder checks on Flipgrid. This eliminated the extended class time used for this purpose in person. Another platform students used was Jamboard. Students were able to collaborate more easily while using Jamboard during their tutorials. We also used Zoom to conduct interviews for recruitment and had parent meetings through Zoom, which allowed parents to attend from any location. Some of the teachers used Padlet to facilitate group discussions and as a digital platform for students to reflect on their learning. Additionally, CNEC continued to provide "College of the Month" boards in the hallways.





Clovis West Area

The Kastner AVID Site team has celebrated many victories during this challenging year. The team is comprised of a brand-new group of elective teachers, a new AVID Site Coordinator, a new principal, and some tremendous veteran staff members who have helped guide the team on this journey. Learning about the AVID program together has allowed the teachers to approach the curriculum with novelty and innovation. The teachers streamlined the tutorial process, took organization online and applied it to the Google Suite, and identified creative ways to keep our AVID students engaged in the support structure of Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, Organization, and Reading despite the challenges of online learning.

AVID Elective students have shown tremendous growth, especially in the areas of public speaking and Socratic-style questioning and debate. Students now look forward to lively Philosophical Chairs discussions. Christina Cline has done tremendous work with our EL students in her AVID Excel class—this is the first year this program has been implemented on the Kastner campus. With Christina as their guide, these students have dramatically increased their confidence and ability in the English language across subjects. With eagerness, we look forward to another year of continued growth, learning, and implementing the AVID program together!

At Clovis West High School (CWHS), this has been a challenging year and a year of learning for all of us; AVID students and teachers. Teachers had to step out of their comfort zones to learn how to navigate the world of Zoom, Google Classroom, and a variety of other platforms. They were able to use Google Jamboards to successfully run tutorials during distance learning and hybrid schedules. AVID teachers supported 168 students during tutorials with six college tutors, two math teachers, and peer tutors. Through Zoom, the AVID team continued to bring in guest speakers. Because we could not visit any college campuses this year, teachers brought the colleges to the students. Campus Outreach Programs provided students with virtual tours and admissions presentations from UC Davis, Hope International University, UC Santa Barbara, Merced, CSU, Channel Islands, and CSU, Long Beach. With more than 20 years of AVID on the CWHS campus, the team had the honor of inviting CWHS/AVID graduates back to speak to the current students. During these presentations, former students shared their educational journeys and careers including social worker, correctional officer, art therapist, teacher, and nurse. They not only provided valuable information but also inspired and served as AVID role models. As the AVID team plans end of year activities and senior celebrations, CWHS looks forward to beginning next year with 174 AVID students. Special Congratulations to the AVID college-bound seniors who were accepted to 15 different colleges. GO AVID!

DISCUSSION:

The District established the computer refresh program in the 2004-05 school year and has continued the program each year. The program was suspended during the 2020-21 fiscal year due to the pandemic and uncertainty of the State budget. Through this program, equipment is used by staff for four years and then placed into the student-use pool at school sites to be used for the next two years. Once the equipment is five years old or older, it will continue to be used but will not be repaired, as maintenance costs exceed the value of a computer that is more than five years old.

To fund the computer refresh program, the District has pursued a four-year lease program with an option for a \$1.00 buyout at the end of the lease period.

San Joaquin Office of Education is the creator and owner of a web-based suite of tools, known as Beyond SST, for use by school sites in formulating, updating, tracking, storing and reporting on Pupil Records, including Student Support Teams (SSTs) and 504s.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

The cost for this agreement is \$126,549 to be billed separately within three years, and is included in the LCAP budget.



Title: Annual Disposal of Obsolete Instructional Materials and Surplus Equipment

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the annual disposal of obsolete instructional materials (textbooks, workbooks and/or library books) and surplus equipment and property for the 2021-22 school year, in accordance with Education Code Section 60510 and Board Policy No. 3270.

DISCUSSION:

Obsolete instructional materials are identified as materials that will no longer be utilized in the District. Education Code Section 60510 provides that the Governing Board of a school district may dispose of undistributed obsolete instructional materials. Board Policy No. 3270 allows for disposal of personal property, including instructional materials.

Additionally, California Education Code Section 17546 provides that the Governing Board of a school district may dispose of surplus property by conducting a public auction either by employees of the District or with a private auction firm. This is in accordance with Clovis Unified Administrative Regulation No. 3270 – Disposition of Surplus Personal Property - Books, Equipment and Supplies. Surplus items will be reviewed by appropriate District staff prior to being deemed unacceptable for District use.

School sites and departments will be notified of available surplus materials and equipment prior to disposal. Authorized staff will then dispose by trash, sale, auction or donation to charitable organizations. The sale of surplus equipment will be conducted through a local public auction on eBay and through ROKn Auctions at www.roknauctions.com.

Lists of specific obsolete instructional materials and surplus equipment and property will appear in the Board's Consent agenda as needed during the 2021-22 school year.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

Additional revenue from the sale of equipment will be deposited into the General Fund – Sale of Equipment account.

Title: Annual Authorization to Purchase via Piggyback

Authorize purchases via piggyback from various cooperative and school district bid contracts for software, supplies and equipment needed for District sites/programs and recognize it is in the best interest of the District to make purchases without advertising for bids, pursuant to Public Contract Code 20118.

DISCUSSION:

Approval of piggyback contract utilization will ensure compliance with State and Federal procurement guidelines and spending limits, while ensuring the timely purchase of items to meet student and District needs.

Cooperative Contracts: Association of Educational Purchasing Agencies (AEPA), BuyBoard, Cal-Save, California Multiple Award schedule, Department of General Services (CMAS), Educational and Institutional Cooperative Service (E&I), General Services Administration (GSA), Merced Focus, National Intergovernmental Purchasing Alliance (National IPA), National Joint Powers Alliance, Omnia, National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO), National Cooperative Purchasing Alliance (NCPA), National Institute Governmental Purchasing (NIGP), Purchasing Association of Cooperative Entities (PACE), Purchasing Cooperative of America (PCA), Pennsylvania Education Purchasing Program for Microcomputers (PEPPM), Sourcewell, The Cooperative Purchasing Network (TCPN), United Stationers, and US Communities all have various co-operative purchasing contract pricing available and are utilized by the District. Some of the merchants associated with these contracts include, but are not limited to, Amazon, AMS.Net, B&H Photo, BSN Sports, CDWG, Crown Lift Trucks, Enviroclean, Gopher Sports, KYA, Meteor Furniture, NSP3, Park Planet, Office Depot, Office Solutions, School Specialty, School Health, Southwest School Supply, Trane, Troxell, US Bank and Virco. The District may use other vendors associated with these co-operative contracts. Current and subsequent orders will only be placed against these bids as long as it remains in the best interest of the District.

Section 20118 of the California Public Contract Code provides that the Governing Board of a school district may authorize the purchase of equipment, materials and supplies from another public corporation or agency without advertising for bids if the other public corporation or agency has complied with all Public Contract Codes regarding the purchase of similar equipment, materials and supplies.

Purchasing staff will continue to monitor pricing trends and available contracts to determine which contracts best meet the needs of the District. Listed agencies solicited and awarded formal bids following appropriate bid regulations. Piggyback allows for the purchase of software, equipment and supplies, which meet all District standards, at a negotiated cost savings and save order lead time.

Title: Resolution No. 3814 - Education Protection Account

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Resolution No. 3814 regarding the annual Education Protection Account (EPA), as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Proposition 30, the Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012, approved by the voters on November 6, 2012, temporarily increased the State sales tax rate for all taxpayers, and the personal income tax rates for upper-income taxpayers. The temporary sales tax expired at the end of the 2016 calendar year. The personal income tax rates for upper-income taxpayers was due to expire at the end of the 2018 calendar year. On the November 2016 ballot, California voters approved Proposition 55, extending the Proposition 30 income tax increase for upper-income taxpayers through 2030.

The District's State revenue is comprised of three funding sources: State aid, EPA and property taxes. The funding received as a result of Proposition 55 does not increase the District's revenue funding because the State aid revenue is decreased according to the amount of EPA funds received. At the beginning of each year, the Department of Finance estimates the amount to be transferred into the EPA for districts. EPA revenue funds for Clovis Unified will be deposited into restricted resource 1400. These funds must, therefore, be accounted for under the following reporting requirements:

- 1. Each year, the Governing Board must approve a spending plan for the EPA money.
- 2. The EPA funds cannot be used for the salaries or benefits of administrators or for administrative costs.
- 3. The District must publish on its website the amount of EPA money received and how it was spent.
- 4. An annual audit will be required to verify that EPA funds were spent in accordance with the requirements of Proposition 55.
- 5. The spending plan must be approved at the time the District's annual budget is adopted.

RESOLUTION REGARDING THE EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT (EPA)

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 55 on November 8, 2016; and, WHEREAS, Proposition 55 amended Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 8, 2016 and commencing on January 1, 2018; and,

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36(f); and,

WHEREAS, before June 30th of each year, the District shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates made pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year; and,

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year; and,

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools, and community college districts; and,

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor, or any agency of state government; and,

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school, or schools, within its jurisdiction; and,

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the District shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the Governing Board; and,

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators, or any other administrative cost; and,

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district, and charter school shall annually publish on its internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent; and,

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution; and,

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts, and charter schools must comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36, and may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act, and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36, and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the Governing Board of Clovis Unified School District;

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that to be in compliance with Article XIII, Section 36(e), with the California Constitution, the Governing Board of the Clovis Unified School District has determined to spend the monies received from the Education Protection Act as attached.

Title: Annual Agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates

Authorize Clovis Unified to enter into an annual agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates to provide educationally related mental health services to eligible students with special needs as described in their Individualized Education Programs.

DISCUSSION:

In order to meet the goals of their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), some Clovis Unified students require educationally related mental health services by licensed clinicians. To increase the efficiency and effectiveness of Clovis Unified's delivery of these services, it is recommended that the annual agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates be approved.

Educational Mental Health Associates is managed by Teri Roltgen, LMFT, as a non-public agency in order to attract qualified clinicians to provide educationally related mental health services for students with special needs.

The contract amount includes all costs associated with the provision of these services, including licensed therapists and/or clinicians. Furthermore, use of Educational Mental Health Associates meets all compliance requirements established by the State of California.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

The agreement with Educational Mental Health Associates, which is not to exceed \$728,520 for the 2021-22 school year, has been included in the 2021-22 Special Education Budget. This amount is equal to the projected educationally related mental health service needs of identified students with special needs.

The current Plan is set to expire on June 30, 2021. The Fresno County Superintendent of Schools (FCSS) has updated the Plan for July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2024, to submit to the State Superintendent of Schools. The Plan may require an excess cost agreement between school districts and the FCSS to ensure adequate funding of district student services in the county community/community day schools.

Fresno County Plan for Expelled Students¹

Introduction

Fresno County, located in the heart of California, is the sixth largest county in California with an area of 5,957.99 square miles. Its ideal weather conditions and rich soil make Fresno the number one agribusiness county in the nation. In 2019, its population of 999,101 made it the tenth most populous county in California. Composed of both rural and urban areas, Fresno County has fifteen incorporated cities.

The population includes over 80 different nationalities that speak over 66 languages. Fresno County's 207,858 students are educated by the 10,707 teachers working at one of the 346 school sites of one of 32 school districts. These school districts range in size from Fresno Unified School District, the fourth largest district in the state with an enrollment of 73,381, to Big Creek Elementary with an enrollment of 47 students.

These school districts first developed Fresno County's Plan for Providing Education Services to Expelled Students in 1997, following the enactment of AB 922, Statutes of 1995, Chapter 974. The Plan for Expelled Students continues to be the blueprint for providing educational services to expelled students in Fresno County.

Legal Basis for Triennial Review of the Plan for Expelled Students

AB 922 is codified at Section 48926 of the California Education Code, and requires that every three years the county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, develop a county plan for providing education services to all expelled students. Once developed, the Plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the county board of education.

To meet the requirements of Education Code Section 48926, the Plan for Expelled Students must:

- Enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled students (see, Section I);
- Identify gaps in educational services to expelled students, and strategies for filling those service gaps (see Section III); and
- Identify alternative placements for students who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and

conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district students, as determined by the governing board (see Section IV).

In addition, the triennial, county-adopted plan must be filed with the Superintendent of Public Instruction by June 30. (See Education Code Section 48926, attached as Appendix A).

Overview of Plan History

The first Fresno County Plan for Providing Educational Services to Expelled Students ("Plan") was developed in 1997, and revisions were adopted in 2000, 2003, 2006, 2009, 2012, 2015, 2017. The current revisions will be adopted in June 2021 following input, review, and revision from participating school districts.

Requirement for Educational Program During Expulsion Period

California Education Code Section 48916.1 requires that when a governing board orders that a student is expelled, it must ensure that the student is provided with an educational program during the expulsion period. This countywide plan reflects the programs available to expelled students enrolled in Fresno County school districts. Section 48916.1 also requires that districts report annual "outcome data" to the Superintendent of Public Instruction by June 30 (see Education Code Section 48916.1, attached as Appendix A).

Outcome Data Required under Education Code Section 48916.1(d)

The outcome data required under Education Code Section 48916.1(d), to be maintained by each school district, includes the following:

- The number of students recommended for expulsion;
- The grounds for each recommended expulsion;
- Whether the student was subsequently expelled;
- Whether the expulsion order was suspended;
- The type of referral made after the expulsion; and,
- The disposition of the student after the end of the period of expulsion.

Implementation of the Plan

Implementation of the Plan is subject to the State's funding of education during the next three years. Should the State reduce educational dollars resulting in the County program operating at a deficit, the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools ("FCSS") will create an excess cost agreement in consultation with the County school district superintendents between districts and the FCSS to ensure adequate funding for serving students in the FCSS Community School Program.

Existing Educational Alternatives for the Expelled Students of Fresno County

School districts located within Fresno County offer a range of options for expelled students. Depending on the facts regarding the specific offense, the Education Code violation, and the governing board's order, a governing board may "suspend" the enforcement of the expulsion order and place the student:

- On the same school campus;
- At a different school campus within the district;
- In an alternative education program within the district; or,
- In an independent study program operated by the district.

A governing board may enforce the expulsion order and refer the student to:

- Its district community day school program;
- A district community day school program operated by another district on the condition that an attendance and behavior agreement has been developed by the districts;
- To the FCSS Community Schools Program; or,
- To a public charter school or to a private school. (The parents/guardians/responsible adults may elect to enroll the student in a private school; however, if they elect to do so, the parents/guardians/responsible adults are responsible for the costs, if any, associated with that private school enrollment.)

I. Fresno County Superintendent of Schools Services for Expelled Students

FCSS offers educational alternatives through FCSS Community Schools Program. This Program requires referrals from the school districts or from the courts and/or probation officers. The referral process is as follows:

A. Referral Process for FCSS Community School Program

In order to refer a student to the FCSS Community School Program, it is necessary that a referral form be completed by the student's referring school district or agency.² The referral form includes details regarding the student, including:

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² Or any other source allowed by law. Specifically, pursuant to California Education Code section 1981, the FCSS Community School Program may accept students who have been expelled (consistent with § 1981(a)), are referred through the School Attendance Review Board ("SARB") (consistent with § 1981(b)), are on probation (consistent with § 1981(c)), or at the

- Information regarding the student's Section 504 plan or individualized education program ("IEP") status with relevant paperwork, including, but not limited to, the current Section 504 plan or IEP, all assessment reports for assessments conducted over the past three (3) years, progress reports for the past year, and all manifestation determination documentation related to the incident that is resulting in the referral to the FCSS Community School Program;
- Probation status;
- Dependency status;
- Reason for expulsion with relevant paperwork, including any stipulated expulsion or suspended enforcement agreement(s);
- Student's progress toward meeting the student's school district of residence's high school graduation requirements, including any relevant information (e.g. adjusted graduation requirements or plan to be a fifth year senior) related to the student's graduation requirements pursuant to California Assembly Bills 1806 and 2306 for students who are homeless, foster youth, or have attended a juvenile court school;
- Attendance information from the last school year and the current school year, including any information related to Student's participation in the SARB process (letters, court documents, etc.);
- Immunization records;
- ELPAC (or alternative assessment) and Smarter Balanced Testing (or alternative assessment);
- Information from any Response to Intervention, multi-tiered system of support, and/or other general education interventions in which the student has participated for academics, behavior, or any other reason, prior to referral; and,
- The date on which the student will be eligible to return to the school district of residence.

The referring school district or agency shall communicate with the student's parents/guardians/responsible adults regarding all aspects of the referral process.

Upon the FCSS's receipt of a referral from the referring school district or agency, FCSS will determine if it can appropriately serve and/or has space for the student at the FCSS Community School Program. While FCSS attempts to serve as many of the referred students as possible; it is not required to take any students and may not be able to serve all students who are referred.

request of the student's parents/guardians/responsible adults and it is determined by the student's referring school district that placement in FCSS Community School Program will promote the educational interests of the student (consistent with § 1981(d)).

Reasons that a student may not be accepted into the FCSS Community School Program may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Insufficient space in the FCSS Community School Program or in the student's specific grade level at the FCSS Community School Program;
- Insufficient space in or unavailability of the special education placement and/or services contained in a student's IEP or Section 504 plan;
- A review of the student's referral reveals potential issues related to child find under Section 504 or special education law;
- A review of the student's referral reveals a potential issue related to failure to assess the student for special education (either initial or re-evaluation) in all areas of suspected disability;
- A review of the student's file reveals that the student's special education placement and/or services per the student's IEP or Section 504 plan is likely inappropriate and the student likely cannot be appropriately served at the FCSS Community School Program;
- A review of the manifestation determination paperwork related to the incident resulting in referral to the FCSS Community School Program reveals that there may be an error—either procedurally or substantively—with the manifestation determination conducted;
- A review of the referral paperwork reveals inadequate general education interventions, especially alternatives to suspension, prior to referral;
- The student was previously unsuccessful in the FCSS Court or Community School Program;
- The student has been enrolled in the Community School Program and juvenile hall over the past six months and should be allowed the opportunity for success on a school district campus prior to additional enrollment in the Community School Program;
- The student's behavior prior to referral is too severe and/or dangerous and will
 pose a danger to staff and/or other students on the Community School Program
 campus;
- A victim of the student is already/will be on the Community School Program campus; and/or,
- There is a restraining order involving another student(s) on Community School Program campus.

If the student cannot be appropriately served and/or there is not space available for the student in the FCSS Community School Program, the FCSS Community School Program will notify the referring school district or agency in writing with the general reason(s) for denying admission to the FCSS Community School Program; should the referring school district or agency wish to obtain further information regarding the denial of admission, they may contact Tracy Klee, FCSS Community School Principal at 559-443-4851 via telephone only for further information; no further information will be shared in writing. Additionally, there is no appeal process for denial of admission to the FCSS Community School Program.

The referring school district or agency shall be responsible for notifying the student's parents/guardians/responsible adults that the referral to the FCSS Community School Program was denied; FCSS shall have no responsibility for communicating with the parents/guardians/responsible adults regarding the referral process and/or denial of admission. The referring school district or agency shall not refer the student's parents/guardians/responsible adults to FCSS staff for information regarding these processes and/or additional information regarding a denial of admission. Any and all such contact to FCSS by parents/guardians/responsible adults will be referred back to the referring school district or agency for response.

If a student can be appropriately served and there is space available in the FCSS Community School Program, the FCSS Community School Program will mail the student and his/her parents/guardians/responsible adults notice of the date to report to the school for intake. As part of the intake process, the student, the parents/guardians/responsible adults, and FCSS staff will develop an Individual Learning Plan ("ILP") for the student. In addition to addressing the student's academic plan, the ILP will include the goal of the student's return to the school district of residence after the expulsion term. The ILP shall be in addition to and will not replace or override any of the components of the student's Section 504 plan or IEP.

B. Transition Process from FCSS Community School Program

Enrolled students will attend the FCSS Community School Program for the remainder of the expulsion period. At least 30 days prior to the end of the expulsion term, FCSS shall provide the school district of residence and any referring agency with notice of transition of student back to the school district of residence. Within the last 30 days or upon request, FCSS will provide the school district of residence with a transition report indicating the reason for transition back to the district, transition recommendations, FCSS Community School Program attendance and the following:

- Information regarding the student's Section 504 plan or IEP status with relevant paperwork, including, but not limited to, the current Section 504 plan or IEP, developed while the student was enrolled in the FCSS Community School Program;
- Probation status;
- Dependency status;
- Discipline records;
- Student's progress toward meeting the FCSS Court and Community School high school graduation requirements, including any relevant information (e.g. adjusted graduation requirements or plan to be a fifth year senior) related to the student's graduation requirements pursuant to California Assembly Bills 1806 and 2306 for students who are homeless, foster youth, or have attended a juvenile court school;
- Attendance information;
- Immunization records;
- ELPAC (or alternative assessment) and Smarter Balanced Testing (or alternative assessment); and,
- Information from any Response to Intervention, multi-tiered system of support, and/or other general education interventions for academics, behavior, or any other reason, in which the student has participated in the FCSS Community School Program.

Failure of the district of residence to participate in the transition process will not prevent the student from being returned to the district of residence; the FCSS Community School Program shall have no obligation to maintain the student's attendance following the date of exit for which the school district of residence is provided at least 30 days' notice. A school district of residence may take a student back prior to the end of the 30-day transition time period if it so chooses. If a student is enrolled for less than 30 days or is disenrolled by the district of residence prior to the 30-day notice time period, the district of residence will receive the transition report within five (5) business days of the student's disenrollment from the FCSS Community School Program.

If the school district of residence or referring agency believe it is appropriate to remove the student from the FCSS Community School program to return to the school district of residence but the FCSS Community School Program staff do not believe that it is appropriate for the student to return to the district of residence and the student should remain in the FCSS Community School Program at the end of the expulsion term, this recommendation will be communicated to the district of residence and referring agency.

This process does not replace any meetings and/or hearings (such as a readmission hearing) that may be convened by the student's district of residence. Any district of residence processes (such

as a readmission hearing) should be scheduled and held by the district of residence during the 30-day FCSS Community School Program transition process described herein.

If a school district of residence requests, FCSS Community School Program will participate in the student's readmission hearing/meeting.

Once a student is transitioned or removed from the FCSS Community School Program for any reason by any entity for five (5) or more school days, including, but not limited to disenrollment by parents/guardians/responsible adults or incarceration in juvenile hall, the student will be deemed exited from the FCSS Community School Program. Unless the student is returning to the FCSS Community School Program from the FCSS Court School, the student will not be able to return to the FCSS Community School Program without going through the referral process again. Students returning from the FCSS Court School Program shall be immediately readmitted to the FCSS Community School Program; however, the school district of residence or referring agency will also need to complete the referral paperwork concurrent with the student's re-enrollment. The FCSS Community School Program will also comply with all laws related to school of origin for foster and homeless students.

C. Educational Services Provided to Expelled Students with Exceptional Needs

- 1. Consistent with state and federal law, a student with exceptional needs (who has a current IEP or Section 504 plan) may be expelled and referred by a school district for placement in the FCSS Community School Program. Enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program will be determined on an individual basis, and is dependent, in part, upon the appropriateness of placement and services available at the FCSS Community School Program to meet the individual needs of the student as stated in the current IEP or Section 504 plan as well as other factors described in Section II(A) above. As indicated above, a referral is not a guarantee of placement at the FCSS Community School Program. Districts may refer students with exceptional needs provided that:
 - a. all procedural safeguards regarding the discipline of students with special needs have been met, including, but not limited to a procedurally and substantively appropriate manifestation determination meeting;
 - b. the referring school district or agency has complied with all legal requirements regarding the education of special needs students, e.g., all procedural timelines have been met regarding annual/triennial reviews/assessments (Note: No students will be accepted if they have pending and/or overdue IEP/Section 504 plan assessments, meetings, etc. unless and until all timelines are brought current and/or are completed as specified on the referral form. This means that if anything is overdue or needs to be corrected, the referring school district or, if the student is being referred by an agency, the school district of residence must do so. Moreover, if an assessment is due within 60 days or less or an IEP team or Section 504 team meeting is due within 30 days or less, the referring school district or, if the student is being referred by an agency, the school district of residence must complete these processes.);

- c. the requirements as stipulated in Education Code Section 48915.5 have been met;
- d. the referring school district or agency has completed a Community School Referral Form and has provided the required attachments and documents; and,
- e. an IEP or Section 504 team has determined that a referral for placement at FCSS Community School Program meets the student's needs per the current IEP or Section 504 plan.
- 2. In accordance with the Fresno County SELPA Plan, any excess costs incurred in providing special education and related services to a student with an IEP shall be billed back to the school district of residence. Notification of the need for bill back will be provided and input from County school district superintendents will be sought prior to any bill backs that are not currently occurring.
 - All costs in excess of the average daily attendance ("ADA") recouped for the student with a Section 504 Plan shall be billed back to the school district of residence. Notification of the need for bill back will be provided and input from County school district superintendents will be sought prior to any bill backs that are not currently occurring.
- 3. Prior to enrollment and attendance at the FCSS Community School Program, the district of residence shall be responsible for any and all requirements under state and federal law related to students with exceptional needs. Except for the excess costs referenced in Section (II)(C)(2) above and the IEP process referenced in Section (II)(C)(4) below, during the time period of the student's enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program, FCSS shall be responsible for any and all requirements under state and federal law related to students with exceptional needs except as provided for in Sections (II)(C)(4), (5) and (6) below. Except when stay put is ordered during a special education due process proceeding, whether the district of residence agrees with the student's transition back to the district or not, upon the date of transition noticed pursuant to Section (II)(B), Sections (II)(C)(4), (5), and (6) or Sections (III)(2), (3), and (6), the school district of residence shall be responsible for any and all requirements under state and federal law related to students with exceptional needs.
- 4. If FCSS receives an initial evaluation request for special education services or a Section 504 Plan for students in FCSS Community School Program, FCSS shall follow the FCSS school calendar in order to comply with state and federal law related to the initial evaluation request and any subsequent IEP or Section 504 team meetings. FCSS shall provide the district of residence with a courtesy-copy of the assessment plan when it is sent to the parents/guardians/responsible adults. FCSS shall conduct the initial evaluation. FCSS shall invite the District of residence to the initial IEP team meeting during which it will be considered whether FCSS Community School Program can provide the student with a free appropriate public education ("FAPE"). The district of residence shall attend this initial IEP team meeting or Section 504 team meeting and is responsible for being fully prepared to discuss the full continuum of placements and services at this IEP team meeting; any placement outside of FCSS's Community School Program shall be the responsibility of the district of residence. FCSS shall be responsible

- for this IEP or Section 504 Plan if the offer of FAPE remains in the FCSS Community School Program; the district of residence shall be responsible for this IEP or Section 504 Plan if the offer of FAPE is in any other location or program.
- 5. If at any time during a student's enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program it is determined by an IEP or Section 504 team convened by FCSS staff that placement in the FCSS Community School Program is no longer appropriate for a student, FCSS will provide the student's district of residence with 30 days' notice prior to transitioning the student back to the district of residence pursuant to Section (II)(B) above for an alternative placement. The district of residence shall convene an IEP or Section 504 team meeting prior to the end of that 30 day notice time period during which they shall offer a placement other than FCSS Community School Program. FCSS shall attend this IEP or Section 504 team meeting; but the district of residence shall bear all responsibility for this meeting, including sending notice to the parents/guardians/responsible adults.
- 6. The FCSS Community School Program will convene any required manifestation determination meetings for students during their enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program. The school district of residence will be invited to, and shall attend, each manifestation determination meeting. Under such circumstances, despite not receiving 30 days' notice as required by (II)(C)(4) above, the school district of residence may need to come prepared to discuss a change in placement if the team determines that the student needs a change in placement or if the team determines that the student's interim alternative education setting ("IAES") placement (during a removal in excess of 10 school days or a 45-school day IAES) should be somewhere other than at the FCSS Community School Program. FCSS shall be responsible for this IEP or Section 504 Plan if the offer of FAPE or the IAES remains in the FCSS Community School Program; the district of residence shall be responsible for this IEP or Section 504 Plan if the offer of FAPE or the IAES is in any other location or program.

D. High School Credits Awarded at FCSS Community School Program

- 1. The referring school district or, if the student is referred by another agency, the school district of residence, shall calculate and provide all credits earned by the student, including partial credits for the portion of the current semester attended in the school district, to FCSS Community School Program within two (2) business days of the student's enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program.
- 2. The FCSS Community School Program awards credits to high school students in accordance with the rules and regulations governing court and community schools. If the student does not earn full credits, partial credits will be awarded by FCSS Community School Program for the time of attendance in the FCSS Community School Program.
- 3. The school district of residence shall accept any and all partial credits awarded to the student by any school district or the FCSS Court and Community School Program.
- 4. FCSS Community School Program complies with California Assembly Bills 1806 and 2306 for students who are homeless, foster youth, or have attended a juvenile court

school. Information regarding the student's status under these bills will be provided as part of the transition report when the student leaves the FCSS Community School Program. The school district of residence agrees to abide by what is determined appropriate for students under California Assembly Bills 1806 and 2306 (e.g. credit waiver and/or fifth year to earn diploma) by the FCSS Court School Program.

- 5. A student who completes the FCSS Community School Program graduation requirements during the term of their enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program shall be awarded a regular high school diploma by FCSS and will be exited from the FCSS Community School Program. This diploma shall be recognized by the student's school district of residence as a regular high school diploma. Parents'/guardians'/responsible adults' refusal of an FCSS diploma is cause for a 30-day notice of transition back to the district of residence pursuant to Section (II)(B) above.
- 6. A student with an IEP who completes the FCSS Community School Program certificate of completion requirements during the term of their enrollment in the FCSS Community School Program shall be awarded a certificate of completion by FCSS. Such a certificate does not end the student's eligibility for special education.

II. Gaps in Educational Services to Expelled Students

The school districts of Fresno County, in conjunction with the FCSS and FCSS Community School Program, offer alternative educational opportunities for students, including those students expelled from their district of residence. District community day schools authorized by Education Code Section 48660 and charter schools provide students with additional options. Through the countywide collaborative process, gaps have been identified in respect to providing educational services to expelled students. The identified gaps are listed below, along with suggested strategies for addressing the gaps.

1. Students referred to the FCSS Community School Program fail to attend intake.

County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap. Currently, upon referral, students assigned to the FCSS Community School Program receive a letter instructing them to report to intake on a specific date and time. FCSS Community School Program staff will courtesy-copy the referring school district or agency on the notice of intake letter so that the referring school district or agency knows it has been sent; the referring school district or agency staff and FCSS staff will both telephone each family to remind them of the intake date and time. The parents/guardians/responsible adults of a student who fails to report for intake at the assigned time and location will receive a second letter that will also be courtesy-copied to the referring school district or agency. A student who fails to report for intake after the second letter will not be enrolled in the FCSS Community School Program. The parents/guardians/responsible adults and the referring school district or agency via courtesy-copy will then receive a letter notifying them they are no longer being accepted into the FCSS Community School Program and have been referred back to their district of residence for an educational program. FCSS shall have no responsibility for this student and he/she shall remain the responsibility of the referring school district or agency, including for any and all attendance and SARB proceedings that may result from failure to enroll in and attend the FCSS Community School Program.

2. <u>Students referred attend FCSS Community School Program intake, but fail to attend class.</u>

County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap. Students who enroll but do not ever attend the FCSS Community School Program shall be dis-enrolled from the FCSS Community School Program after five (5) consecutive days of non-enrollment. FCSS shall have no responsibility for this student and he/she shall remain the responsibility of the referring school district or agency, including for any and all attendance and SARB proceedings that may result from failure to attend the FCSS Community School Program.

Students will be considered enrolled in the FCSS Community School Program once they attend the first day of instruction following the FCSS intake. If this student subsequently fails to attend school at least 80% of the time, the school district of residence will be contacted for a joint effort to obtain student's at least 80% attendance at the FCSS Community School Program, including, for example: phone calls, emails, and text messages to the student's parents/guardians/responsible adults; home visits by FCSS Community School Program staff; home visits by district home-school liaisons; Probation Department intervention; Department of Family and Children Services intervention; and/or court intervention. Any and all SARB processes (including, but not limited to written notices) and proceedings shall be the responsibility of the school district of residence. FCSS Community School staff can assist in mailing any written SARB notices on behalf of the school district of residence and can participate in any SARB court processes; but, is not responsible for developing or initiating these processes related to truancy. Lack of at least 80% attendance may also be cause for a 30-day notice of transition back to the district of residence pursuant to Section (II)(B) above.

3. <u>Lack of confirmation of enrollment at a new school for students dis-enrolling from FCSS Community School Program.</u>

County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap. When a student leaves the FCSS Community School Program for any reason, the FCSS program registrar will contact the student's school district of residence and, if applicable, the referring agency to advise them of the change, including if the student is incarcerated in juvenile hall or intends to enroll in a charter school. Once a student leaves FCSS Community School Program, he/she will no longer be the responsibility of FCSS Community School Program for any reason. FCSS Community School Program will provide the district of residence with the transition paperwork referenced in Section (II)(B) above within five (5) business days, but, no 30-day time period will apply.

4. Fresno County is a large county with remote districts. Distances between districts and the county program sites make it difficult for some students to participate in programs for expelled students offered by FCSS, charter schools, and/or other districts.

<u>County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap.</u> Remote districts within Fresno County may develop a community day program, or work with FCSS to provide a program for their expelled students. Districts may choose to form a consortium with the consultation of FCSS and create a program of school district-shared costs.

5. <u>Due to the small number of grade K-6 students expelled and the legal requirement that such students be served in a separate program, service delivery can be problematic.</u>

<u>County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap.</u> Such instances will be addressed on a case-by-case basis, considering district and/or the FCSS Community School Program resources. Districts may consider operating their own K-6 community day school programs or form a consortium with consultation of FCSS to create a program of school district-shared costs and space.

6. <u>Students fail to meet policies/procedures of the FCSS Community School Program after several interventions.</u>

<u>County/District Strategy for Addressing this Gap.</u> Students who fail to meet the rules of the FCSS Community School Program will be referred back to their school districts of residence through the transition process described in Section (II)(B) above.

III. <u>District Level Behavioral Intervention Approaches: Options to Minimize Number of Suspensions Leading to Expulsions and Expulsions Ordered; Support for Students Returning to Home Schools following Expulsion</u>

Districts shared behavioral intervention strategies employed prior to expulsion and referral to the FCSS Community School Program. Those strategies include:

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID): The AVID program targets students in the academic middle who have the desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard. AVID places academically average students in advanced classes and provides them with an elective class designed to prepare them to succeed in rigorous curricula, enter mainstream activities in school, and increase their opportunities to enroll in four-year colleges.

All 4 Youth: All 4 Youth is an available referral option for schools and districts that have been "on-boarded" to help in treating underlying mental health concerns that may lead to suspension/expulsion.

Assertive Discipline in the Classroom: Assertive discipline is a structured, systematic approach to classroom discipline designed to assist educators in running an organized, teacher-in-charge classroom environment.

ATOD Intervention Program and Liaison: The ATOD program is centered on creating an environment conducive to academic success and wellness. It is geared for students with alcohol, drug or tobacco offenses on campus and/or those identified as at risk for substance abuse.

Behavior Intervention Specialist (BIS): A district level intensive individualized support that may be provided for students (TK-3rd) that are exhibiting a pattern of intensive behavior or social emotional needs. The BIS provide individualized supports and strategies that are evidence-based, aide in the development of an Intervention Plan, and coach and model the implementation of interventions to all stakeholders involved with assigned student. The primary goal of a BIS is to build the capacity of the student, teacher, parents, and other stakeholders in efforts to decrease/extinguish the intensive behaviors and aide in academic success. These interventions

and supports align with restorative, SEL, and PBIS practices to promote equitable outcomes and reduce disproportionality.

Behavior Intervention/Support Plan: Behavior intervention/support plans are individual plans specialized to support a student's classroom success. A multi-disciplinary team, including the parent, develops the plan collaboratively.

Behavior Matrix and Discipline Guidelines: To reduce disproportional suspensions and create a more equitable behavioral response system, Discipline Guidelines and a Behavioral Matrix are implemented. The Discipline Guidelines are a comprehensive system that defines the behavior and assigns a response by category. If a consequence is assigned, it is paired with interventions to address the behavior and need. Physical and psychological safety remain a priority and there is a heavy emphasis on educating, redirecting, and repairing the harm. The Behavior Matrix is implemented at sites not yet implementing Discipline Guidelines. The Behavior Matrix provides a common definition of behaviors and parameters and guidance to respond to behaviors. The Discipline Guidelines align with restorative, SEL, and PBIS practices which promote equitable outcomes and reduce disproportionality by providing structures and protocols, increasing inclusionary discipline practices, and providing professional learning to help staff/administrators shift mindset.

Behavioral Office: The Behavioral Office assists families in solving concerns that may affect the safety and well-being of their students. Solutions are geared toward finding the most appropriate school placement with an emphasis on sustaining healthy communication and problem solving at a student's current school of attendance. Direct services include: safety placements to schools other than the current school of attendance; administrative school placements to ensure school/resource alignment; support to school administrators in determining appropriate consequences for behavior utilizing Behavior Matrix; utilizing a Multidisciplinary Team as a means to identify alternatives for mitigating disruptive and/or dangerous behaviors exhibited by students in grades K-6; access to other interagency support systems such as Youth Court, counseling services and mentors; and mediation as necessary to improve communication between school and family.

Cara y Corazón: Cara y Corazón is a culturally based family strengthening /community mobilization program that assists parent and other extended family to raise and teach their students with a positive bicultural base (3-day training).

CHAMPs Classroom Management: The overall goal of the CHAMPs classroom management system is to develop an instructional structure in which students are responsible, motivated, and highly engaged in the specific task at hand. More particularly, the teacher's goal is to teach students directly how to be successful in specific class situations.

Character Education Program: Character development programs that focus on creating a positive school climate while helping students achieve social and emotional learning goals, improve academics, assist teachers with classroom management skills, and reduce incidents of bullying and misbehavior.

Character Honor Integrity Perseverance Service (CHIPS) is a one week non-residential program scheduled at Fresno State University. The mission of the program is to educate high school students on the benefits and varied aspects of English Language Arts, Science, Technology Engineering, Arts, and Math (STEAM). The program focuses on Emotional Intelligence based tenets that combine interactive activities, critical thinking and socio-political rubrics. In addition to the cognitive and emotional based activities, the camp will provide several physical and recreational activities designed to increase leadership skills, gain confidence and extenuate self-efficacy.

Check-in Check out - Students check in with the Transition Team on Monday and Thursday mornings. They receive positive interaction with an adult before starting the week. As they go through the day, they must periodically check in with each teacher and ask them to fill out the online student evaluation. The evaluation consists of the following categories: classroom behavior, attendance, work completion, and attitude. There is also a section for teachers to leave constructive comments and positive praise for students. On Thursdays, when students check out, they receive a print out of the weekly evaluation form. The Transition Team then uses the feedback to help the student with any areas of concern and praises them for their accomplishments of the week.

Child Welfare & Attendance Specialists: Serving students districtwide, CWA focus on supporting students with chronic attendance issues and connecting them to community and site based resources to improve attendance and behavior.

Clinical School Social Workers: Provide counseling and mental health support such as individual/group counseling. Clinical School Social Workers also provide suicide prevention and intervention such as suicide risk assessments and crisis support.

Collaboration Team: The Collaboration Team includes the school psychologist, school social worker, school counselor, counseling groups focusing on social skills.

El Joven Noble: El Joven Noble is a comprehensive indigenous based, youth leadership development program that supports and guides students through their "rites of passage" process while focusing on the prevention of substance abuse, teen pregnancy, relationship violence, gang violence and school failure. There are two phases of training and curriculum, base-training (Hombres Jovenes con Palabra, 3-day training) and advanced-training that includes youth leadership development curriculum (5-day training).

Girl Talk: This program assists young teenage girls to build self-esteem, develop leadership skills and recognize the value of community service.

High School Re-engagement Center (REC): A comprehensive approach to reengage students through interventions and social emotional supports, allowing them to successfully re-enter their classroom, decreasing the loss of their instructional minutes. The REC teacher provides small group SEL skill building, facilitates/participates in re-entry meetings, facilitates conflict mediation, conducts CICO and goal setting, intervenes proactively with students at risk to provide early stage interventions, coordinates and provides support and interventions. This

support structure aligns with restorative, SEL, and PBIS practices promoting equitable outcomes and reduce disproportionality.

Individualized Education Program (IEP) Team Meetings: IEP team meetings provide a multi-disciplinary approach to addressing behavior for students who are eligible for special education.

Insights to Behavior: Empowers administrators and teachers with an unprecedented suite of tools to create, update, track, and report on behavior intervention plans.

Interagency Child Empowerment Team (ICET): The ICET provides a multi-agency comprehensive review of elementary students (K-6) who may eventually be referred for expulsion. The main purpose of the ICET is to assist in providing interventions to the student and his/her family so the student can be successful at school. The ICET consists of representatives from the school district, Department of Social Services, Fresno Police Department, and Department of Prevention and Intervention.

Intervention programs: The districts reported various community agencies which collaborate and use a team approach to reduce drug, alcohol usage, and non-productive behaviors. The goals of the collaborative teams approach are to improve student attendance, grades, behavior, and graduation rates. Eminence, Prodigy, Promesa, and Westcare are being utilized in the county but we are not limited to them.

Link Crew: Link Crew develops student mentors for middle and high schools who work to create positive, healthy, educational campuses.

Men's Alliance and Women's Alliance: The mission of the Men's and Women's Alliance is to facilitate the development of personal behavior and academic skills that will lead students to success in the classroom, in their career and in their adult lives. The program's strategies include: leadership development, mentoring and academics to empower students to become self-sufficient learners and adults, increase coping skills and lessen negative behaviors that lead to suspension and expulsion through training; academic opportunities to support student learning, extracurricular opportunities aligned to career, college and post-secondary options, and develop positive relationships with peers and adults through the fostering of self-awareness and respect.

Mentoring: Includes individual, group, e-mentoring and specialized mentoring services. Mentees meet with mentors at school, after school and in community programs with a goal of improving student well-being and school success.

Middle School Social Emotional Support Specialist: focusing on providing individual and group intervention for at risk students in our comprehensive middle school sites.

Opportunity Programs: The Opportunity Program provides a supportive environment with specialized curriculum for students who are habitually truant, irregular in attendance, insubordinate, disorderly while in attendance, or unsuccessful academically.

Peer Mentoring: High School Mentors and Junior High Mentees are matched in 1-on-1 partnerships designed to improve the students' academic performance and school connectedness. Includes a service learning component. Peer mentoring also targets specific cultural groups, including, English Learners, African Americans, and South-East Asians.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support (PBIS): Is a proactive, multi-tiered behavior framework that, when implemented well, can establish positive social learning environments. The model emphasizes implementation of evidence-based practices by defining, teaching, and acknowledging student behaviors. The tiered framework builds a continuum of positive behavior support for all students in instructional and non-instructional settings. Schools and educational organizations (including alternative and community day schools), establish school-wide systems of support (Tier I), targeted interventions (Tier II), and individual systems of support (Tier III) that improve the well-being of students by making problem behaviors less effective. An essential feature of SWPBIS is the use of data for decision-making and self-assessment of adult's efforts towards action planning and effective implementation on an ongoing basis.

Prodigy: On-campus counseling services for students.

Project Success: Project Success is a program designed to teach middle and high school students how to take positive steps towards healthy life goals.

Restorative Practices: A model for building, affirming and repairing the networks of relationships that are central to learning. The transformational shift from the traditional school discipline and culture paradigm moves staff away from many approaches which aren't reaching the outcomes we want for our students socially, emotionally or academically. A restorative approach to discipline places primary focus on the people and relationships that are impacted when a rule is violated, as opposed to just the rule itself. It follows a consistent process where everyone impacted by wrong-doing is given an opportunity to share their voice and participate in seeking solutions and making things as right as possible. For the student who did the harm, the process has them take greater ownership for their actions and the responsibility for making repairs.

Restoring Learning Environment Counselors (RLE Counselors): RLE Counselors work closely with district crisis response teams and school sites to address cultural barriers to achievement for Hmong students of all grade levels. This proactive prevention program provides socio-educational individual/group, consultation, case management, and cultural intervention services. RLE counselors also provide a transition/social educational program for incoming 9th grade Hmong students.

Safe and Civil Schools and Bullying Prevention Initiatives: A system-wide approach to developing behavior management strategies, learning effective classroom management strategies, implementing positive behavior supports and Response to Intervention (RTI), and designing and implementing a school improvement plan.

Safety Placements: The goal of a safety placement is to allow a student to transfer school sites at the middle and high school levels when the student experiences harassment or has a sense of being unsafe at the home school site.

Safe School Ambassadors: Safe School Ambassadors focuses on preventing bullying and violence by training students in nonviolent communication and intervention skills to stop bullying and violence among their peers. The program builds leadership skills and empowers students to prevent violence on their own campus.

School Academies: This approach to school organization breaks high schools into grade level academies, e.g., freshmen, sophomore, junior and senior level academies. Each academy is staffed with a counselor, social work intern, intervention specialist, and administrator. The academy staff knows and understands the needs of each student, and ensures the provision of services.

School Attendance Review Board (SARB): The SARB is comprised of representatives from various school sites and includes school district personnel, probation and the courts who come together with families to put together a plan to improve attendance and behavior with a goal of reducing the expulsion rate. SARB's focus is to assist parents/guardians/responsible adults and students to recognize and eliminate the barriers that inhibit regular attendance.

School Connect 9-12: School-Connect is a curriculum designed to improve high school students' social, emotional, and academic skills and strengthen relationships among students and between students and teachers. The lessons support students with developing social awareness, self-awareness, self-management, relationship skills, and responsible decision making.

School Social Workers: Provide Social Emotional Support in group and individual settings. Social Workers also provide suicide prevention, intervention and postvention services.

Second Step K-2, 7-8: Second Step is a violence-prevention program that focuses on developing social-emotional skills for students in preschool through eighth grade with the goal of improving academic success.

Section 504 Team Meetings: Section 504 team meetings provide a multi-disciplinary approach to addressing behavior for students who are eligible for such a plan.

Servant Leadership Academy: This program teaches emotional intelligence, understanding servant leadership, the pillars of a positive self-concept, culture, and implementing a service-before-self mindset. Students from throughout the county are guided through a seven-day program where they are challenged to examine and analyze their behaviors towards themselves and others. Every high school selects their students based on leadership potential and the ability to impact their peers.

Social Emotional Counseling: Tier II individual or group counseling services provided to students by Restorative Practices School Counselors in the focus areas of healthy relationships, coping skills, stress and anxiety, grief and loss, positive self-identity and mindfulness. Students

are referred to services through the site's Tier II Team. All services are provided from a restorative, trauma-informed and culturally responsive lens. They promote equitable outcomes and reduce disproportionality by providing SEL skill building to reduce disproportionate outcomes for students.

Social Emotional Learning: Social-emotional learning (SEL) is the process of developing the self-awareness, self-control, and interpersonal skills that are vital for school, work, and life success. From effective problem-solving to self-discipline, from impulse control to emotion management and more, SEL provides a foundation for positive, long-term effects on kids, adults, and communities. SEL advances educational equity through school-family-community partnerships and establishing learning environments with trusting and collaborative relationships. Students need explicit SEL instruction and consistent opportunities to learn, practice, and reflect on social and emotional competencies in ways that are developmentally appropriate and culturally responsive.

Student Study/Success Teams (SST): The SST process emphasizes that early intervention for struggling students is a function of the general education program. The SST is a school-based problem solving team composed primarily of general educators who provide support to teachers to improve the quality of the general education program and reduce the underachievement of students. An SST is a "think-tank", a peer support group, or a forum for structured and routine focus on addressing student needs. The intervention team is a common sense approach that offers a systematic process to successfully close the gap through which students have traditionally fallen. The team is not so much a "new" service, but rather it builds on existing services and efforts in order to upgrade the school's ability to respond effectively to student needs. The SST has a vital role in creating a high achieving school as expressed in the following goals: 1) enable teachers to teach students more effectively, 2) enable students to acquire academic and social competencies, achieve standards, become independent learners for life, and 3) create a collaborative culture among all staff.

Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD): This group meets twice a week during lunch to discuss alternatives to destructive decisions. These students also counsel other students away from making destructive decisions.

Suicide Prevention Training: Suicide prevention training teaches best and evidence-based suicide prevention practices, warning signs for student suicide, prevention and postvention principles, how to reintegrate a student after a suicide attempt, dealing with traumatic loss, risk factors for student suicide, how to assess a youth at risk, how to work with parents of a student at risk, creating safety contracts for students at risk, and contagion.

Support Intervention (SI): Groups last 8 weeks and include topics such as teen issues, anger management, grief and loss, divorce, and other topics as needed. Students are recommended for the groups by certificated staff, classified staff, or parents/guardians/responsible adults.

School Transition Services (STS): Transitional Team Members support students moving to Alternative Education Sites as well as support their return back to a comprehensive site.

Targeted Support Team (TST): The primary function of the Targeted Support Team (TST) is to focus on improving academic, social emotional, behavioral, mental health outcomes for students. The team functions on the principles of PLCs, systematically engaged in the process of identifying needs, analyzing relevant data, designing and implementing solutions, and measuring and monitoring effectiveness of student interventions. The TST meets bi-weekly to engage in the problem-solving cycle and identify patterns of students needing Tier II support. The TST reviews data to monitor student progress and adjusts intervention accordingly. This teaming structure is in place to ensure equity and reduce disproportionate student outcomes.

Time to Teach: Is an evidenced based classroom management model that uses practical, proven, and powerful strategies.

Transition Program: Designed for students that require social emotional support during the day. Students can be served in the transition classroom for three period or less.

UJIMA: The concept of servant leadership is a philosophy and set of practices that enriches the lives of individuals, and ultimately creates a more just and caring world. Ujima, uses this philosophy and incorporates the rich and empowering history of African and African American contributors, to promote personal healing, self and cultural awareness, and a community building mindset.

Xinachtli: Xinachtli is an indigenous, culturally based female rites of passage program that provides a supportive process for young girls to develop identity, life skills, and support system (3-day training).

Youth Court: Youth Court is a diversion program for students who are first-time offenders. It was developed as an alternative to the juvenile justice system. Juvenile cases are heard on high school campuses where the Youth Court functions primarily as a sentencing body and does not determine innocence or guilt. Youth Court enables high school students to learn more about the justice system and play an active role in promoting acceptable "safe school" standards for student behavior. Youth Court paves the way for early intervention and prevention by taking steps to redirect negative student behavior and prevent the occurrence of more serious crimes. The interagency partners charged with implementing the program include the Fresno County Superior Court, Fresno County Probation, and the Fresno Police Department.

IV. Alternative Placement for Students who Fail in District Community Day Schools

Students who have been placed in a district community day school, but fail to meet the terms or conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district students may be referred to another district's community day school program or to FCSS Community School Program. These programs will then proceed with their referral processes to see if they will accept this student.

V. District Responsibilities

In accordance with Sections 48916 and 48916.1 of the Education Code, the school district of residence will be responsible for: 1) recommending a rehabilitation plan for expelled students; 2)

ensuring that an educational program is provided to expelled students; and 3) complying with the state reporting requirements.

VI. Suspension and Expulsion Data

The most recent suspension data from the California Department of Education ("CDE") for Fresno County in program years 2017, 2018, and 2019 shows a slight increase from 3.8% in 2017 to 4.3% in 2019. The mean percent of students suspended at least once increased each year though the increase was minimal from 2017-2019. In the elementary districts, suspensions increased slightly from 1.5% to 2.4% in 2019; in the unified districts, suspensions increased slightly from 4.8% in 2017 to 5.4% in 2019.

Historically marginalized student groups generally saw a decrease in suspension rates in program years 2018 to 2019 and a slight increase when comparing data from 2017 – 2019. The results are as follows: Black/African American students had 0% of students suspended in 2017-2019 for elementary districts and the unified districts suspension rates saw a decrease from 12.4% in 2017 to 11.9% in 2019; Hispanic students saw an increase in suspension rates in the elementary districts in 2017 to 2018 at 1.8% in 2017 to 2.7% in 2018, then saw a decrease in 2019 to 2.3%, the unified districts saw a slight increase from 4.9% in 2017 to 5.3% in 2018 to 5.5% in 2019; Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students saw a slight increase over 2017 – 2019 with elementary districts suspension rates at 2.0% in 2017, 2.6% in 2018, and decreasing to 2.2% in 2019; Students with Disabilities showed a slight increase in suspension rates for elementary districts at 2.5% in 2017, 4.0% in 2018, and 3.7% in 2019, the unified districts show a decrease in suspensions rates at 9.1% in 2017, 8.6% in 2018, and deceasing to 7.8% in 2019.

Overall while suspension rates increased minimally over the three-year period; the results largely remain static. Suspension data is thoroughly analyzed throughout the school year and strategies to improve student outcomes is reflected upon and revised as student needs indicate. These strategies are written into the Local Control for Accountability Plans at each school district. The behavioral intervention practices have been revised in this plan to reflect this analysis with additional strategies for student success added and the strategies proven unsuccessful removed.

This data shows a steady decline in expulsions in our county over the past three years reducing from 0.18% in 2017-18 to 0.10% in 2019-20. In the previous countywide plan our data indicated a 50% decline in expulsions and this three year data comparison indicates a 44% decline. This decline in expulsions is indicative of the behavioral intervention approaches and strategies that have been prioritized and implemented by the school districts. In 2017-18 our expulsion rate was twice the statewide rate, but now we are trending toward closing that gap with the statewide rate at 0.06% in 2019-20 and the Fresno County rate at 0.10%. The implemented strategies to minimize student expulsions are seeing positive results for students and the district behavioral intervention teams will continue to implement the strategies showing the most progress. It should also be noted that data for the 2019-20 school year was likely effected by COVID-19 school closures beginning March 13, 2020.

Appendix A: Relevant Education Codes

Cal Ed Code § 48926 County plan for educational services to expelled pupils

Each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. The plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the county board of education.

The plan shall enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils, identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps. The plan shall also identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

Each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts, shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the county plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in the county no later than June 30, 1997, and shall submit a triennial update to the plan to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, including the outcome data pursuant to Section 48916.1, on June 30th thereafter.

Cal Ed Code § 48916.1 District to ensure provision of educational program for expelled pupils; Data and reports

- (a) At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Except for pupils expelled pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 48915, the governing board of a school district is required to implement the provisions of this section only to the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose in the annual Budget Act or other legislation, or both
- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (a) may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.
- (c) Any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) may not be situated within or on the grounds of the school from which the pupil was expelled.
- (d) If the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order was expelled from any of kindergarten or grades 1 to 6, inclusive, the educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) may not be combined or merged with educational programs offered to pupils in any of grades 7 to 12, inclusive. The district or county program is the only program required to be provided to expelled pupils as determined by the governing board of the school district. This subdivision, as it relates to the separation of pupils by grade levels, does not apply to community day schools offering instruction in any of kindergarten and grades 1 to 8, inclusive, and established in accordance with Section 48660.
- (e) (1) Each school district shall maintain the following data:
 - (A) The number of pupils recommended for expulsion.
 - (B) The grounds for each recommended expulsion.
 - (C) Whether the pupil was subsequently expelled.
 - (D) Whether the expulsion order was suspended.
 - (E) The type of referral made after the expulsion.
 - (F) The disposition of the pupil after the end of the period of expulsion.
 - (2) The Superintendent may require a school district to report this data as part of the coordinated compliance review. If a school district does not report outcome data as required by this subdivision, the Superintendent may not apportion any further money to the school district pursuant to Section 48664 until the school district is in compliance with this subdivision. Before withholding the apportionment of funds to a school district pursuant to this subdivision, the Superintendent shall give written notice to the governing board of the school district that the school district has failed to report the data required by paragraph (1) and that the school district has 30 calendar days from the date of the written notice of noncompliance to report the requested data and thereby avoid the withholding of the apportionment of funds.
- (f) If the county superintendent of schools is unable for any reason to serve the expelled pupils of a school district within the county, the governing board of that school district may enter into an agreement with a county superintendent of schools in another county to provide education services for the district's expelled pupils.

Mentor Teachers will gain a clear vision of high-quality teaching and mentoring that applies research-based best practices around adult learning theory.

The goal is to enhance the professional development of CUSD's Mentor Teachers in the support of novice teachers to create and sustain an optimal learning environment in which the diverse needs of each learner are addressed with an unwavering attention to equity and continuous academic, social, and emotional growth.

DISCUSSION:

The Clovis Unified School District and Clovis Online Charter School 2021-24 Local Control and Accountability Plans (LCAP) are being submitted to the Governing Board for Action at the June 9, 2021, Board meeting. The District LCAP was developed with input from parents/guardians, employees, students and community members. Feedback was collected and processed prior to the development of the LCAP. The Charter School LCAP is aligned with the District LCAP.

DISCUSSION:

Federal and State laws require that all Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPAs) annually submit an Annual Service Plan (ASP) and Annual Budget Plan (ABP).

The ASP includes a description of services to be provided by the Clovis Unified SELPA including the nature of services and the physical location where the services will be provided. This includes alternative schools, charter school, opportunity schools and classes, the community day school operated by the Fresno County Superintendent of Schools, the juvenile court school and county jails.

The 2021-22 budget and savings from the 2020-21 fiscal year are funding this proposal. Based on the Governor's May Revise for 2020-21 the State is projecting a 5.07% Mega COLA for the fully implemented LCFF funding formula. The COLA and increased three-year average unduplicated pupil percentage of 50.11% compared to 48.85% in 2020-21 will generate an additional \$20.9 million of "new", ongoing revenues. Categorical programs will receive a COLA of 1.70%.

The District's General Fund reserve is projected to be 20.72% for 2020-21, as of the Third Quarter budget projection. The District reviews the current budget and five subsequent budgets (5 years) to determine our ability to afford any compensation increases. Based on this multi-year projection, that includes all future projected revenues and expenditures, the District's general reserve is not projected to drop below 16.3%.

No contingency language
5) Will this agreement create, increase, or decrease deficit financing in the current or two subsequent year(s)? Deficit Financing is defined to exist when a fund's expenditures and other financing uses exceed its revenues and other financing sources in a given year. If yes, explain the amounts and justification for doing so.
Yes, this will increase the District's operating deficit. However, it should be noted, the District has a 20.72% reserve as of the Third Quarter 2020-21 fiscal year budget. The reserve percentage typically increases by 1-2% upon closing the books. Given the current financial information and multi-year projection, the District is projecting a 16.19% for 21-22, 17.35% for 22-23, and 16.32% for 23-24. These reserve percentages were calculated taking the 5.5% on schedule salary increase, longevity adjustment for classified employees, and the off schedule compensation for all employees into consideration. This reserve level is well above the State required 2% and exceeds the Clovis Unified Board approved minimum reserve of 10%.

The district has modified the Certificated duty day calendar from 188 days to 186 days. There is no financial impact.

STUDENTS

Rights and Responsibilities

OPEN/CLOSED CAMPUS, LEAVING THE CAMPUS

PURPOSE: To establish policy for student permission to leave campus during the school day.

Students are not authorized to leave any campus of the District during the school day without a valid off campus pass. Students who leave campus without authorization shall be considered to have an unexcused absence. Off campus passes are issued under the supervision of the school principal.

Upon receipt of a written request of the student's parents/legal guardians, the principal or designee may authorize students with senior standing to leave campus at lunch time subject to the following rules and regulations:

- 1. Permission slips shall be signed by both parents and/or guardians and be placed on file with the high school administration.
- 2. Parental permission, in writing, shall exempt the District from all liability during the period of absence from the campus.
- 3. This privilege is granted to seniors in good standing as determined by the principal or designee.
- 4. For good and sufficient reasons, the school principal may revoke the off-campus privilege for any and all senior students.
- 5. Conditions of this policy may be changed if factors such as commercial development and related matters become an issue.
- 6. This policy shall be reviewed annually.

Nothing in this policy shall impact a student's right to leave campus for an authorized medical appointment pursuant to law and board policy.

A student violation of this policy is termed willful defiance of the valid authority of the school principal and the Board directs that the principal or designee may administer any appropriate disciplinary action, including suspension.

Neither the District nor any officer or employee thereof shall be liable for the conduct or safety of any student during such time as the student has left the school grounds pursuant to this policy and Education Code section 44808.5.

INTRA-DISTRICT TRANSFERS/OPEN ENROLLMENT - ANNUAL

PURPOSE:

Establish a process for intra-district transfers and open enrollment within the District for students who are in grades TK-12 and students who reside in the District.

A. Intradistrict Transfers (Short-Term)

Notwithstanding Board Policy No. 5111.1, the Board recognizes that students and families have unique needs deserving special consideration and authorizes the Superintendent to establish procedures and an administrative regulation to provide for students who reside within the District to attend schools other than in the school determined by the residence of the student.

The Board recognizes that class capacity considerations may require the administrative transfer of students from one school to another. The Superintendent or designee is authorized to implement the administrative transfer of students from one school to another when grade level enrollment exceeds capacity.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine annually the capacity of each District school. This determination of school site capacity shall be based on nonarbitrary data-driven factors relating to pupil enrollment and available school site space, including permanent and portable classrooms at each school site that can be supported by the on-site infrastructure (restrooms, multi-purpose rooms, library media center, etc.) as defined in Board Policy No. 7110.2 – School Capacity Parameters.

Approval of any Intradistrict Transfer Application is subject to space availability at the receiving school. A student, not a resident in the attendance area of the receiving school, shall not attend that school at the expense of a student who resides within that school's attendance area or who has been granted an open enrollment transfer thus declaring them a resident of that school. Intradistrict transfer students are subject to overflow should the grade level exceed District established class capacity.

All Intradistrict Transfer Applications will be evaluated based on space availability, diverse needs of students and parents/guardians, safety concerns, program availability, and the reason given for the transfer.

It is the intent of the Board that special consideration be afforded transfer requests for school children (grades TK-8) based upon provisions for childcare during non-school hours. Additional special considerations for approval of transfers will be outlined in the administrative regulation.

It is the parent's responsibility to provide transportation for the student to and from the school of requested attendance.

All requests for transfers must be submitted in writing and signed by the parent/guardian. Transfers may be approved only until the next open enrollment period opens and the preceding school year begins. Attendance the following school year is subject to Board Policy No. 5111.1.

Students who are approved for an intradistrict transfer and are entering grades 7-12 are ineligible for athletics for 365 days, unless an exception applies as provided in Board Policy/Administrative Regulation No. 6145.

Authorization or approval by the District of a student's intradistrict transfer does not result in the student obtaining eligibility for District interscholastic athletics for grades 4-12. Following a student's intradistrict transfer into a new District school, the determination of the student's eligibility for interscholastic athletics will be based upon the requirements, standards and guidelines set forth in Board Policy No. 6145 - Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular.

The intra-district transfer is a short-term transfer. Approved intradistrict transfers may not be renewed. For transfers longer than 18 months, families must use the open enrollment process.

Parents wishing a review and/or an appeal of an intradistrict transfer decision will present such request to the Director of Student Services and School Attendance for final determination.

B. Open Enrollment (Long-Term)

The Board intends that the parent/guardian of each school-age child who resides within the District shall have the opportunity to select the school the child shall attend, irrespective of the particular location of the child's residence within the District, provided that such attendance does not create a school safety issue, exceed space availability, or there is not a specific program limitation among the schools of the District.

Boundary lines for elementary school attendance areas are established using the concept of the neighborhood school. Attendance areas for intermediate and high schools are established to meet the diverse needs and interests of District students and parents/guardians, while also maximizing the efficient use of District facilities and resources.

The parents/guardians of any student who resides within District boundaries may apply to enroll their child in any District school, regardless of the location of their residence within the District and regardless of the student's enrollment in a private or charter school.

The Board also intends that a student whose legal residence is within the attendance boundaries of a school or a prior Open Enrollment Transfer Application shall not be displaced by a student not residing within that school's attendance boundaries.

Transportation for students shall be provided pursuant to District board policies.

Students who are approved for an open enrollment transfer and are entering grades 7-12 are ineligible for athletics for 365 days, unless an exception applies as provided in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 6145.

Authorization or approval by the District of an open enrollment transfer of students entering grades 7-12 does not result in the student obtaining eligibility for District interscholastic athletics for grades 4-12. Following a student's open enrollment transfer into a new District school, the determination of the student's eligibility for interscholastic athletics will be based upon the requirements, standards, and guidelines set forth in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 6145.

Any parent/guardian wishing to obtain a transfer under the sibling rule to remain in the original attendance area (Board Policy No. 5116) must follow the open enrollment transfer application requirements. Students who are granted and accept an open enrollment transfer under the sibling rule may be granted athletic eligibility as a hardship based on California Interscholastic Federation (C.I.F.) Central Section Bylaw 213 Hardship Waivers, District Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 6145.

The Superintendent shall prepare an administrative regulation to provide the parents/guardians of a school-age child with the opportunity to select the school their child shall attend within the District. Such regulations shall include:

- a. Procedures to determine the student capacity for each school.
- b. Procedures to assure that no student who currently resides in the attendance area of a school or has resident status shall be displaced by students transferring from outside the attendance area.
- c. A selection procedure for schools that receive requests for admission in excess of the student capacity of the school.
- d. A process for notifying the parents/guardians of students at the beginning of the first semester or quarter of the regular school term of this policy and of all current statutory attendance options and local attendance options available in the District.

Any complaints regarding the selection process shall be submitted to the Director of Student Services and School Attendance or designee.

The Board shall annually review this policy.

Student Activities
CO-CURRICULAR AND EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

PURPOSE: To establish parameters for co-curricular and extra-curricular programs, including

academic and ethical standards.

A. General Program Parameters

The Board believes that the District's goals and objectives are best achieved by a diversity of learning experiences, some of which are more appropriately conducted outside the regular classroom curricular program of the school.

The Board further believes that students should have the opportunity to participate in programs that will allow them to reach their full potential. Students should learn to develop the ability to assess and interpret what it takes to be successful, develop proficiency in the skills associated with each activity or sport, and develop the personal qualities of discipline, commitment, sportsmanship, and a lifetime commitment to excellence.

It is important that every student, coach, and advisor be an exemplary role model for the school, community and each other, and that they reflect the strong value the Board places upon character. The coach, advisor, and student must recognize that the purpose of activities is to promote the physical, mental, moral, and emotional well-being of the individual student. For all extra-curricular activities at grades 7-12, including sports, the coach/advisor, student, and parent/guardian shall each sign and follow the District's Codes of Conduct, Exhibits No. 6145(1), 6145(2), 6145(3), and 6145(5). The District shall further post Codes of Conduct for spectators and officials, Exhibits No. 6145(4) and 6145(6).

The Board's policy is to offer opportunities for students to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities in accordance with applicable federal and state laws. No District student's participation in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities shall be required or refused based on the student's gender, sexual orientation, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability.

The Superintendent shall adopt an administrative regulation that sets forth Codes of Conduct for coaches and advisors, students, parents/guardians, spectators and officials, and parameters for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the District.

B. Definitions

"Extra-curricular activities" shall include those activities that are not part of the regular school curriculum, are not graded, and do not take place during classroom time. Such activities shall ordinarily be supervising or financed by the District; students participating in extra-curricular activities represent the District; students may exercise some degree of freedom in their selection,

planning, or control of the program; and extra-curricular activities typically include the preparation for performance and performance before an audience or spectators. Extra-curricular activities include District athletic programs and interscholastic athletics.

"Co-curricular activities" shall include those programs that are associated with the curricular in a regular classroom. However, such activities do not include any required program that satisfies the entrance requirements to California State University or University of California. Also, programs that have, as their primary goal, the improvement of academic or educational achievement are not considered "co-curricular activities."

C. Elementary, Intermediate and High School Interscholastic Athletics

The Board intends to provide an opportunity for all students to participate in interscholastic athletics. The Board also intends to encourage students to participate in athletics at the school in their attendance area.

The Board recognizes the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) as the regulatory body for interscholastic athletics for grades nine through twelve. Interscholastic athletics for grades nine through twelve shall be conducted in accordance with this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation and shall comply with CIF rules except when this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation establishes a higher standard than the CIF rules.

Although CIF is not the regulatory body for interscholastic athletics for grades seven and eight, the Board adopts CIF rules pertaining to residential and transfer eligibility to interscholastic athletics for grades seven and eight. However, any residential and/or transfer eligibility determinations with regard to seventh and eighth grades will be made by the District, and the District's determinations are final and not subject to appeal to CIF or any other administrative agencies. The District shall apply CIF rules as appropriate with respect to seventh and eighth grade interscholastic athletics in the District.

The Superintendent shall adopt an administrative regulation that sets forth residential and transfer eligibility requirements for interscholastic athletics for seventh through twelfth grades as well as certain academic and other qualifications and requirements for participation in interscholastic athletics for all District students.

Eligibility and other requirements for participation in elementary level athletics will be governed by the administrative regulation established by the Superintendent, as well as the District's Elementary Athletic Handbook.

The Board shall annually review this policy as required by Education Code section 35160.5.

D. Community Activities

The Board recognizes the social and scholastic values that may be derived by students participating in various activities sponsored by community organizations. To prevent unreasonable demand on the time and energies of students and staff, requests for student participation in community sponsored activities must be made in writing to the site administrator and be approved by the Superintendent or designee. Any requests from civic institutions or special interest groups involving students in such activities as patriotic functions, contests, and exhibits must be carefully reviewed to ensure that such activities promote student interests without advancing the special interests of any particular group and that students participating do so voluntarily.

STUDENT WELLNESS

PURPOSE: To provide school environments that promote and protect student health and wellbeing, and the ability to learn.

The Board recognizes the link between student health and learning and desires to provide a comprehensive program promoting healthy eating and physical activity for District students. The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate and align District efforts to support student wellness through health education, physical education and activity, health services, nutrition services, psychological and counseling services, and a safe and healthy school environment. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for involving parents/guardians and the community in reinforcing students' understanding and appreciation of the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

The Board shall establish policies that address coordinated school wellness within the context of the seven-ten listed components. Coordinated school wellness is an integrated and collaborative approach that includes the following modules:

- 1. School health and safety policies and Physical environment.
- 2. Health education.
- 3. Physical education and other physical activity programs.
- 4. Nutrition environment and services.
- 5. School-Health services.
- 6. School Counseling, psychological, and social services.
- 7. Employee wellness.
- 8. Family engagement.
- 6-9. Social and emotional climate
- 7.10. Family and Community Involvement.

Each module shall include an annual evaluation/appraisal instrument (e.g. S.A.R.T. Surveys, California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS), Physical Fitness Testing (PFT), School Health Index (SHI), Uniform Management Information & Reporting System (UMIRS)) to determine progress

toward achieving action plan recommendations of this policy. The policy will be revised on a triennial basis.

The Board directs the Superintendent or designee to establish a Coordinated School Wellness Health Committee (CSHWC) to develop, implement, monitor, and review coordinated school wellness plans. The CSHWC will serve as a resource to school sites for implementing this policy and will recommend changes, improvements, and adjustments to existing coordinated school wellness. The CSHWC shall meet twice each school year in the fall and spring. The CSHWC shall provide input to the Board for wellness plans and procedures based upon changing laws, regulations, and community input.

The CSHWC may consist of individuals representing District schools and the community, which may include (1) parents; (2) students; (3) representatives from the District such as Campus Catering, school administrators, school nurses, health educators, physical educators, teachers, health professionals, school counselors, and school psychologists; (4) community members; and/or (5) representatives of the 10 modules for whole school, whole child, whole community wellness policy.

The Superintendent shall designate primary leadership of the CSHWC to a Steering Committee with representation from health and wellness, student auxiliary services, Nursing Services, nutrition and food services, Curriculum Services and InnovationInstruction, and a community agency liaison. The Steering Committee shall meet on a quarterly basis to collect and disseminate information on the effectiveness of Coordinated School Wellness action plans.

The Steering Committee shall be responsible for working with the CSHWC to build agendas, conduct surveys, and develop reports of progress. A report of progress toward achieving action plan goals in each module shall be presented to the Board every two years. The public will be notified of the CSHC's progress via the District's website and CUSD Today.

Admissions Residency and Attendance

ADMISSION/ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

PURPOSE: To set forth requirements and procedures regarding admission and enrollment of

all school-aged children, including admission to kindergarten and transitional

kindergarten and promotion to first grade.

The Board encourages the enrollment and appropriate placement of all school-aged children in school. The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of children seeking admission to a District school at any grade level about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures. Students whose residence is within Board-established attendance boundaries shall attend that school subject to the provisions outlined in Board Policy and Administration Regulation No. 5111.1.

A. Admission To Kindergarten And Transitional Kindergarten

- 1. A child shall be admitted to kindergarten during the first month of a school year, or at a later time in the same year if the child attains the age of five on or before September 1 of that school year.
- 2. A child shall be admitted to a transitional kindergarten program if the child attains the age of five between September 2 and December 2 of that school year.
- 3. Transitional kindergarten is the first year of a two year kindergarten program that uses a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate. Students who enroll in transitional kindergarten will be admitted to kindergarten the following school year.

B. Early Admission To Kindergarten

Parent(s)/guardian(s) requesting to enroll a child in kindergarten earlier than the State guidelines allow must initiate an appointment with the principal or designee of their child's school and present compelling evidence for their request. Compelling evidence may be comprised of academic and psychological social-emotional documentation that supports the parents'/guardians' assertion that their child is prepared to enter kindergarten. Parents/guardians must be given information regarding the advantages and disadvantages and any other explanatory information about the effect of this early admission. Should the principal or designee find merit in the request, the principal or designee will request that the school psychologist and a kindergarten teacher conduct an evaluation of the student's academic, social, and physical readiness. The results of this evaluation will form the site's rationale for supporting or denying the request for early admission and be provided to the parents/guardians and area assistant superintendent in writing.

Should the school site support early admission, the area assistant superintendent will present the principal's or designee's written support to the Board for approval.

All requests for early enrollment in kindergarten must be approved by the Board, who must determine that the admittance is in the best interest of the child.

C. Promotion From Kindergarten To First Grade

- 1. It is a policy of the Board that a child who has been lawfully admitted to a public school or private school kindergarten in California and who has attained at least five years of age may be placed in the first grade with the consent of the parent/guardian and at the discretion of the principal or designee of an elementary school operated by the District if it is determined by the principal or designee that the child is ready for first grade work. Parent(s)/guardian(s) requesting that their child be enrolled in first grade before completing kindergarten must initiate an appointment with the principal or designee of their child's school and provide compelling evidence for their request. Compelling evidence may be comprised of academic and psychological documentation that supports the parents'/guardians' assertion that their child is prepared to enter first grade.
- 2. The principal or designee shall assure that a kindergarten student considered for placement in the first grade shall meet the following minimum criteria:
 - a. The kindergarten student has attended a public school kindergarten for a sufficient time to allow an evaluation of the student's academic ability.
 - b. The student is in the upper 5% of his or her peers in terms of general academic performance. All students who appear eligible (either by parent request or teacher observations) shall be given a group or individual readiness test designated by the principal or designee within the first two weeks after the opening of school. The principal or designee may require other tests as deemed necessary. The results of these tests will form the site's rationale for supporting or denying the request for early promotion to the parents/guardians and area assistant superintendent in writing.
 - c. The student shall exhibit advanced physical development and social maturity at the time of the request. Further, it should be reasonably expected that these advanced characteristics will be maintained as the student advances through the grades.
 - d. The parent shall file a written acknowledgement approving placement in the first grade after a conference with the principal or designee and the teacher.

D. Entrance To First Grade

1. A child who, consistent with Education Code section 48000, has been admitted to a kindergarten maintained by a private or a public school in California or any other state, and who has completed one school year therein, shall be admitted to the first grade of an elementary school, unless the parent or guardian of the child and the District agree that the child may continue in kindergarten for no more than an additional school year.

CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

A year of attendance in kindergarten does not in itself qualify a child for admission to the first grade, unless the child was properly eligible underage requirements of Education Code section 48000 at the time the child began the year of kindergarten.

2. A child who is six years of age can enter school at any time.

Admissions Residency and School Attendance

DISTRICT RESIDENCY/STUDENT RESIDENCE AND STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Student Residency

A. Criteria for Residency

A student shall be deemed to have complied with District residency requirements for enrollment in a District school if he/she meets any of the following criteria:

- 1. The student's parent/guardian resides within District boundaries. (Education Code 48200)
- 2. The student is placed within District boundaries in a regularly established licensed children's institution, a licensed foster home, or a family home pursuant to a court-ordered commitment or placement. (Education Code 48204)
- 3. The student is admitted through an interdistrict attendance option, such as an interdistrict attendance agreement, "school district of choice" transfer, or Open Enrollment Act transfer. (Education Code 46600, 48204, 48301, 48356)
- 4. The student is an emancipated minor residing within District boundaries. (Education Code 48204)
- 5. The student lives with a caregiving adult within District boundaries and the caregiving adult submits an affidavit to that effect. (Education Code 48204)
- 6. The student resides in a state hospital located within District boundaries. (Education Code 48204)
- 7. The student is confined to a hospital or other residential health facility within District boundaries for treatment of a temporary disability. (Education Code 48204, 48207)
- 8. The student's parent/guardian resides outside District boundaries but is employed within District boundaries and lives with the student at the place of employment for a minimum of three days during the school week. (Education Code 48204)
- 9. The student's parent/guardian, while on active military duty pursuant to an official military order, is transferred or is pending transfer to a military installation within District boundaries. (Education Code 48204.3)

10. The student's parent/guardian was a resident of California who departed the state against his/her will due to a transfer by a government agency that had custody of the parent/guardian, a lawful order from a court or government agency authorizing his/her removal, or removal or departure pursuant to the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, and the student lived in California immediately before moving out of state as a result of his/her parent/guardian's departure. (Education Code 48204.4)

B. Proof of Residency

Evidence of residency may be established by documentation showing the name and address of the parent/guardian within the District, including, but not limited to, any of the following: (Education Code 48204.1)

- 1. Property tax payment receipt.
- 2. Rental property contract, lease, or payment receipt, or escrow papers demonstrating close of escrow within 45 days.
- 3. Utility service contract, statement, or payment receipt.
- 4. Pay stub.
- 5. Voter registration.
- 6. Correspondence from a government agency.
- 7. Declaration of residency executed by the student's parent/guardian.
- 8. If the student is an unaccompanied youth as defined in 42 USC section 11434a, a declaration of residency executed by the student.
- 9. If the student is residing in the home of a caregiving adult within District boundaries, an affidavit executed by the caregiving adult in accordance with Family Code section 6552.

A parent/guardian who is transferred or pending transfer into a military installation within the state shall provide proof of residence in the District within 10 days after the published arrival date provided on official documentation. For this purpose, he/she may use as his/her address a temporary on-base billeting facility, a purchased or leased home or apartment, or federal government or public-private venture off-base military housing. (Education Code 48204.3)

A student whose parent/guardian's departure from the state occurred against his/her will pursuant to item 10 in the section "Criteria for Residency" above shall be in compliance with District residency requirements if he/she provides official documentation of the

parent/guardian's departure and evidence demonstrating that the student was enrolled in a public school in California immediately before moving outside the state. (Education Code 48204.4)

Any homeless or foster youth or student who has had contact with the juvenile justice system shall be immediately enrolled in school even if he/shethe student is unable to provide proof of residency. (Education Code 48645.5, 48852.7,48853.5; 42 USC 11432)

When a student is presented for enrollment in a school and legal residence of the student is not the residence of the parent, the student or the student and the student's parent, guardian or custodian shall be referred to the Office of Student Services and School Attendance (SSSA) for residence determinations.

Upon referral, the Director of Student Services and School Attendance (Director of SSSA) or designee will meet with the student, or the student and the student's parent, guardian, custodian, social worker or probation officer and review the evidence that placement or commitment is pursuant to law and Board Policy No. 22025111.1, Exhibit No. 2202-5111.1(3), Exhibit No. 22025111.1 (4), and Exhibit No. 2202-5111.1(5).

C. Confidential Address Program

In extreme cases, when a student or parent/guardian provides documentation that their address needs to be concealed for safety purposes, such as participation in the Safe at Home program, the Superintendent or designee shall request that the District use the substitute address, such as the address designated by the Secretary of State in the Safe at Home program. However, the Superintendent or designee may request the actual residence address for the purpose of establishing residency within District boundaries but shall use the substitute address for all future communications and correspondence and shall not include the actual address in the student's file or any other public record. (Government Code 6206, 6207)

D. Homeless Students

As stated above, homeless students living in the District will be immediately enrolled in a District school in accordance with state and federal law and District policy, even if the student is unable to produce records normally required for enrollment, such as proof of residency. Alternative proofs of residency may include any of the following:

- 1. Hotel or motel receipts.
- 2. A letter from a social service agency or homeless shelter that verifies the student lives within the District's boundaries.
- 3. An affidavit from the student's parent/guardian that states the family lives within the District's jurisdictional boundaries.

4. Verification by SSSA Attendance Officers.

Placement determinations for homeless students will be made in accordance with the students' best interests, law, and District policy.

The enrolling school will immediately contact the last school attended by the student to obtain relevant academic and other records. The enrolling school will also refer the parent or guardian of the student to the District's homeless liaison who will assist in obtaining any necessary immunizations for the student or obtaining the student's immunization or medical records.

A reasonable effort will be made to secure an address, phone number, and medical release from the student's parent/guardian when the student is placed in a District classroom.

E. Employment-Based Residency

Pursuant to California Education Code section 48204(b), a parent/guardian seeking residency status on the basis of his/her employment within District boundaries shall submit proof of the employment which may include, but not be limited to, a paycheck stub or letter from his/her employer listing a physical address within District boundaries. Such evidence shall also indicate the number of hours or days per school week that the parent/guardian is employed at that location. The parent/guardian employment within the boundaries of the District must be, at a minimum, 10 hours per week.

When a student is presented for enrollment and the student's residence is pursuant to Education Code section 48204(b) of the California Education Code,), the parent or guardian will complete a Parent/Guardian Annual Request and Employment Verification, Exhibit No. 2202-5111.1(6).

No student seeking residency on this basis shall be denied enrollment based on race, ethnicity, sex, parental income, scholastic achievement, or any of the individual characteristics set forth in Education Code section 220. However, the Superintendent or designee may deny enrollment into the District based on circumstances identified in Education Code section 48204, including where the additional cost of educating the student would exceed the amount of additional state aid received as a result of the transfer, where there is overcrowding of school facilities at the relevant grade level, and where other circumstances exist that are not arbitrary.

When the Director of Student Services and School Attendance or designee validates the information on the Parent/Guardian Annual Request and Employment Verification; (Exhibit No. 5111.1(6)), the student will be assigned to attend a specific school as a resident of the District. Once assigned to a school and subject to the parent or guardian maintaining and verifying employment within the boundaries of the District each year, placement is valid through the 12th grade in the school's attendance area. The parent or guardian must resubmit ana Parent/Guardian Annual Request and Employment Verification Form annually(Exhibit

No. 5111.1(6)) for the student to continue to have resident status and continue to attend school in the Clovis Unified School District (CUSD).

When a student is assigned to attend a specific school as a resident of its district due to Employment Verification, his/her athletic eligibility will follow the same process as an interdistrict transfer student. Students entering a CUSD school for the time in grades 7-12, based on employment verification, will be ineligible for athletic participation for one calendar year (365 days) from the date of first attendance within the District at the student's new school. A student may appeal the 365 days of ineligibility to the CUSD Eligibility Committee. The appeal will follow the hardship guidelines under CIF Bylaw 208. (See Board Policy No. 2505, Administrative Regulation No. 2505, Section E.)

The Director of Student Services and School Attendance shall identify and communicate in writing to the student's parent/guardian; the specific reasons for any denial of admission.

When a student is assigned to attend a specific school as a resident the District due to employment verification (Exhibit No. 5111.1(6)), the student's eligibility for interscholastic athletics will require a separate review based on the requirements, standards and guidelines set forth in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 6145 – Co-Curricular and Extra Curricular Activities. Any appeal of athletic ineligibility will be heard by the CUSD Eligibility Committee. The appeal will follow the hardship guidelines under California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Bylaws. (See Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 6145.)

The Superintendent or designee may deny a transfer out of the District by a student whose parent/guardian is employed within the boundaries of another school district if the difference between the number of students entering and exiting the District on the basis of parent/guardian employment exceeds the limits prescribed in Education Code section 48204. (Education Code 48204)

F. Parent/Legal-Guardian and Student Living with Employer

If a student and his/her parent/legal guardian are residing in the home of an employer of the parent/legal guardian for a minimum of three days during the school week, the parent/guardian shall submit a Declaration of Legal Residency (Exhibit No. 5111.1(3)) confirming the parent/legal guardian's residency with a copy of an employment contract that includes a provision that the parent/legal guardian resides at the employer's residence in the District's boundaries. (Education Code 48204(a)(7))

G. Residency Investigation

If any District employee is aware of specific and articulable facts that the parent/guardian of a student has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency, the Student Services and School Attendance Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist shall make reasonable efforts to determine that the student meets District residency requirements.

Reasonable efforts shall include no more than three address verifications by CUSDDistrict Attendance Officers. (Education Code 48204.1, 48204.2)

Specific and articulable facts that a parent/legal—guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency include, without limitation and solely as illustrative example:

- 1. Returned mail.
- 2. Anonymous tips.
- 3. Habitual tardies.
- 4. Late pick-ups from school.
- 5. P.O. Box mailing address.
- 6. Dual family addresses.
- 7. Student provided information.
- 8. Police, court, probation, or welfare reports with different addresses listed.
- 9. Questionable transfer information.

The District reserves the right to request any additional proof of residency as necessary. Reasonable efforts to determine residency include, but are not limited to, telephone calls to the home, unannounced home visitations, between 6:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m., use of licensed private investigators, questioning mail carriers, apartment managers, neighbors, or other individuals, interviewing students, contacting previous schools, police and probation officers, social media and public directories, and watching students coming and/or going from school.

When determining a student's residency, the District shall not use a licensed private investigator to assist with an investigation until after the District has made a reasonable effort to determine the student's residency through the Superintendent or district employed designee.

Individuals conducting a student residency investigation are prohibited from surreptitiously photographing or video recording the student being investigated.

Individuals conducting a student residency investigation must truthfully identify themselves to anyone whom they contact or interview in the course of their investigation.

H. Revocation of Enrollment/Appeal Process

If the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/SpecialistSSSA Consultant, upon investigation, determines that a student's enrollment or attempted enrollment is based on false or unreliable evidence of residency, he/she shall deny or revoke the student's enrollment. Before any such denial or revocation is final, the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist shall provide a written notice of the decision to the parent/legal guardian that includes the rationale for the decision, and inform the parent/legal guardian that he/she may provide new material evidence of residency, in writing, to the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist within 5 school days of receipt of the notice. If the parent/legal guardian elects not to provide such new evidence, the parent/legal guardian may instead notify the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist in writing that they seek an appeal before the Director of SSSA as set forth below. Such notice shall be sent by the parent/legal guardian within 5 school days of receipt of the SSSA Consultant's notice.

If the parent/legal

- 1. <u>District Notice of Decision</u>: Before any denial or revocation of student enrollment is final, the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant shall provide a written notice of the decision to the parent/guardian that: (a) includes the rationale for the decision, and (b) informs the parent/guardian that he/she may provide new material evidence of residency, in writing, to the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant within 10 school days of the date of the District's mailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice of the decision.
- 2. Parent/Guardian Submission of New Material Evidence: If the parent/guardian timely provides new material evidence of residency in writing, the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant shall review the evidence and make a decision within 5 business days or as soon thereafter as possible. The student may continue to attend school while awaiting the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant's decision. The SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant shall provide a written notice of the decision to the parent/guardian informing the parent/guardian of his/her right to appeal to the Director of SSSA or designee within 10 school days after the District's mailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice of the decision.
- 3. Parent/Guardian Notice of Appeal: If the parent/guardian elects not to provide new material evidence, the parent/guardian may instead notify the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant in writing that the parent/guardian seek an appeal before the Director of SSSA or designee. The parent/guardian must provide such notice of appeal, in writing, to the SSSA Administrator or SSSA Consultant within 10 school days of the District's mailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice of decision to the parent/guardian.
- 1.4. No New Material Evidence/No Notice of Appeal: If the parent/guardian fails to provide new material evidence of residency in writing or to seek an appeal, the student's enrollment

shall be denied or revoked 6on the 11th school daysday after the date of receiptthe District's mailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice- of the decision.

If the parent/legal guardian timely provides new material evidence of residency in writing, the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist shall review the evidence and make a final decision within 5 business days or as soon thereafter as possible. The student may continue to attend school while awaiting the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist's final decision. The SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/Specialist shall provide a written notice of the final decision to the parent/legal guardian informing the parent/legal guardian of his/her right to appeal to the Director of SSSA within an additional 5 school days after receipt of the notice. If the parent/legal guardian then fails to notify the SSSA Area Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/SpecialistSSSA Consultant in writing that they seek an appeal to the Director of SSSA, the student's enrollment shall be denied or revoked 6 on the 11th school daysday after the date of receiptthe District's mailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice of the final decision.

2.5. Parent/Guardian Appeal and District Notice of Final Decision: If the parent/legal guardian timely seeks an appeal to the Director of SSSA or designee, the Director of SSSA or designee shall provide parent/legal guardian with written notice informing the parent/legal guardian that he/she may provide additional material evidence of residency, in writing, to the Director of SSSA or designee within 510 school days of receiptmailing, emailing, or delivery of the notice, of the decision. The parent/legal-guardian will have the burden of proof to establish residency in the District during the appeal. The decision of the Director of SSSA or designee on the appeal shall be based solely on the evidence available to the SSSA Area-Administrator or Guidance and Learning Director/SpecialistSSSA Consultant when making his/her final decision and any additional written evidence timely provided to the Director of SSSA or designee by the parent/legal guardian in response to the notice of the Director of SSSA'sSSSA or designee's consideration of the appeal. The student may continue to attend school during the period of the appeal. The Director of SSSA'sSSSA or designee's decision regarding the appeal shall be provided in writing to the parent/legal guardian. If the Director of SSSA or designee denies the appeal, the student's enrollment shall be denied or revoked effective five5 school days after the date of the Director-of SSSA's/designee's decision to deny the appeal. The Director of SSSA'sSSSA or designee's decision shall be final.

I. Student Enrollment

1. Enrollment Documentation: When a parent/guardian seeks to enroll a student into the District, the following parent/guardian shall present proof that the child is of the minimum age set by law for admission thereto. The documentation mustmay be provided:in the form of a birth certificate, a certified copy of a birth record; or a statement by the local registrar or a county recorder certifying the date of birth, or baptismal certificate duly attested or a passport or other documentation authorized by law, which provides proof of student's legal

name, parents/guardians legal names and date of birth, and. The parent/guardian must also provide immunization records demonstrating the student is current on all required immunizations, unless the student has an authorized medical exemption. The medical exemption must be provided at the time of enrollment. (Education Code 48002)

- 2. <u>Inquiry Regarding Citizenship or Immigration Status</u>: When admission for enrollment is sought in the District, staff shall not inquire specifically about a student's citizenship or immigration status or the citizenship or immigration status of a student's parents or guardians; nor shall. After the enrollment documentation requirement has been satisfied, personnel shall not seek or require; student to the exclusion of other permissible documentation or information, provide additional documentation or information that may indicate a student's immigration status, such as a green card, voter registration, a passport, or citizenship papers. Where any law contemplates submission of national origin related information to satisfy the requirements of a special program, staff shall solicit that documentation or information separately from the school enrollment process.

Provisions of the California Education and Government Codes allow for the adoption of an SFNA, and the establishment of Level II fees to be found exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Accordingly, Resolution No. 3806 authorizes the District Superintendent or designee to file a Notice of Exemption from CEQA.

WHEREAS, Education Code section 17620 et seq. and Government Code section 65995 et seq. authorize school districts to levy fees on residential construction for the purpose of providing funds for the construction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, following a noticed Public Hearing, the Board adopted a Resolution approving the District's "School Facilities Needs Analysis" pursuant to Government Code section 65995.6 and establishing Level II alternative developer fees pursuant to Education Code section 17620 generally and Government Code sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 specifically; and

WHEREAS, Education Code section 17621, subdivision (a), states that the adoption of fees pursuant to Education Code section 17620 shall not be subject to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), Public Resources Code section 21000 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, Government Code section 65995.6, subdivision (g), states that the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code section 21000 et seq. may not apply to the preparation, adoption or update of a School Facilities Needs Analysis or to the adoption of a Resolution pursuant to Government Code section 65995.6 regarding the School Facilities Needs Analysis; and

WHEREAS, in determining that the adoption of the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis and the establishment of developer fees under Government Code sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 are exempt from CEQA, a school district is entitled to file a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 14, section 15062.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board hereby finds that its action in adopting the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis under Government Code section 65995.6 and in establishing Level II alternative fees under Education Code section 17620 and Government Code sections 65995.5 and 65995.6 is statutorily exempt from the requirements of

the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Education Code section 17621, subdivision (a), and Government Code section 65995.6, subdivision (g).

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that this Board hereby approves the exemption and directs the Superintendent to file the Notice of Exemption regarding its action adopting the School Facilities Needs Analysis and imposition of Level II alternative fees, together with a certified copy of this Resolution, with the County Clerk of each County in which this District will collect fees pursuant to Education Code section 17620.

Title: Resolution No. 3805 – Annual Adoption of a School Facilities Needs Analysis and the Establishment of Level II Facilities (Developer) Fees

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Resolution No. 3805 approving the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis (SFNA) and establishing a Level II Alternative School Facilities (Developer) Fee of \$4.67 per square foot, effective July 1, 2021, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Since January 1987, school districts have had the authority to levy developer fees for all new construction within the school district including residential, commercial and industrial development. The current maximum Level I fees school districts are authorized to levy are \$4.08 per square foot for residential development and \$0.66 per square foot for commercial and industrial development. At the current time, the District uses the higher Level II residential development fee of \$4.94 per square foot.

With the adoption of Senate Bill 50 (Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998), school districts are authorized to levy a fee in excess of the amount identified above for new residential development with said fee to be based on State guidelines and the adoption of a School Facilities Needs Analysis.

Based on State guidelines related to student generation rates from new development, projected new development during the upcoming five (5) years, State building costs, State approved school site acreage, estimated infrastructure costs for off-site, service-site, and utility improvements, the District's Level II alternative fee has been determined to be \$4.67 per square foot, which represents fifty percent (50%) of the facilities cost. It should be kept in mind that the costs included in the School Facilities Needs Analysis report reflect State guidelines and are not the "true" cost of building and occupying new schools in the District.

The report has been reviewed with the District's legal counsel and has been determined to meet all SB 50 requirements. Further, a copy of this report was delivered to representatives of the City of Clovis, City of Fresno, and County of Fresno on April 23, 2021, in accordance with legal requirements. A copy was also provided to the local Building Industry Association (BIA) and area developers. The document is also available for review through the Clovis Unified Facilities Office.

It is recommended that the Governing Board adopt Resolution No. 3805, a copy of which follows, that approves the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis and authorizes the implementation of the Level II fee of \$4.67 per square foot for all new residential development effective July 1, 2021.

IN THE MATTER OF THE ADOPTION OF A SCHOOL FACILITIES NEEDS ANALYSIS AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF ALTERNATIVE LEVEL II SCHOOL FACILITIES (DEVELOPER) FEES

WHEREAS, Education Code section 17620 authorizes school districts to impose certain fees as set forth in Government Code section 65995 et seq. to finance the construction and reconstruction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code section 65995 the District is currently levying its Level I fee at \$4.08 per square foot of assessable residential construction; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code section 65995.5, the District is currently levying a Level II fee of \$4.94 per square foot of assessable residential construction; and

WHEREAS, under Senate Bill 50 (SB 50), the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (Chapter 407, Statutes of 1998), Government Code section 65995.5 provides that in lieu of a residential fee imposed under Government Code section 65995, subdivision (b)(1), a school district may impose alternative fees on new residential construction in amounts calculated pursuant to Section 65995.5, subdivision (c), and 65995.7; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code section 65995.5, subdivision (b), in order to be eligible to impose fees in these alternative amounts, the school district is required to do all of the following: (1) make a timely application to the State Allocation Board (SAB) for new construction funding and be deemed by SAB to meet the eligibility requirements for new construction funding; (2) conduct and adopt a School Facilities Needs Analysis pursuant to Government Code section 65995.6; and (3) until January 1, 2000, satisfy at least one of the requirements set forth in subparagraphs (A) to (D) inclusive of Government Code section 65995.5, subdivision (b)(3), and after January 1, 2000, satisfy at least two of said requirements.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board makes the following findings:

- 1. The District has been determined by the State Allocation Board to meet the eligibility requirements for new construction funding.
 - 2. The District has satisfied the requirements of Government Code section 65995.5,

subdivision (b)(3)(C), in that the District has issued debt or incurred obligations for capital outlay in an amount equivalent to 15 percent of its local bonding capacity. The District has further satisfied the requirements of Government Code section 65995.5, subdivision (b)(3)(D), in that at least 20 percent of the teaching stations within the District are re-locatable classrooms.

- 3. The District has conducted a School Facilities Needs Analysis consistent with the requirements of Government Code section 65995.6 whereby the District has determined the need for school facilities to accommodate un-housed pupils that are attributable to projected enrollment growth from the development of new residential units over the next five years.
- 4. The District's School Facilities Needs Analysis projects that over the next five years new residential construction will generate a total of approximately 2,072 students in grades TK-6; 510 students in grades 7-8; 920 students in grades 9-12; and 80 Special Day Class (SDC) students that must be housed at a total allowable cost calculated pursuant to the requirements of Government Code section 65995.5, subdivision (c) for facilities, site acquisition and development of \$70,147,328 which when divided by the projected square footage of new residential units anticipated to be constructed over the next five years' results in a maximum alternative residential fee of \$4.67 square foot of assessable residential construction (Level II Fee).
- 5. The purpose of the alternative Level II fee is to provide school facilities for unhoused students who will be generated as a result of the construction of new residential units in the District over the next five years.
- 6. The alternative Level II fees are to be used exclusively for the school facilities identified in the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis consistent with Government Code section 65995.5, subdivision (f).
- 7. There is a reasonable relationship between the need for school facilities and the type of development on which the fees are imposed because, as set forth in the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis, the construction of new residential units generates students that cannot be housed without additional facilities.
- 8. There is reasonable relationship between the use of the fees and the types of development projects on which the fees are imposed in that new residential units will generate students who will attend the District schools, these students cannot be housed by the District

without the construction of additional facilities, and the fees will be solely expended to finance these new additional facilities.

9. There is a reasonable relationship between the amount of the fees and the cost of the facilities attributable to the construction of new residential units on which the fees are imposed in that the square footage of these types of units has a direct relationship to the number of students generated and, thus, to the facilities which the District must add to accommodate those students.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Board conducted a noticed public hearing at its regular meeting of June 9, 2021, at which time information contained in the District's School Facilities Needs Analysis was presented, together with the District's responses to all written comments received regarding the School Facilities Needs Analysis. The Board hereby adopts the School Facilities Needs Analysis and incorporates its School Facilities Needs Analysis herein by reference.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Board hereby establishes an alternative Level II fee in the amount of \$4.67 per square foot of assessable residential construction and the alternative Level II fees will take effect on July 1, 2021.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the District has established a separate account in which all Level II fees collected pursuant to this Resolution, along with any interest income earned therein, shall be deposited in order to avoid any commingling of the fees with other fees, revenues and funds of the District, except for temporary investments, and that the District is authorized to make expenditures or to incur obligations solely for the purposes for which the fees are collected, which the Governing Board hereby designates to be those purposes permitted by any applicable law.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that if the District has unexpended or uncommitted fees within five (5) years of collection, the District will make required findings or refund the fees as set forth in Education Code section 17624.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Level II fees established pursuant to this Resolution are not subject to the restriction contained in subdivision (a) of Government Code section 66007, and that no building permit shall be issued for any development absent certification of compliance by the development project with the fees imposed pursuant to this Resolution.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Superintendent give notice to all cities and counties with jurisdiction over the territory of the District of the Board's action by serving a copy of this

Resolution, the supporting documentation and a map indicating the areas subject to the Level II fees on each agency and requesting that no building permits or, for manufactured homes and mobile homes, Certificates of Occupancy, be issued on or after the date of this Resolution without certification from the District that the Level II fees specified herein have paid.

DISCUSSION:

There will be no change to the 60 hours of theory for the Nurse Assistant program. Seventy-one clinical skills hours are requested to be eliminated based on the recommendation of the Clovis Adult Allied Health Occupational Advisory Committee. Currently, Clovis Adult Education requires 225 clinical hours, which exceeds the requirements for State certification by 125 hours. Decreasing the required hours of the program will allow Clovis Adult Education to compete with other public and private institutions. Additional practice lab hours were added 15 years ago to enhance clinical skills attainment. During the 2020-2021 school year, student learning and testing were tracked and data analyzed. This study indicated zero adverse effects on student learning and the State Board pass rate by reducing clinical skill hours. There are no substantive content changes that would affect vocational skills attainment and job placement with the reduction in clinical skills hours.

This item will appear on the July 21, 2021, Consent agenda.

FISCAL IMPACT/FUNDING SOURCE:

With this change, an increase in revenue is anticipated by increasing enrollment and adding a 2022 summer Nurse Assistant program session. Decreasing the total hours of Nurse Assistant program will not decrease the amount of the course fee. Reducing the clinical hours will help potential students seeking vocational training by shortening the program's overall length, attracting students seeking short-term training, and place graduates more rapidly into employment.

Mr. Dwight Pullen:

Upon the recommendation of the Clovis Adult Education Nursing Occupational Advisory Committee, the Nurse Assistant program hours have been decreased. Following the Advisory Committees' guidance, the Nurse Assistant program has reduced its hours to become more marketable and competitive with similar programs in the area. Additional practice hours for students were added previously for clinical skills training. Tracking and testing for student learning indicated no effect on the State Board pass rate by reducing the clinical skill hours. Furthermore, there are no substantive content changes that would negatively affect vocational skills attainment and job placement with the decrease in hours.

The Governing Board of the Clovis Unified School District and Clovis Unified School District Administration have approved the decrease in hours of the Nurse Assistant Program from 285 to 214 total hours. The Governing Board voted to approve this change at a meeting held on the 21st day of July, 2021.

Title: Career Technical Education Service Agreement with GrowthPoint Technologies

Authorize the Superintendent or designee to accept and execute a service agreement with GrowthPoint Technologies for summer 2021, as submitted.

DISCUSSION:

Clovis Unified's Career Technical Education Department has contracted with GrowthPoint Technologies for the past three years to implement the summer enrichment program to provide CTE exposure to students grades 7-11. In continuing the partnership, the program below is funded through the CTE Strong Workforce Program.

Program Description: *Dive into STEM* is a five-day camp, 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily, that incorporates a STEM-themed curriculum and provides STEM engagement via:

- Crew Challenges Critical thinking, creativity, communication, and collaboration are required and demonstrated as students work in crews to complete tasks in applied sciences.
- **Scuba Diving** (pool diving with scuba gear) Students learn the basics of scuba and are equipped with required scuba gear and tanks to carry out crew challenges in neutral buoyancy conditions. Students complete Level 1 diving certification in the five-day camp.
- Engineering Solutions Students design, build, test, and re-design unmanned underwater robots. (Drone flight and technology may serve as a replacement, based on student demand).
- **Team Building** Students engage in team-building activities to learn and internalize leadership principles.
- Problem-Based Learning Student crews are engaged in problem-based learning through challenges in the Scuba Challenge, Team Building, and Engineering Design and as they prepare for team competitions on the last day of camp.

Staffing includes a camp director, two certified scuba instructors, instructors for underwater robotics, and two instructional assistants.

Camp Clothing includes shorts, rash guard, and t-shirt issued to each camper.

Career Information is provided daily through interview/discussions with STEM professionals during lunch time. Guests provide a career perspective for selecting STEM subjects in high school and college.

The District created the California School Funding Coalition (CSFC) in April 2013. The CSFC and SSC work together to ensure every public school in California receives the funding necessary to provide a high-quality education for all students. Consultants provide support with Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) implementation issues, in addition to coordination and recruitment of members in the Coalition and Legislative and advocacy services. Currently, there are 56 school districts participating in the CSFC.

The current agreement with SSC expires June 30, 2021, and, in order for the Coalition to continue to utilize these services, it will be necessary for the Board to renew the existing agreement.

This agreement is for one year beginning July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

Adopt amended Administration Regulation (AR) No. 5132 – Dress and Grooming to reflect a renumbering of it from AR 2105 to AR 5132 and non-substantive changes. Any substantive changes will be presented to the Board in the fall of 2021 after consideration of recommendations and input by students, staff, and parents.

DISCUSSION:

Amended AR 5132, currently numbered as AR 2105, is attached with the proposed changes in redlined text. The proposed changes include: (1) renumbering it as AR 5132 to correspond with Board Policy No. 5132 – Dress and Grooming; and (2) non-substantive changes for consistency and uniformity with the District's board policies.

District administration expects to present any substantive changes to this administrative regulation in the fall of 2021. This is to allow time to process the recommendations and receive input from students, staff, and parents in the fall when all students are expected to return to campuses and restrictions relating to COVID-19 permit greater participation in the process.

STUDENTS SERVICES, RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES

Rights and Responsibilities

DRESS AND GROOMING

This administrativeese regulations specifiesy standards of dress and grooming promoting a safe school setting conducive to a positive learning environment consistent with the Board's pPolicy No. 5132 governing acceptable and appropriate apparel and appearance for students.

A. Apparel

All clothing shall be neat, clean, and acceptable in repair and appearance and shall be worn within the bounds of decency and good taste as appropriate for school.

- 1. Articles of clothing which display gang symbols, profanity or products or slogans which promote tobacco, alcohol, drugs or sex; materially interfere with school work; or create disorder or disrupt the educational process are not allowed.
- 2. Any clothing or apparel that a student or group of students wear to identify themselves for the purpose of harassing, threatening, or intimidating others will not be allowed.
- 3. Military, paramilitary, or camouflage (military style) clothing will not be permitted.
- 4. Extreme fashion that draws undue attention to the student will not be allowed. This includes distracting clothing, and distracting make-up, etc.
- Jackets and other apparel depicting professional sports teams shall not be worn. Jackets or other apparel depicting college or university teams are acceptable unless such team designations are associated with gangs or otherwise conflict with the standards for acceptable apparel.
- 6. Underwear-type sleeveless shirts, athletic tank tops, beach wear, swim wear, halter-tops, tube tops, spaghetti straps, bare midriffs or chests, see-through or fishnet outfits, or off the shoulder and low-cut tops are not appropriate or acceptable. Dresses and skirts are to be worn no shorter than five inches (5") above the top of the kneecap, but no shorter than mid-thigh. Clothing that exposes bare midriffs or cleavages is prohibited. Shoulder straps on tops and other clothing must be a minimum of two inches (2") wide.
- 7. Shorts are to be worn no shorter than five inches (5") above the top of the kneecap, but no shorter than mid-thigh. Shorts are to be hemmed and not form fitting. Bike shorts (spandex), gym shorts, frayed shorts, or shorts with holes are unacceptable. Athletic shorts with pockets are permissible. Shorts worn during Pphysical Eeducation may not be worn during regular class time at secondary sites.
- 8. Straps on shoes and clothing must be fastened at all times.

- 9. Leggings will be allowed if over-garment is no shorter than five inches (5") above the top of the kneecap, but no shorter than mid-thigh.
- 10. Shoes must be worn by all students. No hard-toed or steel-toed shoes/boots will be allowed. No high top, laced up, combat, or military style boots will be allowed. Shoes; or sandals without heel straps that do not present a safety concern may be worn by students in grades 7 through 12, except during physical education classes, recess, while participating in school-related athletic competitions, events or activities, or while participating in other activities where safety is a concern. Backless shoes commonly known as "flip-flops," "beach shoes," "soccer sandals," "zories," and/or thongs are inappropriate and will not be allowed. See Exhibit No. 21055132(2).
- 11. For safety reasons, students in grades pre-school through 6 are not allowed to wear flip-flops, shoes, or sandals without a heel strap. See Exhibit No. 21055132(2).
- 12. No slippers will be allowed.
- 13. Excessively baggy pants, including sweatpants, are not allowed. Pants cannot exceed five inches (5") when measured at the kneecap of the straightened leg. Pants must fit and be worn at the natural waist. The bottom of the pant leg may not be frayed or drag on the ground. Pants must be hemmed and not stapled, pinned, or taped.
- 14. Sleepwear is not permissible.
- 15. Oversized shirts that present a safety concern or reflect gang style are not acceptable.
- 16. If hats (including visors) are worn, students are only permitted to wear their specific school or high school area related hats. All hats must be worn facing forward at all times. All other hats are unacceptable. Hats and/or caps and/or sunglasses must be removed in the classrooms or offices. Specific clothing and hats determined by the school dDistrict or school site to be gang-related or inappropriate apparel are not acceptable. Articles of sun-protective clothing, including, but not limited to, hats and sunglasses, may be used outdoors. Subject to these provisions, sun-protective clothing, headwear, other than caps or hats, will not be allowed at school. School sites may add other restrictions on the type of hats to be worn.
- 17. No frayed or torn clothing is acceptable (manufactured or otherwise).
- 18. Clothing, jewelry, and personal items shall be free of writing, pictures, or any other insignia which are crude, vulgar, profane, or sexually suggestive; shall not bear drug, alcohol, or tobacco company advertising, promotions, or likenesses; shall not promote violence, illegal activity, or relate to gang affiliation or activity; and shall not advocate racial, religious, or sexual orientation prejudice.

- 19. Clothes shall be worn as intended and be sufficient to conceal undergarments, which shall be worn and covered at all times.
- 20. Pro logos on school materials of any kind are not acceptable (binders, folders, backpacks, pens, pencils, etc.)

B. Grooming

- 1. Hair shall be clean and neatly groomed.
- 2. Hair or mustache styles which cause undue attention are not acceptable, e.g., unusual designs, colors, symbols, messages, mohawks, Faux-Hawks, or unusual razor cuts. Complete razor shaving of the head is allowed.
- 3. Beards are not allowed. Sideburns are allowed, but may not extend past the base of the earlobe or be wider than one inch (1").
- 4. Bangs or other hairstyles must not obstruct nor interfere with vision.
- 5. For those courses where long hair may pose a safety risk, such as where mechanical equipment with moving parts are used or where there is an open flame, long hair must be in a protective head covering, such as a hair net or cap, or hair must be securely bound behind the head, consistent with rules established by the instructor.
- 6. Tattoos, permanent or temporary, must be covered at all times.

C. Jewelry

1. Piercing jewelry is acceptable in the ears only. Piercing jewelry that is intended to alter the natural shape of the ear is prohibited. Other body piercing jewelry (e.g., that for piercings in the eyebrows, nose, lips, or tongue) is not acceptable. Distracting jewelry, including piercing jewelry that draw undue attention, is not allowed.

D. Exemptions

- 1. Religious beliefs, bona fide medical reasons, or other good cause based on legal requirements, when verified, may be grounds for an exemption to a specific portion of the Dress and Grooming Board Policy No. 5132.
- 2. A petition for an exemption from enforcement of a specified portion of Dress Code Board Policy No. 5132 (see Exhibit No. 5132(1) Petition for Waiver of Dress and Grooming Compliance) may be submitted to the Student Services and School Attendance office. An appeal of a denial of any exemption shall be submitted in writing to the Associate Superintendent; of School Leadership; within 30 calendar days of the denial.

- a. In the event that an appealit does not raise allegations within the District's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) in Board Policy No. 1312.3, then, within 30 calendar days of receipt of the appeal, the Associate Superintendent of School Leadership or designee shall gather facts and make a written determination, which shall be provided to the complainant. Gathering of facts shall include but may not be limited to meeting with the complainant, if deemed appropriate to do so. Any decision of the Associate Superintendent, of School Leadership shall be final.
- b. In the event that the allegations raised in the appeal are determined to fall within the District's Uniform Complaint Procedures ("UCP") included UCP in Board Policy No. 1312.39208, then the District willwould use the District's UCP process to investigate and respond to the appeal rather than the above appeal process. Consistent with law and Board Policy and Administrative Regulation No. 1312.3, any appeal of that decision may be appealed to the California Department of Education.

E. School Uniform Policy

- 1. The decision to pursue a school uniform policy must be initiated by parents and approved by the school S.A.R.T. committee and the site principal.
- 2. A school uniform committee will develop a survey to be sent to all parents regarding their position on a school uniform policy by January 15 of the school year prior to the implementation of a school uniform policy. Prior to the distribution of the survey, the committee must sponsor at least one parent forum or meeting open to all parents for the purpose of information and input.
- 3. In order fF or a school site to further consider a school uniform, at least a majority of the surveys distributed must be returned and a majority of the surveys returned must support a uniform policy. These majorities are considered minimums and school sites have the discretion to establish more stringent standards of returns and support.
- 4. The Governing—Board must be notified by February 1 of the school year prior to the implementation of a school uniform policy.
- 5. The school site shall notify all parents or guardians no less than six (6) months prior to the time the uniform policy is implemented.
- 6. Should a school adopt a uniform policy, resources shall be available to assist economically disadvantaged students, and a procedure for parents/guardians to opt out of the policy shall be in place.

RESOLUTION NO. 3820 BEFORE THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FRESNO COUNTY, CALIFORNIA

RESOLUTION FOR WORKERS' COMPENSATION COVERAGE FOR VOLUNTEERS

WHEREAS, the Clovis Unified School District recognizes the need for and the benefit derived from individuals and groups providing volunteer services to the District; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of California has provided authorization for inclusion of coverage of volunteers in the Clovis Unified School District workers' compensation program; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to provide workers' compensation coverage for individuals in their capacity as volunteers to the District while they are performing services for the District in accordance with District regulations and policy.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Governing Board has reviewed and approved that Clovis Unified School District adopt the policy for purposes of workers' compensation benefits that an unsalaried person(s) authorized by the Superintendent/Governing Board to perform volunteer services for the District shall be deemed to be an employee of the School District should he/she sustain an injury while engaged in the services of this District under the direction and control of the District Superintendent or the District's Governing Board.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that for the purposes of extending this coverage to official volunteers of the District, all individuals who directly volunteer to provide services in the District, and whose volunteered services are accepted in accordance with District regulations and policy shall be covered. The type of approved volunteer service shall be on file in the appropriate District or local school site office prior to commencing volunteer services.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt Resolution No. 3815 authorizing the District to hire a CalPERS retiree prior to the 180-day post-retirement waiting period.

DISCUSSION:

A retiree can return to work for a school district employer without reinstating into active service and without an impact on their pension benefit if they return to work for one of the following reasons (Government Code Section 7522.56):

- An emergency to prevent stoppage of public business
- The retiree has skills needed to perform work of limited duration

A public agency retiree cannot return to work for at least 180 days after retirement unless the following conditions are met (Government Code 7522.56):

- The employer certifies that the appointment is necessary to fill a critically needed position before 180 days have passed.
- The appointment has been approved by the governing body of the employer in a public meeting.

The District finds the appointment of retiree, David Behlen, is necessary to fill the critically needed position of School Bus Driver II for the District. Due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic the District has a need for qualified school bus drivers. The employment for the retiree shall be limited to 960 hours per fiscal year.

Resolution No. 3815 will be included in the July 21, 2021, Board agenda.
